Also on Wednesday, Don Cantril, Southwick farmer and cattleman, was engaged in rounding up cattle from a canyon nearby, when the horse he was riding threw him and then fell on him. Mr. Cantril received a broken pelvis and torn bladder.

He was rushed to Kendrick, where, following an examination, he was sent on to Lewiston to the St. Joseph's Hospital, where he is recuperating satisfactorily. How long he will be in the hospital is not known at this time.

## KATE GALLOWAY, AREA PIONEER, DIES AT CLARKSTON SUN.

Mrs. Kate Galloway, 97, a resident of Big Bear Ridge and Kendrick for most of her life, died at the Clarkston Rest Haven at 8:00 p. m., Sunday, October 4. She had been ill for more than four years.

She was born May 3, 1867, at Flint, Michigan, moving with her parents to Missouri as a child. She was married to Alex Galloway in Missouri in 1888. In 1898 she, with her husband, moved to Kendrick, where she lived until entering the rest home four years ago. Mr. Galloway died in 1921.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Anna Bower, Kendrick, and Mrs. Mary Larson, Georgetown, Calif.; six sons, John, Andy and Ed., all of Juliaetta; Hiram, Ephrata, Wash., and Dewey and Henry, both of Kendrick; a sister, Mrs. Mary Shepherd of Springfield, Mo.; nine grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday, Oct. 7, at 1:30 p. m. in the Brower-Wann Chapel at Lewiston, with the Rev. David Zaske of the Kendrick Community Church officiating. Interment was in the Wild Rose Cemetery, Big Bear Ridge, by the side of her husband.

Lewiston — Pearl M. Alexander, 79, a resident of Clarkston since 1949, died at 5:20 Sunday afternoon, Oct. 4, at her home at 524 6th Street in Clarkston. Death was due to the infirmities of age. Mrs. Alexander had been in poor health for the past several years.

She was born at Weston, Mo., May 26, 1885, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Johnson. She moved to Idaho with her parents as a child, and was married on American Ridge, near Kendrick, Feb. 24, 1915, to Addison Alexander, a resident of Gold Hill (Cedar Ridge).

Mr. and Mrs. Alexander farmed at Gold Hill for 35 years. He died in 1949, and Mrs. Alexander moved to Clarkston the next year.

Mrs. Alexander had been a member of the Christian Church since the age of 18. She was a member of the Rebekah Lodge, the Asotin County Gerontology Council and the Barclay-Provost Guild of the Tri-State Memorial Hospital.

She is survived by a brother, Edgar Johnson, Wilkie, Saskatchewan, Canada; and a sister, Mrs. Mabel Riebold, Kooskia.


