in for a big boost because of the efforts of two University of Idaho faculty members. Utilizing infrared radiation as the basis for the detecting device, the Idaho professors have developed a portable instrument that can spot fires which can not be seen with the naked eye.

W. R. Parish, professor of engineering and Everett M. Bailey, assistant professor of engineering, have worked for two years on a device that will detect fire hot spots from a range of up to 600 feet.

The device is about the size and shape of a three-pound coffee can, equipped with a pistol grip and a trigger, a telescopic sight, ear phones and an instrument pack that straps about the shoulders. According to its designers is is primarily portable, rugged, inexpensive, simple to operate and of high sensitivity. Cost will be about \$250.00 for a produc-

By 1970, a system of dams and locks on the Columbia and Snake Rivers will bring slack water, navigable by large commercial barges, into Lewiston. Idaho will no longer be landlocked.

However, to build port facilities, financing must be obtained by issuing revenue bonds by Port Districts. NO TAXES are involved. A constitutional amendment is needed to make this possible. The Idaho legislature has approved it. Oregon and Washington now have this authority. Idaho should obtain seaport facilities before it is too late!
