Are You a Paper Saver or Clipper? ANOTHER SEWER BOND ELECTION TO BE HELD IN KENDRICK IN DEC.

Tuesday, December 15, 1964, has been set by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, as the date for the holding of the third Sewer Bond Election — the previous two having failed of the necessary two-thirds majority — although the last one was by only a narrow margin — five more "Yes Votes" being all that would have been required to carry.

In this issue of the Gazette will be found all the necessary Ordinances and Notices for the election — and it is suggested that every legal voter and taxpayer carefully read the Ordinances and Notices so that they may know the problems facing their home town. It is further suggested that each one either clip them or save the paper of this week's issue — as the two Ordinances appear but once — one notice twice, and the other five times. It should be noted there are two

sections, each of which requires a separate ballot. One covers the necessary Revenue Bonds, the other the Municipal Bonds, and the qualifications of voters on one are slightly different than those of the other. Included are the notices of registration for these two election sections. Carefully read these and be sure that you, and your wife or husband, as the case may be, are qualified to vote.

It is expected that, as in the past, there will be public meetings to acquaint residents with the necessity and severity of the situation.

There seems to be no doubt whatsoever, that these bonds are a necessity, and the longer the village waits the higher the costs can grow in every way — not only through the cost of elections, but through the steadily rising costs of materials and construction.

LLOYD ECKMAN DIES AT JULIAETTA HOME FRIDAY, PIONEER

Lloyd B. Eckman, 73, a farmer in the Juliaetta area almost all of his adult life, died of a heart attack at the family home in Juliaetta at 8:00 a. m. Friday. He had been ill for several years.

He was born Dec. 6, 1890, in Kansas, son of Jacob and Sarah Eckman. He moved with his parents to the Troy area while he was an infant. Three years later the family home was moved to Fix Ridge, near Genesee, where he grew to maturity. He was united in marriage to Artie Belle Clark of Fix Ridge on Dec. 3, 1913. She died in 1924.

On Dec. 25, 1927, he married Edna Jones at Clarkston. She survives at the family home in Juliaetta.

Survivors in addition to his widow include three sons, Leonard, Juliaetta; Lawrence, Yakima, and Lester, Clarkston; a daughter, Linda Eckman, who is attending nursing school at Boise; a brother, Enos, Quincy, Wash.; three sisters, Mrs. William Clark, Moscow, Mrs. M. Frazier, Vancouver, Wash., and Mrs. Donald I. Gruell, Lewiston, and two grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p. m. Monday at the Brower-Wann Chapel in Lewiston. The Rev. Perry Winkie, pastor of the Juliaetta Nazarene Church, was officiant. Burial was in the Fix Ridge Cemetery.

ORDINANCE NO. 522
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, ACQUISITION AND INSTALLATION OF ADDITIONS AND BETTERMENTS TO THE SEWAGE COLLECTION SYSTEM, AND THE CONSTRUCTION AND INSTALLATION OF A SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT, AT THE ESTIMATED COST OF NOT MORE THAN \$121,000.00; PROVIDING THAT THE WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS OF SAID VILLAGE BE COMBINED; PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF A PART OF THE COST OF SAID IMPROVEMENTS BY THE ISSUANCE OF MUNICIPAL REVENUE BONDS OF NOT MORE THAN \$64,000.00, WHICH SAID BONDS SHALL BE PAID ONLY OUT OF THE REVENUES AND EARNINGS OF SAID COMBINED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS OF SAID VILLAGE, SUBJECT TO THE APPROVAL OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID VILLAGE OF KENDRICK AT A SPECIAL ELECTION ORDERED HEREIN; DESCRIBING SAID BONDS; SETTING FORTH CERTAIN COVENANTS; CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID VILLAGE THE QUESTION OF THE RATIFICATION OR REJECTION OF SAID BOND ISSUE AND OF SAID INDEBTEDNESS OR LIABILITY; PROVIDING FOR THE NOTICE OF SUCH ELECTION AND THE PUBLICATION THEREOF; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

WHEREAS, at the present time about 90% of the improved portion of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, is served by a combined gravity sewage collection system; and

WHEREAS, raw sewage from the collection system is discharged into the Potlatch River resulting in a massive pollution for a considerable distance down stream; and

WHEREAS, it is also necessary that certain additions and betterments be made to the sewage collection system;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, IDAHO:

Section 1: That the Water System of this Village be merged and combined with the Sewer System as the same exist and as they may be improved and that thereafter the Water System as it exists and the Sewer System as it exists, and as they may be improved shall be held and operated by this Village as one system, and the revenues from said combined system, shall be collected, held and disbursed as the revenues of and from one system.

Section 2: That the following improvements shall be made to the combined Water and Sewer Systems:

Revised Description of Proposed Sanitary & Storm Sewer Facilities—Kendrick, Idaho

1. An 8" sanitary sewer in the alley south of, and parallel to "F" Street. From 9th Street to Addison Street.
2. An 8" sanitary sewer in an east-west easement 260' south of, and parallel to "F" Street. From Addison Street to 100 Feet west of Addison Street.
3. An 8" sanitary sewer in "D" Street. From 1/2 Block west of Kirby Street to Front Street.
4. An 8" sanitary sewer in 9th Street. From "C" Street to "D" Street.
5. An 8" sanitary sewer starting at the intersection of Range Street and "F" Street; thence south in Range Street to the Kendrick-Deary Highway; thence southwesterly in the Kendrick-Deary Highway to the intersection of "D" Street and Front Street; thence southerly in Front Street to the East-West alley lying just south of, and parallel to, Main Street; thence west in said East-West alley to Kirby Street.
6. A 10" sanitary sewer in Main Street from Mill Street to Pearl Street; thence south in Pearl Street to Wheeler Street; thence southwesterly in Wheeler Street to Cameron Street.
7. A 10" sanitary sewer in Cameron Street, and Cameron Street extended, from Wheeler Street to the Potlatch River.
8. A 10" and 12" storm sewer in an East-West alley just south of, and parallel to, Main Street. From Kirby Street to 2nd Street.
9. A 12" storm sewer in 2nd Street. From 1/2 Block south of Main Street to the Potlatch River.
10. A 10" storm sewer in Kirby Street. From Main Street to 1/2 Block south of Main Street.
11. A 10" storm sewer in 8th Street. From Main Street to 1/2 Block south of Main Street.
12. A 10" storm sewer in 7th Street. From Main Street to 1/2 Block south of Main Street.
13. A 10" storm sewer in 6th Street. From Main Street to 1/2 Block south of Main Street.
14. A 10" storm sewer in 5th Street. From Main Street to 1/2 Block south of Main Street.
15. A 10" storm sewer in 4th Street. From Main Street to 1/2 Block south of Main Street.
16. A 10" storm sewer in 3rd Street. From Main Street to 1/2 Block south of Main Street.

A mechanical-type sewage disposal facility to be located in street right-of-way at the intersection of Cameron Street & Wheeler Street. The construction of the foregoing is in accordance with the maps, plans and specifications as prepared by Thompson & Westin, of Spokane, Washington, Engineers for the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, for the carrying out of the Plan of Construction, complete details for which said Project are fully set forth and specified in the above maps, plans and specifications, which said maps, plans and specifications have been filed, and are now on file, in the office of the Village Clerk of Kendrick, Idaho, which said maps, plans and specifications are hereby ex-

pressly adopted and approved. The Board of Trustees may make such changes in the construction of the Water and Sewer improvements and make such changes in the aforementioned Plan of Construction, which will be found necessary and desirable and which will not substantially affect or change said Plan of Construction.

The combining of the water and sewer systems and the above construction will be subject to the approval of the qualified electors of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, at an election hereinafter ordered to be held in said Village.

Section 3: The total cost of doing all the foregoing, together with all necessary costs and engineering expenses, legal costs, labor costs and incidental costs, as estimated by the Board of Trustees will not be more than \$121,000.00, which will be paid in part by a Revenue Bond Issue in the amount of not more than \$64,000.00, from a General Obligation Bond Issue of \$30,000.00, and the balance, it is anticipated, will be by Grant from the Federal Government.

The foregoing estimated cost also includes inspection and fiscal expenses and interest which will accrue during the construction period and for six months thereafter on money borrowed.

Section 4: That a Special Election of the qualified electors of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, shall be, and is hereby ordered to be held in said Village on Tuesday, December 15, 1964, between the hours of 12:00 o'clock Noon and 8:00 o'clock P. M. on said date, at which election the question of the aforementioned Plan of Construction described in this Ordinance, and the payment of a part of the cost of the same by the issuance of Water-Sewer Revenue Bonds in the amount of not more than \$64,000.00, payable from the revenues of the combined Water and Sewer System, shall be submitted to the qualified registered voters of this Village, and to their assent or rejection, as provided by law. The voting place of said election will be at the Fire Hall in the Village of Kendrick, Idaho.

Such voting place, or places, and the ballot boxes therein for said Special Election will be opened at the hour of twelve o'clock, Noon, and will continue open until and be closed at the hour of eight o'clock, P. M., on said day. The voting at said election shall be by ballot and the proposition which shall be submitted thereon at said election shall be substantially in the following alternative form, viz:

"IN FAVOR OF issuing Water-Sewer Revenue Bonds for the purpose provided in Ordinance No. 522

"AGAINST issuing Water-Sewer Revenue Bonds for the purpose provided in Ordinance No. 522

If at such election two-thirds of the electors qualified and entitled to vote at said election, and voting at such election, assent to the Plan of Construction, and the payment thereof out of and from the earnings and revenues of said combined water and sewer systems of said Village, such bonds for said purpose shall be issued as provided by the Municipal Bond Law of the State of Idaho.

Section 5: Notice of said election shall be published in the KENDRICK GAZETTE, a legal newspaper printed and published at Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, and of general circulation within Kendrick, Idaho, and being the official newspaper of said Village; that said publication shall be once a week for two successive weekly issues prior to said election, said publications to be had on November 12 and 19, 1964, which shall set forth the purpose of this Ordinance, the amount of bonds authorized by it, and the maturity dates of said bonds, and the maximum rate of interest which said bonds shall bear, the voting place, or places, the hours between which the polls shall be open, the qualifications of the voters who may vote thereat, and shall refer to this Ordinance for further details and particulars, and shall be given in the name of the Village of Kendrick, by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and attested by the Clerk of said Village.

Section 6: The Village Clerk, the registrar for the Village Elections, shall register the qualified electors for said election, commencing with the date that the Notice of Election is given and first published, and thereafter as provided by law, at any time during office hours, and at any other times, all as provided by statute, and shall cause notice of registration to be given as required by law.

Section 7: Said Water-Revenue Bond Issue of not in excess of \$64,000.00 shall consist of not more than 64 coupon bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered from One (1) upward consecutively, shall run for a period of thirty (30) years from date of issue and shall mature and be payable as follows:

\$1,000.00 in each of the years 1967 to 1974, both inclusive;
 \$2,000.00 in each of the years 1975 to 1984, both inclusive;
 \$3,000.00 in each of the years 1985 to 1992, both inclusive;
 \$4,000.00 in each of the years 1993 to 1995, both inclusive;

the principal and interest of said bonds being payable solely out of and from the revenues of said combined water and sewer system, as provided for by this Ordinance, said bonds to bear a rate, or rates, of interest not exceeding five and one-half per cent (5 1/2%) per annum, payable semi-annually after date of issue, with interest coupons attached thereto evidencing the interest then payable, and shall be payable, both principal and interest, at the office of the Treasurer of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho; shall be signed by said Village by its Chairman of the Board of Trustees, countersigned by the Village Treasurer and attested by the Village Clerk, with the seal of the Village impressed upon each bond, as provided by Chapter 11 of the Session Laws of Idaho, of 1959, and the signature of the Treasurer, upon the interest coupon may be either the printed or lithographic facsimile of said of-

ficial, and consistent with the provisions to be made by subsequent Ordinance, said bonds and the interest thereon shall be payable only out of a Special Fund, or Funds.

Said bonds and interest coupons, if authorized at said special election, shall be issued against said Revenues and said Special Fund, or Funds, and shall be a valid claim of the holder thereof only as against said revenues, and said Special Fund, or Funds (after first deducting the costs of operation and maintenance of said combined systems) and the moneys required to be paid thereon, shall not constitute an indebtedness of the Village of Kendrick within the meaning of the Constitution and Laws of the State of Idaho.

Section 8: The earnings and revenues out of and from said combined systems shall be paid into a Special Fund, or Funds (hereinafter created by subsequent Ordinance) until full payment of all of said bonds, both principal and interest, after deducting the costs of operation and maintenance of said combined systems.

Section 9: In the event the bonds referred to herein are legally authorized and ordained as follows: That the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, shall not sell, lease, or in any manner dispose of any substantial part, or unit thereof, until the bonds with interest thereon shall be paid in full; that said Village (until all of said Water-Sewer Revenue Bonds and the interest thereon shall have been fully paid) shall not reduce the rates required by it for water and sewer service to consumers, so that the gross revenues of said combined systems, shall be insufficient to pay for the retirement of the principal and interest of the principal and interest of said bonds; that if at any time the gross revenues of said combined systems, or as hereafter bettered, extended or improved, shall not be sufficient to pay the costs of operation and maintenance, and the charge thereon created in favor of the bonds referred to in this Ordinance, it, the said Village shall increase its rates to such rates and amounts as will be sufficient to provide for the payment of all such costs of operation and maintenance of said combined systems, and of the Water-Sewer Revenue Bonds, referred to herein and interest thereon and other incidental costs and expenses permitted by Statute; that, in order to preserve the priority of said Special Fund, or Funds, the said Village shall not create, or permit to be created, so long as any of said bonds shall be outstanding and unpaid, any indebtedness or charge whatsoever which shall be a charge against the revenues of said combined systems superior to the charges required for retirement of said bonds and interest; and that any future charge which may be created by said Village, or authorized by the qualified electors and made payable out of the revenues of said combined systems, shall constitute a charge and lien subject to the charge and lien thereon and to the duty of the Village of Kendrick with respect to said revenues.

Section 10: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force upon its passage, approval and publication in one issue of the KENDRICK GAZETTE, a weekly newspaper published at Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, and of general circulation within said Village, and being the official newspaper of said Village.

Passed under suspension of all rules and regulations of said Board of Trustees upon which proper roll call votes were taken and duly enacted an Ordinance of this Village at a Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, held on November 3, 1964.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF A PART OF THE COST AND EXPENSE OF THE CONSTRUCTION OF ADDITIONS AND BETTERMENTS TO THE STORM AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM IN THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO, AT THE TOTAL ESTIMATED COST OF \$121,000.00, OF WHICH \$30,000.00 WILL BE RAISED BY THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS, SUBJECT, HOWEVER, TO THE APPROVAL OF THE QUALIFIED TAXPAYER ELECTORS OF THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK AT THE SPECIAL ELECTION ORDERED HEREIN; DESCRIBING SAID BONDS; PROVIDING FOR EQUAL ANNUAL TAX LEVIES AND ANNUAL BOND PRINCIPAL TAX LEVIES, FOR THE CREATION OF A SINKING FUND FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST OF SAID BONDS; CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION FOR THE SUBMISSION TO THE QUALIFIED TAXPAYER ELECTORS OF SAID VILLAGE THE QUESTION OF THE RATIFICATION OR REJECTION OF SAID BOND ISSUE AND OF SAID INDEBTEDNESS; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF SUCH ELECTION AND THE PUBLICATION THEREOF; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF KENDRICK, IDAHO:

Section 1: That the Board of Trustees of the Village of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, deem it advisable to issue municipal coupon bonds of the Village of Kendrick, Idaho, in the sum of \$30,000.00, incur a municipal indebtedness of said Village in said amount, for the purpose of paying a part of the cost of the construction of additions and betterments to the sewer system of said Village.

Section 2: That the following shall be done:

(a) The construction of additions and betterments to the storm and sanitary sewer system.
