## MISSING MAN, W. T. DAVIDSON, FOUND DEAD, TUES.

The body of W. T. (Bill) Davidson, former Kendrick resident, who disappeared from the W. S. U. campus at Pullman on Friday, Nov. 20, was found Tuesday, Dec. 2nd, in what is known as the "old Franzich barn" on Upper American Ridge, an apparent suicide.

His car, a Volkswagen convertible, was in the barn. The body was found by Dennis Driscoll, who farms the Franzich ranch.

Davidson was last seen when he drove his 1961 Volkswagen convertible off the W. S. U. campus shortly before noon, Friday, Nov. 20th. He was a graduate student at that institution. His wife, Dorothy, works as a secretary on the W. S. U. campus.

The couple came to Pullman from Ketchikan, Alaska, where he taught school, shortly before the start of this academic year.

William T. Davidson was born Jan. 24, 1927, on American Ridge. A son of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. T. Davidson, pioneer residents there. He attended school on the ridge, and for three of his high school years at Kendrick High School. He graduated from Pullman High School in 1945. He later served two years in the U. S. Navy, came back to school and graduated from the University of Idaho in 1952 or 1953. For the past three years he taught in the Ketchikan, Alaska, High school.

Mr. Davidson was married Jan. 1, 1961, at Los Angeles, Calif., to Miss Dorothy Davidson, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Davidson of Pullman.

Survivors are his wife, Dorothy; his mother, Mrs. Emma Davidson, Moscow; a half-sister, Mrs. Winifred Lande of Juneau, Alaska; a half-brother, George M. Davidson of San Francisco; two sisters, Mrs. Barbara Buchanan, Moscow, and Mrs. Betty Heaphy of Detroit, Michigan.

A Bible, a history of the congregation and other historical documents were sealed in the cornerstone of the new Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Cameron in a ceremony Sunday. Also in the copper book placed in a niche in the cornerstone by Luther Parks, chairman of the church council and congregation, were photographs of Cameron in 1900, lists containing the names of members of previous congregations and photographs of the old structure which the new church will replace.

The Rev. Theo Meske, pastor, presided at the ceremony. The marble cornerstone was donated by North-west Monument Co., Moscow.

The new building, which is about one-quarter completed, will be 76 feet by 32 feet, plus a roofed entry porch in the front. It will feature a high Gothic cedar shake roof with a coxcomb at the peak, gracefully flaring cornices and a 40-foot bell tower which will adjoin the entry porch. The outer walls of the church are of light gray pumice blocks and the high vertical windows are outlined by aluminum frames and stucco paneling. The window panes will be of frosted glass. The outer wall of the building is now completed on three sides.

The new structure is being built on the same site as the old church, which was dismantled in October. Located on a hill overlooking Cameron, the old church could be seen for miles. It was built in 1903.

Cost of the new building, which is tentatively scheduled for completion April 1, will be \$82,000, excluding the cost of painting, finishing and furnishing. It will have a seating capacity of about 200. A full basement will provide rooms for Sunday School classes and a kitchen.

The bell to be placed in the tower will be the one used in the old church. Neal Builders, Clarkston, have the contract. Architects are Pritchard & Blanton, Moscow.
