## TIGERS BOW TO GENESEE BULLDOGS

The Genesee Bulldogs scored five touchdowns, one on a play shorter than 40 yards, and thereby defeated the Kendrick Tigers 32 to 7 in a District 2 eight-man high school football league game here Friday evening. Genesee led 19-0 at the half-time.

Kendrick's new athletic field adjoining the new school was dedicated to District 283 School Superintendent James V. Muscat during half-time ceremonies. Dr. Leon Greene, head of the physical education department at the University of Idaho, made the dedication talk.

Quarterback Skip Ivie was the triggerman in the Genesee attack. He passed 80 yards to Mark Zenger and 76 yards to John Fell for first quarter touchdowns, hit Frank Hillman on an 82-yard pass-run play in the second period, ran 55 yards to score with a punt return in the third quarter and passed 80 yards to Larry Vestal for the final Bulldog tally in the fourth quarter. Vestal converted the first and last touchdowns. The win was the fourth for Genesee this season and its 27 straight victory.

The Tigers one touchdown, which came after Genesee was through for the night, came on Dale Silflow's 46-yard run. Dean Brocke passed to Silflow for the extra point.

## NEW ATHLETIC FIELD DEDICATED FRIDAY EVE, "MUSCAT" FIELD

Dana Magnuson, Student Body president, was Master of Ceremonies at the half-time ceremonies dedicating the new field, at the game Friday evening. As representative of the Student Body, he named the new field "Muscat Field," in honor of Joint District No. 283 Superintendent James V. Muscat, who has worked long hours for the new athletic field.

Gerald Ingle, board chairman, spoke briefly as representative of the school board.

Courtney Belt, High School principal, gave these interesting statistics in review of the work, time and expense involved:

The size of the field is four acres, and will be enlarged after the Army Corps of Engineers make plans for the further dyking of Bear Creek. There are plans for adding two tennis courts, a cinder track and a baseball diamond.

The cost so far has been \$6,507, which includes land, legal expenses and lights. The land came from Kendrick's deeded park, land purchases from Clarence Fry and Manning Onstott, and from vacated streets and alleys.

Dr. Leon Greene, head of the Dept. of Physical Education at the University of Idaho dedicated the new field, honoring Supt. Muscat, in brief but impressive fashion.

## LIKE FATHER, LIKE SON AT U. OF I.

U. of I., Moscow — John L. Blewett, a freshman architecture major at the University of Idaho, stood erect as an army supply sergeant fitted him for a military uniform just as his father had done in the same building 30 years ago.

John's father, Aaron E. Blewett, now a colonel in the United States Army, entered school at the University of Idaho as a freshman in 1934. In 1939 Blewett received his commission as a second lieutenant in graduation exercises that spring. He was then a resident of Kendrick.

After receiving his commission, Blewett served during World War II and later became professor of military science and commander of the University of Idaho Army Reserve Officers Training Corps. He commanded the ROTC unit during the academic year 1952-53.

Although the uniform may look somewhat different from what it did in 1934, and is no longer a required garment for freshmen men, the insignia are the same, and the ultimate goal might also be the same.

Eighteen-year-old John Blewett said that it was his decision to take Army ROTC when he came to the university. His father did not have that choice. Until the fall semester of 1963 ROTC was a mandatory subject for all able bodied freshmen and sophomore men students.

Though familiar with military life, John will be having his first experience in uniform, one he says he is looking forward to.

## WEATHER LOVELY, HARVEST NEARS END

Under almost continually sunny skies, and temperatures in the high 60's to middle 70's, harvest operations in this area are all but complete — although in the Southwick-Peakcan sections there still remains considerable acreage of clovers, late-sown barley and some oats.

A heavy dew at night has cut the working day — so far as harvesting is concerned, almost in half — but with neighbor helping neighbor, and as high as four combines running in a single field, a great deal has been accomplished in that time.

Local warehousemen say that this year, despite the unfavorable weather of some three weeks ago — has been one of the most bountiful harvests in many seasons. However, with the low prices of wheat — farmers must have a good yield if they are to make even a reasonable profit.

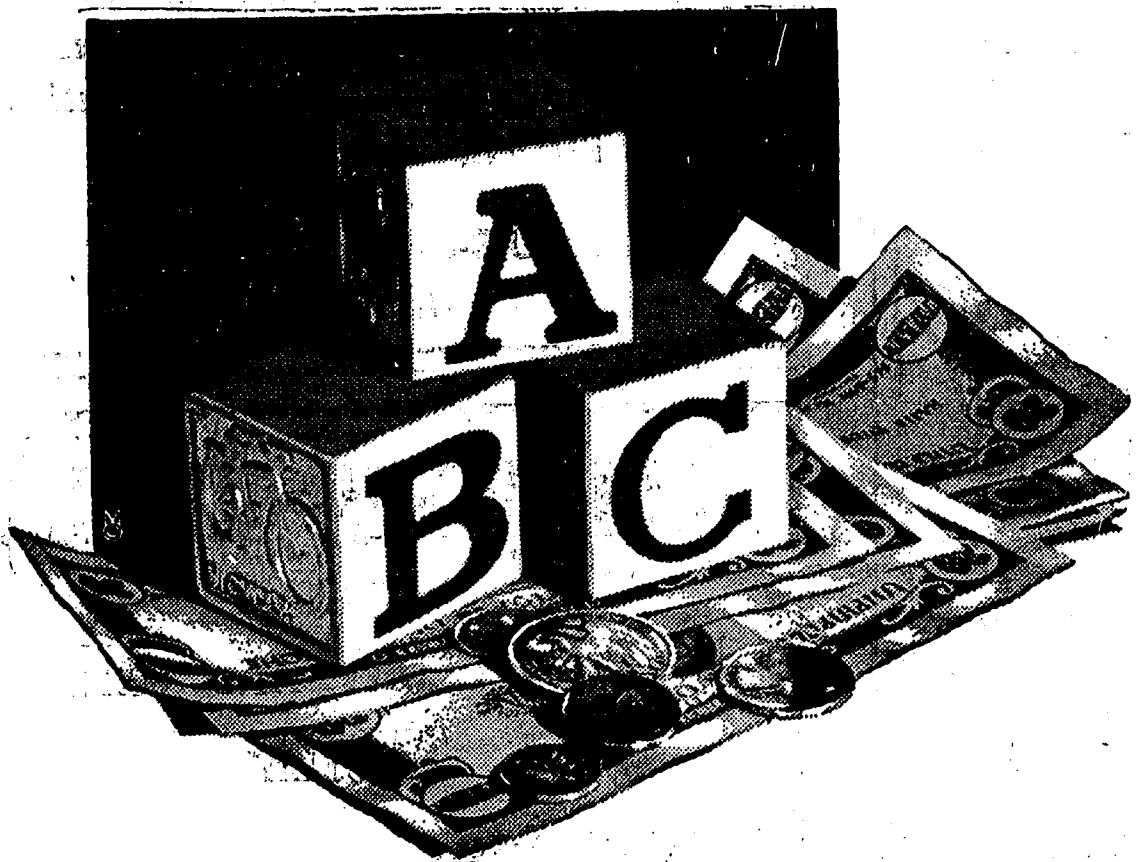

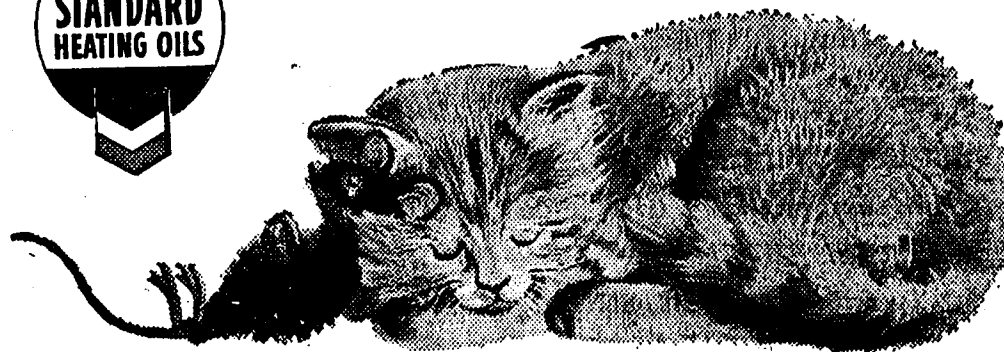

### MANY FARMERS USE S. C. S. SERVICE

Boise — More than 12,079 Idaho farmers and ranchers received technical assistance from the U. S. Soil Conservation Service on their soil and water problems in fiscal 1964, Lee T. Morgan, state conservationist says. By comparison, 11,925 land owners and operators received SCS assistance last year.

Preliminary figures on 54 soil and water conservation districts in the state show 1,186 new cooperators signing up with the districts. That brings the total number of owner-operators cooperating in the district program to 19,734 in the state.

Nationally more than a million owners and operators of farms, ranches and other lands within the locally managed soil and water districts received technical assistance from the SCS. Another 108,500 were added to cooperator rolls in the 2971 districts throughout the country.

More than 2 million land owners and operators of 682.5 million acres of land are now district cooperators, Morgan said.

SCS technical services included assistance in preparing 1,041 basic conservation plans on 476,084 acres in the state. Some 3,563 cooperators installed conservation practices on their lands.

About 25 owners established one or more income-producing recreation enterprises and five converted more than 1,235 acres of farm land to recreation as a primary source of income during 1964. In the two years since the U. S. D. A. recreation enterprise program was launched, 32 Idaho owners and operators have set up one or more income-producing recreation enterprises.

### PART TIME FARM LOANS AVAILABLE

Moscow — Many part-time farmers in Benewah, Latah and Nez Perce counties are using operating loan credit from the Farmers Home Administration to supplement the agricultural part of their earnings, according to Millard Swales, county supervisor of the agency. About 38 percent of the operating loans in the three-county area during fiscal 1964 went to part-time farmers.

Changes in Farmers Home Administration loan programs now permit the farm credit agency to advance financial assistance to families on small farms. This includes farms operated on a part-time basis. Such loans can be used to buy feed, seed and fertilizer, machinery and equipment, as well as livestock.

### FALL IS TIME TO APPLY FERTILIZER

Moscow — Fall is a good time to put commercial fertilizer on farm soil in many parts of Idaho. The reasons are given in a bulletin, "Fall Fertilization In Idaho," just published by the University of Idaho Extension Service. Free copies can be obtained from the county agent. The bulletin was written by Charles

Painter, soils specialist; G. O. Baker and R. W. Harder, members of the college of agriculture faculty at Moscow.

Phosphorus, potassium, sulfur, zinc and boron, where needed, can be supplied in the fall with satisfactory yield increases more generally than nitrogen, the leaflet says. Nitrogen may be used to advantage in the fall on soils that are well, but not excessively drained. Fall nitrogen may be lost when put on soil that is poorly drained or is very sandy.

These advantages of fall application are listed: It is more convenient because work is not so pressing and the soil is dry, so there is no problem of getting fertilizer equipment on the land, and there is normally a better supply of fertilizers in the fall.

There is no delay in planting.

Soil compaction is reduced.

Material can be worked into the seedbed on fall-seeded crops.

Idaho research has shown that phosphate can be applied any time except when the ground is frozen. There is a carry-over effect from phosphorus and it is related to the rate of application.

Soil tests, the bulletin emphasizes, are the best guide to fertilizer use.
