However, Kendrick came back to make it 7-all on a 60-yard punt return by Kenny Heimgartner, who also ran the conversion. Torgerson of Nezperce passed 35 yards to Jim Branson and Bill Stookey scored on a 15-yard run for the two second-quarter Indian tallies.

Early in the third quarter Kenny Heimgartner again rambled over the Nezperce goal line, to make the score read 26-13, Nezperce. The conversion try failed.

During the contest the Tigers fumbled six times, and lost the ball five of the six times — fumbles that might well have cost the game.

BROCKE APPEALS TO WHITE FOR DISASTER AREA HELP

Moscow (Sept 1) — With "Mother Nature" still failing to cooperate with Latah county farmers in grain harvesting, State Rep. George F. Brocke, Kendrick, has appealed to Idaho's congressional delegation for possible federal help.

In a letter to U. S. Rep. Compton I. White (D-Idaho), Brocke asked that the local area be listed as a "disaster area so that some assurance can be given these people.

"In Latah county about 45 percent of the winter wheat has been harvested; 60 percent of the peas, and about 25 percent of the lentils, clover and grasses remain in the fields, also some barley," Brocke wrote.

Referring to rains, Brocke said: "Fields are fast becoming a mud mire," with the forecast of more moisture to come. Many farmers will be forced out of business if the crops are not harvested, as the cost of production is against the crop. In many cases farmers have not threshed one bushel of wheat and some have harvested no crop at all. "As a result of a delay in harvest caused by slow ripening brought on by the rains far above normal in July and August, and by excessive dew at night during the harvest season, this is looking like a real disaster," Brocke wrote White. "Crop losses could run into several millions of dollars," he said.

"It is going to take several days of real drying weather before combines can go into the fields to even harvest the damaged crops," Brocke concluded.

Meeting Held
A meeting seeking to lay the ground-work for naming the county an emergency loan area was held at the courthouse Tuesday morning. Attending were Lester Clemm, Troy farmer and Democratic candidate for state representative; Homer Futter, county agent; Millard Swales, Farmers Home Administration at Moscow, and Mr. Brocke.

Swales told the group that emergency loans to farmers can become available from the FHA if the county suffers a natural disaster. This would result if farmers are unable to harvest the millions of dollars worth of wheat now standing in the fields. However, if farmers are able to harvest and sell some of their wheat crop, even though they suffered losses, the set-back would be classified an economic disaster and the FHA could not act.

"Right now it's a waiting game to determine whether the county will host a natural of an economic disaster," Swales said.

Brocke pointed out the major cash crop in Latah county is wheat, and that the economic picture for the entire county is as gloomy as the weather. He also said he made a survey among 11 farmers in the county and learned that 10 of them face bankruptcy if they suffer crop losses. To add to the looming picture of despair, only 15 percent of the crop in the county is covered by insurance, according to Brocke. Adding to the woes of the farmers is the fact that even if the crop is harvested, it will not grade No. 1. — Daily Idahoian, Moscow.

Weather Changes a Bit
Since the above article was written the weather took a change for the better — and harvesting operations were on a "round the clock" basis. However, no reports were available from local warehouses on the grade of the wheat coming in.

ARLEE HEAD HURT AT CRUSHER WORK

Troy — A 27-year-old Lewiston man seriously injured an arm while operating a rock crusher at a rock pit between Troy and Deary, Saturday.

Arlee Head, an employee of Lloyd Farrington, Kendrick, suffered major injuries to blood vessels and the nerves of his left arm when it became caught in the belt of a rock crusher he was operating, according to Dr. David Valder, a Moscow physician. The accident occurred when Head reached into the drive mechanism of the machine, according to Farrington, who took Head to the Gritman Hospital at Moscow, where the injured man underwent surgery.

Sept. 7 — The condition of Mr. Head was reported unchanged at the Gritman Hospital, Sunday. His arm was mangled and major injury was done to the blood vessels and nerves of his arm, doctors reported.

"LABOR DAY" WAS RIGHT IN KENDRICK-JULIAETTA AREA

"Labor Day" in all its ramifications, commonly referred to as a "holiday," was anything but that in the Kendrick-Juliaetta area, as farmers took advantage of every moment of dryness and of daylight to harvest grain and peas and lentils — crops that are anywhere from three to six weeks behind schedule. Nor did darkness halt some machine — equipped with lights, they ran until the night fall of dew forced them to shut down.

The rush really began in some areas Saturday afternoon, but did not reach its full peak until Sunday afternoon and Monday. Everywhere you looked there was a combine in motion, or a loaded truck on its way to town — and a line at the warehouses, waiting to unload, was a common sight.

Warehouse Operators Report
Tuesday afternoon the following reports were available from the local warehouses:

Brocke & Sons, Inc., Seedsmen, estimate the following percentages of seeds harvested as follows: Winter peas, 66 percent; spring peas, 95 percent; lentils, 50 percent, White Dutch Clover 75 percent, and grass seeds 90 percent.

Bob Watts of the Kendrick Rochdale Co. said they were snowed under. Everything is coming in. We haven't even had a chance to talk to the farmers and get their estimates. I know there is still a great deal to go — some of it still too wet to begin harvesting operations.

Ben Westendahl of the Lewiston Grain Growers said a record of 247 loads, totaling 60,000 bushels, had been accepted on Monday at the Kendrick warehouse. Trucks were still rolling in at 11:30 Monday night — from combines running with lights. Mr. Westendahl says that grain is still wet in the Southwick area, but most other areas are harvesting.

ANTON DALE DIES IN CAR ACCIDENT

Lewiston — Anton Niles Dale, 60, a former resident of Southwick, and the father of Harvey Dale, 603 Cedar Ave., Lewiston, was killed at 12:05 a. m. Sunday at Quincy, Wn. The Washington State Patrol said he was knocked down by one car while crossing a street, and was run over by another.

Dale was born May 30, 1904, at Trondheim, Norway, a son of Elmer and Nellie Dale. He came to the United States with his parents as a child. They settled in Minnesota. He remained there 20 years and married Olga Nelson at Wilmar, Minn., in 1927. He lived with her there until 1939, when they moved to Southwick. In 1942 their marriage ended in divorce, and he went to Baker, Ore., where he had remained most of the time since.

Just before his death he moved temporarily to the Quincy area to work in the apple harvest.

He was a member of the Lutheran Church.

Funeral services will be held today (Thursday) at 2:00 p. m. in the Little Chapel of the Flowers.

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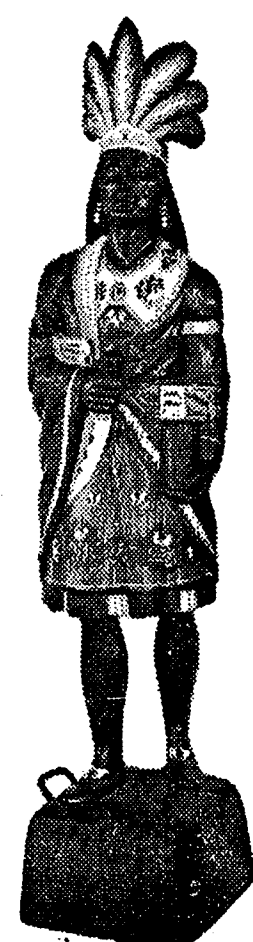
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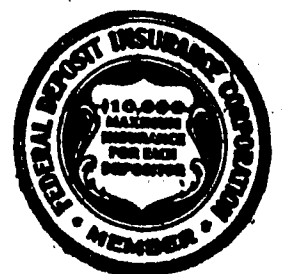
