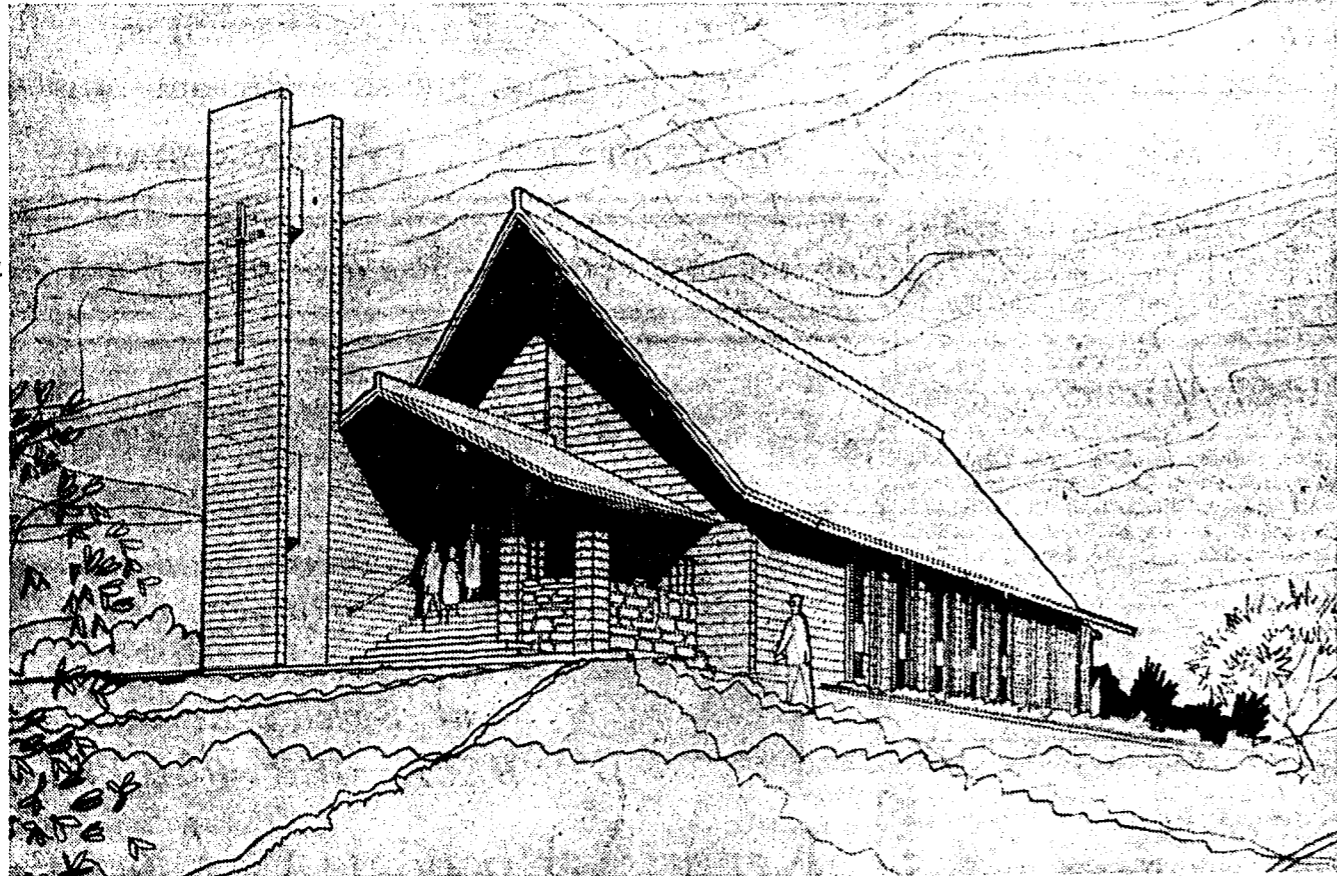


CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON NEW CAMERON LUTHERAN CHURCH



Work started last week on the new Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church — the old church having been torn down — with the new one to be built on the beautiful site. Neal Builders of Clarkston hold the contract for \$82,000.00.

The building will be 76 feet by 32 feet, plus the front entry porch, and will seat approximately 200. Two oil burning furnaces will heat the building — one for the Nave, and one for the post-free full basement.

The main architectural feature is the high gothic cedar shake roof. The cockscomb at the peak and the

graceful flares of the cornices dictate a rural styling. Offering contrast to the roof will be a vertical 40-foot tower holding the bell taken from the old church. It will be rung by means on an electrical clapper. By walking through the bell tower the north side entry can be used. Besides the main west entry there will be an east entrance and a fire escape.

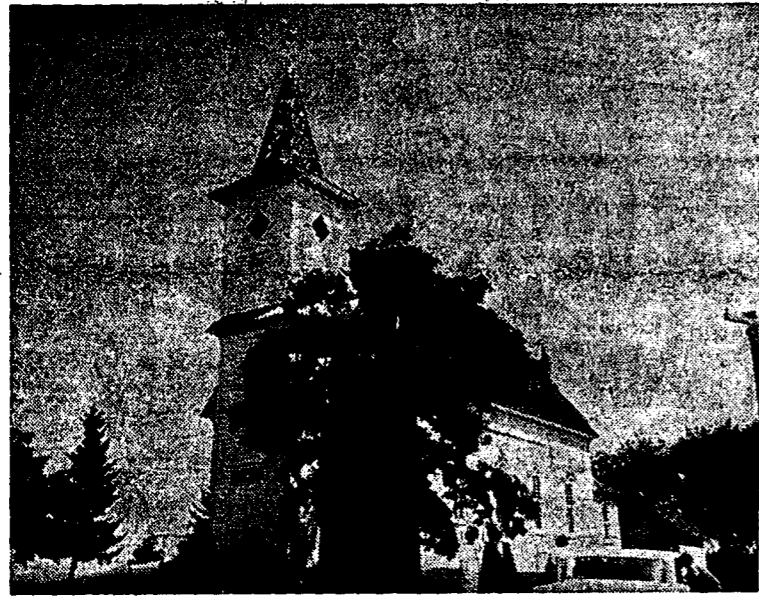
Off-white pumice-type blocks will be used for all outside walls, and the aluminum-framed windows will feature soft colored glass and stucco panels.

One large permanent classroom, an alternate "Cry-room-classroom," a superintendent's office and two semi-permanent classrooms will provide the much needed space for the Sunday School. "Glu-lam" beams in the basement ceiling and the folding doors will enable this area to be opened for large gatherings.

A modern kitchen is included, but will be finished by members of the church, who will also do all the interior painting.

Architects are Prichard & Blanton of Moscow.

THE OLD GIVES WAY TO THE NEW



Early settlers of German extraction and of the Lutheran Faith built the first parsonage and small church in 1891, and this building is now the "Ladies Aid Hall." As more settlers moved into the area a larger worship center was needed and this old familiar church was erected in 1903. Many of the families came here from Minnesota when a pastor came out and wrote back telling of the wonderful climate and rich farm land.

A modern parsonage was built by the congregation in 1956, and the Rev. Theo Meske, who arrived in 1935 to accept his first pastorate, is still serving the parish.

The church will celebrate its 75th anniversary in 1966.

It was with regret that many watched the old landmark go down — but the new building is needed to better carry on the important work of the church.

Services are being held in the Leland Club House until the new church can be completed.

The Kendrick Tigers took a 14-7 half-time lead and then scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to hand the Deary Mustangs their sixth straight set-back by a 28-13 margin in District 2 eight-man high school football play here Friday evening.

The Tigers scored first on a 23-yard run by Ken Heimgartner, half-back and Dean Brocke plunged for the extra point. However, Deary came back to knot the score at 7-7 at the end of the first quarter when Keith Olson returned a punt for 25 yards, and a touchdown, and Bob Kellom added the extra point.

Gary Craig ran six yards for the second Kendrick touchdown and Heimgartner went over for the conversion and the 14-7 half-time lead.

Brocke drove a yard for one Kendrick touchdown in the fourth quarter and later hit Heimgartner with a 12-yard scoring pass to sew up the win.

Deary scored one touchdown in the fourth quarter on an eight-yard pass from Keith Olson to Lonnie Olson.

F. M. WHITINGER, 77, SOUTHWICK PIONEER DIES AT CLARKSTON

Frederick M. Whiting, 77, a former employe of Potlatch Forests, Inc., and a resident of Clarkston since 1928, died at his home at 1025 University Street, Clarkston, at 9:45 p. m. Wednesday, Oct. 7, of the infirmities of age.

He was born at Southwick March 8, 1887. He grew to maturity in the Southwick area, and operated a farm there until 1928.

He was united in marriage to Rula Hewett at Lewiston, Oct. 2, 1913. She survives at home.

In 1928 he moved with his family to Clarkston and began a 24-year career with P. F. I., working first as a dryer operator in the sawmill, and later as a night watchman. He retired in 1952.

He was a member of the Clarkston First Church of God.

Other survivors include two sons, Vern W. of Elk River, and Charles L. of Lewiston; two daughters, Mrs. Lucile Abbott of Clarkston and Mrs. Veva Mae Gardner of Maupin, Ore.; two brothers, Vester of Brownsville, Oregon, and Harold (Harl) of Southwick; a sister, Mrs. Lavina Thornton, Vancouver, Wash., and eight grandchildren and a great grandchild.

GET THAT BLOOD PRESSURE DOWN

Boise — Medical science has a habit of tackling a problem from all sides — wherever an opening presents itself — a fact for which millions of hypertensive Americans can be grateful. Ideally, scientists would like to discover the cause of a disease and then work out methods of prevention or treatment. But although they have not yet uncovered the cause, or causes, of the most common type of high blood pressure, scientists have given us several ways of effectively treating the condition, which, the Idaho Heart Association points out, affects one out of 20 adult Americans.

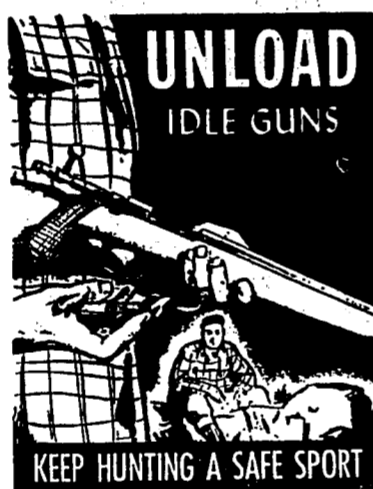
Most cases of hypertension can be controlled by drugs, diet, modification of living habits, or a combination of all three. Many different types of drugs have become available in the past 15 years, each designed to lower blood pressure in a somewhat different way.

Perhaps the most widely used group of drugs are the tranquilizers which have a quieting effect on the brain and help lessen nervous tension. This brings an elevated blood pressure down in many people. Some-

times a tranquilizer is used along with other drugs.

The diuretics help the body to excrete salt. In some hypertension patients, these drugs help lessen the tendency of blood vessels to constrict or narrow. Frequently, the diuretics strengthen the action of other stronger drugs, enabling the doctor to use less of these to obtain the desired result.

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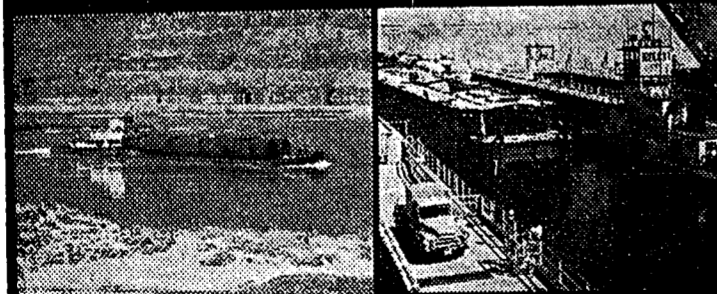
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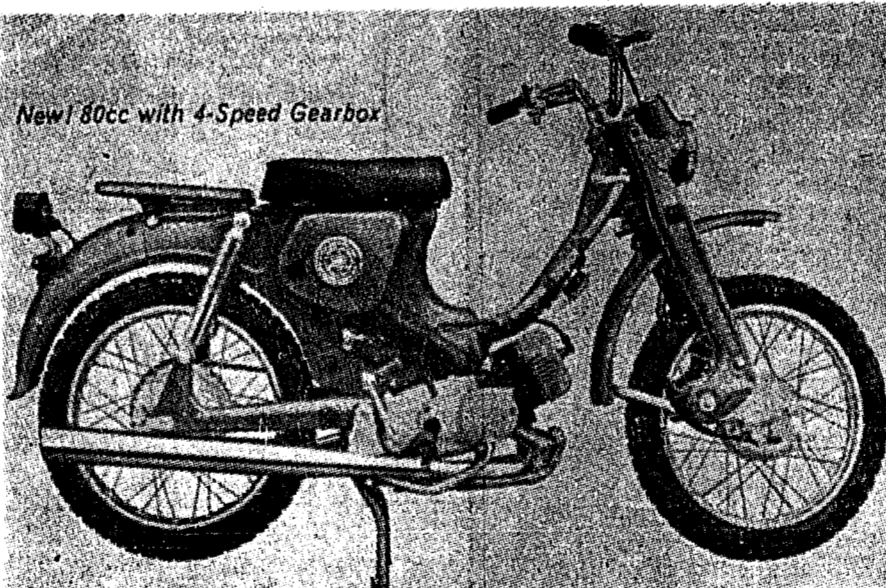


