KENDRICK TIGERS DOWN THE WOLVES

The Kendrick Tigers downed the Culesac Wolves 39-20 in a District 2 eight-man high school football game here Friday evening.

Dean Brocke paced the winners as he passed for one touchdown and ran for two more. Dale Siflow caught the scoring pass and Tom Rowden and Kenny Heimgartner ran for the other two touchdowns.

Heimgartner scored two conversion points on the ground and Brocke trotted over for the other.

Walt Vincent passed for the first Culesac score in the second period, and Dean Heinzlerling scored the other two on the ground. Heinzlerling and Vincent scored on conversion tries for the Wolves.

AND THE TRUCKS ROLLED, AND ROLLED ALL WEEK LONG

Under sunny skies, but with a morning dew that, in some areas, prevented the starting of combines until 9:30 to 10:00 a. m., harvest in this section went on full blast day after day — with never a break for Sunday — and with lined-up trucks on Main Street a common sight, as they waited to unload their cargoes of wheat, barley, peas, or other field items.

Farmers here, with harvest four to six weeks late — took no time out for anything except to eat and sleep, as they strove to save their field crops. Neighbor helped neighbor in an effort to take fullest advantage of the longest stretch of good weather we have had in this area all summer!

Not only was it a drive for the farmers, but for warehousemen as well — for space in the big elevators rapidly began to diminish, as trucks streamed in hour after hour. Said one local warehouseman: "We've been living off of box cars and trucks for a couple of days now — but we're still on the job!"

From the Kendrick Rochdale Co. Bob Watts, manager, estimates that some 80 percent of the area crops are now harvested, and that yields (on wheat) are running about 60 bushels to the acre. Because of this heavier yield, and the "all at once" harvest, the storage bins are being filled to capacity.

The Lewiston Grain Growers' manager, Ben Westendahl, this week estimated that 90 percent of harvest is complete, with yields running far above the average. In one day alone the Kendrick warehouse took in some 4,000,000 lbs. of grain. Because of the lack of freight cars there has been trouble in finding storage, yet it is all being shifted into place either at Juliaetta or Kendrick.

Geo. Brocke, Jr., reporting for Geo. F. Brocke & Sons, estimated the percentages in crops harvested as: 90 percent of peas; 70 percent of the lentils, and 80 percent of the clovers. Mr. Brocke says that the recent rain undoubtedly cut yields down 10 to 25 percent, and the quality was lower considerably in all three crops.

STATE TIMBER CUT OVER \$2 MILLION

Boise — During the fiscal year 1964 the timber cut from state owned forest lands totaled 190,330,398 board feet; 22,467 cedar poles, and a variety of mixed products such as pulp, shake bolts, fence posts, etc., valued at \$2,076,672. Gordon Trombley, assistant state forester-timber management reported last week from Coeur d'Alene. All receipts from the sale of forest products go to the various endowment funds for support of public schools and state institutions.

During the same period the state sold 139,983,000 board feet of timber and 16,521 cedar poles valued at \$1,236,816. The state's allowable cut of 116 million board feet was exceeded in an attempt to harvest some of the over-mature and dying timber that is being attacked by insects and infested with white pine blister rust, the forester said.

Due to the large volume of mature timber that is infested with blister rust and insects, the state anticipates that the allowable cut will be exceeded for a number of years in the future. Some of the deterrents to increased cut from state lands are the lack of roads and distances to markets in certain areas, such as the North Fork of the Clearwater river. As the tempo of logging increases, more roads will be built which will in turn make additional stands of timber available to the wood-using industries.

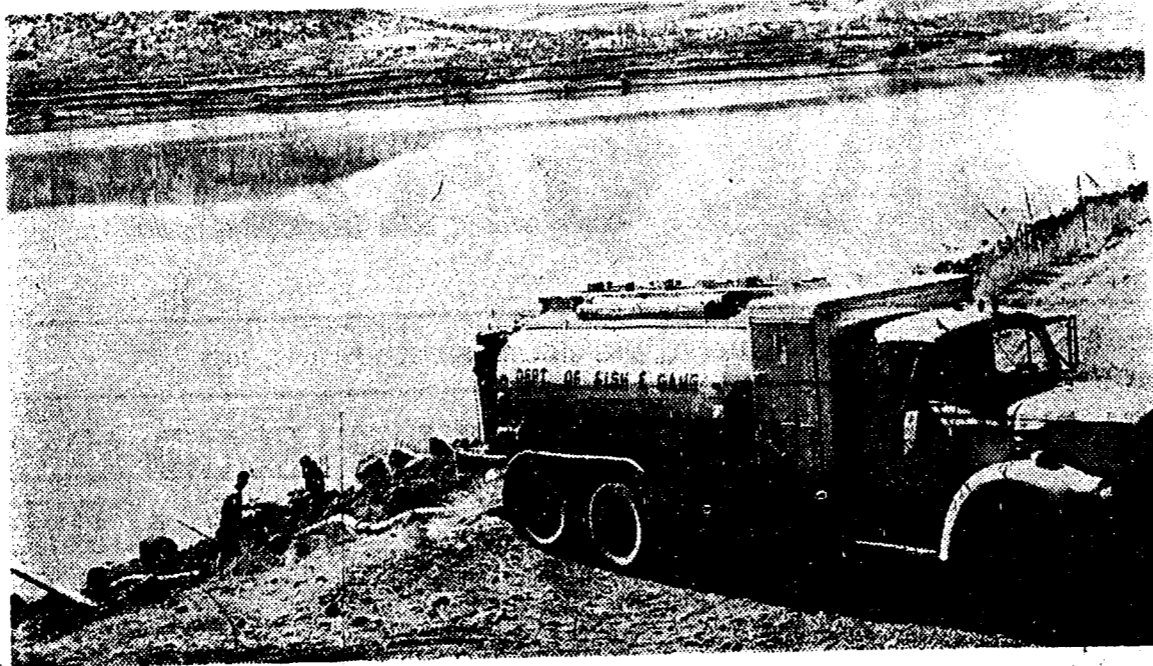

Fingerlings are used to maintain lakes and reservoirs where natural fish propagation is low, and to re-stock "rehabilitated" reservoirs where rough fish populations have been destroyed to eliminate competition for food.

Most catchable-sized trout are 9 to 12 inches in length when planted in road-side streams or wherever fishing pressure is great.

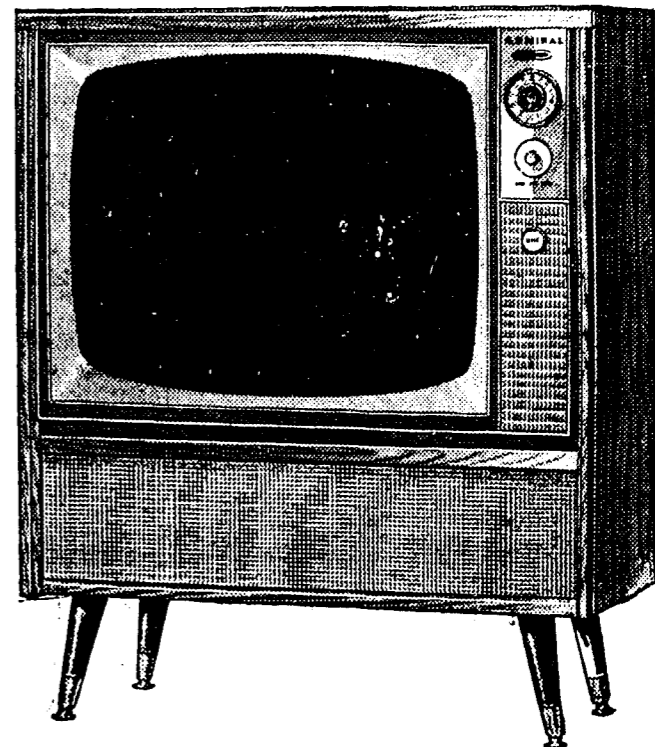

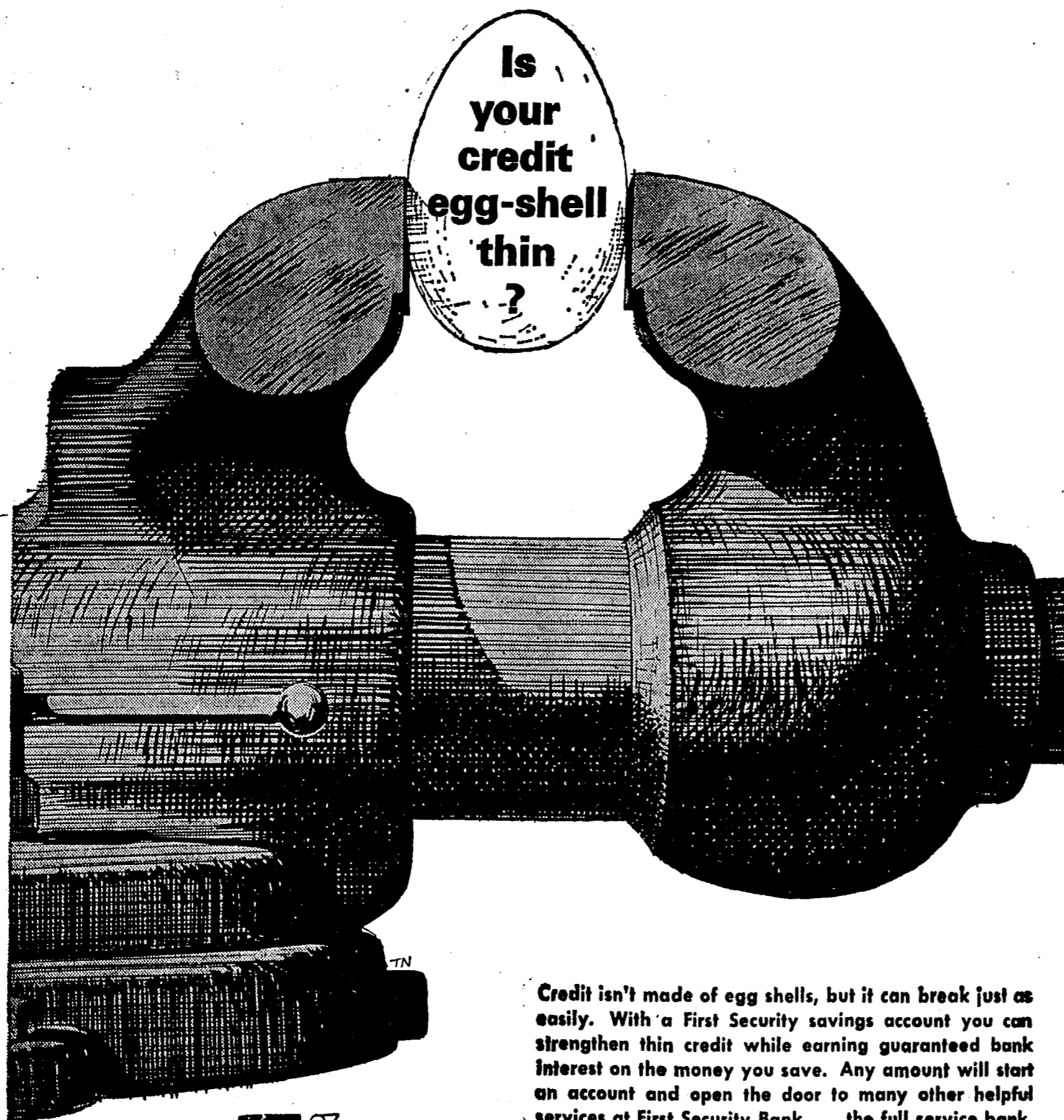

Preparations for the Latah County Fair have been moving steadily forward the past weeks, and all is now in readiness for its opening on Thursday, September 17. It will close Saturday evening, September 19.

Perhaps a brief review of the rules would be helpful for prospective exhibitors:

All exhibits must be entered and in place by 10 o'clock a. m. on September 17, the opening day of the fair. Please bring them in early. No exhibit may be removed until after the Style Revue, Sept. 19. If exhibits are removed prior to the closing time, premiums will be forfeited.

Anything entered in community displays cannot be entered in competition in other classes, but will be judged simply as a part of the community exhibit.

Community committees will be responsible for entering and arranging exhibits for their respective communities.

All exhibits must have the name and address of the exhibitor attached. All must be the entry tags provided at the time of entry.

Where there is but one exhibit in a class, the award shall be made on merit alone, and a premium may be given at the discretion of the judges, but the premium shall not be withheld because of no competition. Unworthy articles will not receive premiums, whether there be no competition or not. Any article entered

for premium must be entered in the name of producer or owner (all livestock exhibits must be entered in the name of the owner).

Livestock bedding and hay will be furnished by the Fair management, but other feeds must be supplied by the exhibitor. Bring your own feed troughs and buckets.

Exhibits in the Field Seeds and Garden divisions must be produced during this growing season.

Premiums will be paid only to bona fide residents or taxpayers of Latah County, or 4-H Club or F. F. A. members belonging to a Latah County club or chapter.

Exhibitors will not be limited as to number of entries in any class or lot, except as stipulated, but no one individual exhibitor will be awarded more than two premiums or ribbons in any one lot.

Any exhibitor who violates any of the above rules will forfeit all premiums.

All animals exhibited or brought to the Fair grounds must be disease free. All cattle must be dehorned or naturally polled.

From all indications this year's Fair promises to be one of the best.
