BOLD THIEVES GET \$3000 HARDWARE LOOT, TACKLE BANK

Bold thieves, working brazenly under the lights at the Abrams Hardware Co., late Saturday night or early Sunday morning, made off with more than \$3,000.00 worth of goods from the hardware store.

Entry to the Abrams Hardware was gained by prying open a large, steel-clad delivery door at the firms warehouse (or back room). From this point they gained entry to the main store by forcing the warehouse door.

Once inside, the thieves apparently began work methodically. They emptied two large trash cans and used these to carry out the merchandise from the store — or at least part of it.

Included in the loot was one .22 rifle, several electric clocks, several radios of various table styles, several electric mixers, both regular and hand (or portable) types; several waffle irons, toasters, electric irons, and similar small but expensive electrical appliances.

Moving across the aisle from this orgy the thieves took several Skill Saws, saber saws, an electric planer, electric sanders and the attachments that went with them, and electric drills.

Moving further back into the store a large number of tools, socket and box wrenches, hammers, etc., were added to the loot. Next came a new-type electric space heater, with blower, etc., and a new McCulloch chain saw.

Going still further back the thieves removed several new electric motors from a display stand, then added several storage batteries and a full rack of leather gloves to their loot.

Evidently feeling that this was about sufficient from the store, they went to the heavy tool section, chose hammers, bits and even a splitting maul, and went to work on the rear wall of the bank vault, using the balcony stairway of the hardware as the place to direct this effort.

However, after chiseling a hole perhaps six inches deep and seven inches across in the concrete and steel of the vault wall, they gave it up — and leaving the tools where they were, they dropped them, left the building, carefully closing the doors behind them.

The tracks of the pickup or panel truck used by the thieves were plainly visible in the frost at the rear of the building, so it is believed that the robbery occurred sometime near 2:00 o'clock in the morning.

Why the thieves did not try to gain entry to the vault at the store remains a mystery — although as Frank Abrams said: "There wasn't anything of real value in it, just books and a little ammunition."

The attempted entry of the bank vault automatically brings the F. B. I. into the picture, and with it real hope that the thieves will be caught.

G. HALE EBLING, CONSERVATION OFFICER, DIES MON.

Moscow — George Hale Ebling, 58, conservation officer for the Idaho Fish & Game Department for more than 21 years, died of an apparent heart attack at his Moscow home about 3:00 p. m., Monday. He had suffered a stroke at McCall about four years ago, but had made virtually a complete recovery.

Latah County Deputy Sheriff Edwin L. Pierson, who had known Ebling for more than 30 years, said he was "a legend among us who have known him."

Pierson said Ebling was one of the best bird trappers in north Idaho before he became a conservation officer "but he was always a conservationist there, too. He never depleted an area, and he understood game and wildlife as few men do."

Second District Judge Thomas H. Felton, Moscow, former chairman of the Idaho Fish & Game Commission said "Hale was a gentleman and officer of the highest standards."

Ebling was born at Chicago, Ill., March 18, 1906, and came to the Bozville area at the age of 14. He married DeLonne Malm at Elk River, June 18, 1939, at Moscow. It was she who found his body on a davenport at their home about 5:30 Monday evening.

Ebling worked in the woods for Potlatch Forests, Inc., and for the U. S. Forest Service prior to joining the Fish & Game Department in 1942. He was stationed first at Troy, then at Deary, where he lived for some 18 years until he moved to Moscow about four months ago.

Ebling was a member of the Christian Church, the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, the Bovill Masonic Lodge, the Moscow Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, the Idaho Peace Officers Ass'n, the Idaho Game and the Idaho State Employees Ass'n.

In addition to his widow he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Janice McCartney, Washougal, Wn.; Mrs. Jannette McNeal, Montpelier, Idaho, and Mrs. Claudia Johnson, Sparks, Nevada; his stepmother, Mrs. Nettie Ebling, Memphis, Mo.; two brothers, Clark of Kansas City, Mo., and William of Gorin, Mo., and a sister, Mrs. Lena Mallett, Sedalia, Mo. The body is at Short's Chapel in Moscow.

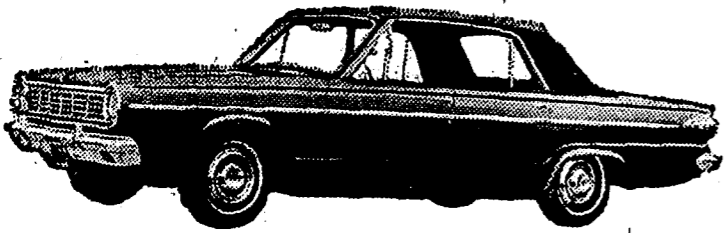

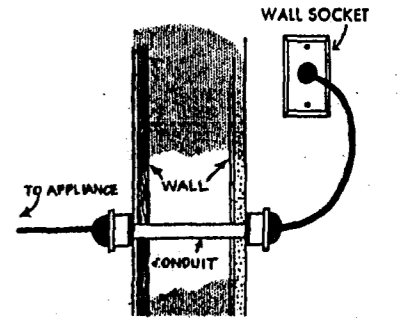

QUESTION: I've encountered a lot of trouble with broken drill bits when removing them from heavy material. How can I avoid this?
ANSWER: If enough care is exercised in the use of portable electric drills, there need be no broken bits.

However, one of the newer drills for the home or farm workshop was designed with removal of bits in mind. It has a 1/2-inch capacity and is called a reversible portable electric drill.



Outdoor electrical outlet easily installed.

When boring with this drill, neat removal is assured by using the reversing switch. The drill bit will zip out as easily as it went in—no damage, no broken bits.

QUESTION: Whenever work outside our home requires an electrical outlet, I have to string an extension cord out a window or door. Is there a way to install an outlet outdoors without getting involved in a lot of rewiring?
ANSWER: A way to solve this problem is to install an outlet that, in essence, is an extension right through the siding or foundation of your home.

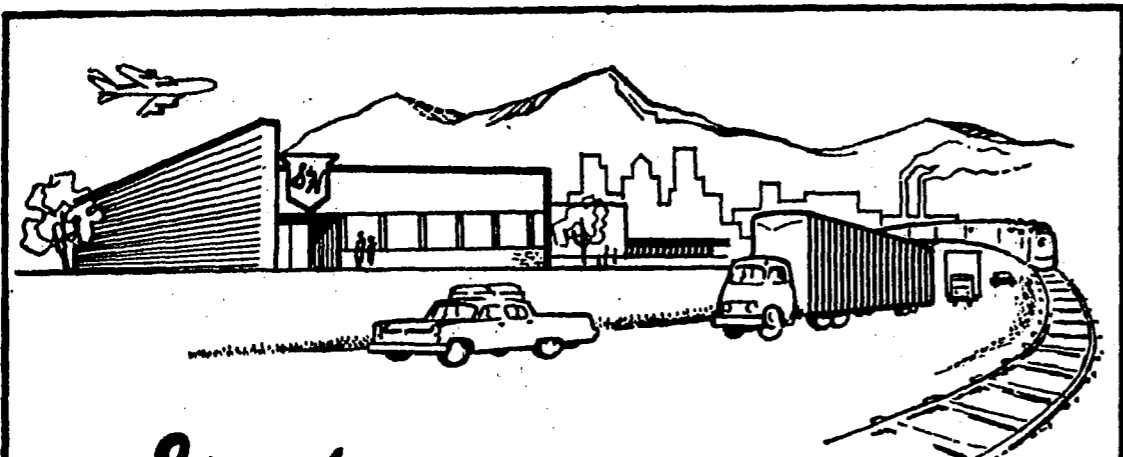
This can be done easily by using a reversible electric drill to bore a 3/4-inch hole through an area of wall that is both convenient for your outdoor work and close to an electrical outlet inside the house. A kit is available to complete the outlet. Here's how it works:

Measure the length of the hole and use a piece of 1/2-inch conduit to cover about an inch more than the measured area. In addition to the conduit, you use male and female plugs, housing for them, proper wire, rubber washers, and connectors.

Affix wires to male plug screws and attach the plug, for inside use, to the conduit, pushing wires through tubing to the outside.

Rubber washer is used to seal portion of hole uncovered by conduit and base for plugs and housing. Attach female plugs to wires outside. Male plug is to be connected to wall with extension cord. The female plug is connected to appliance with drop cord.

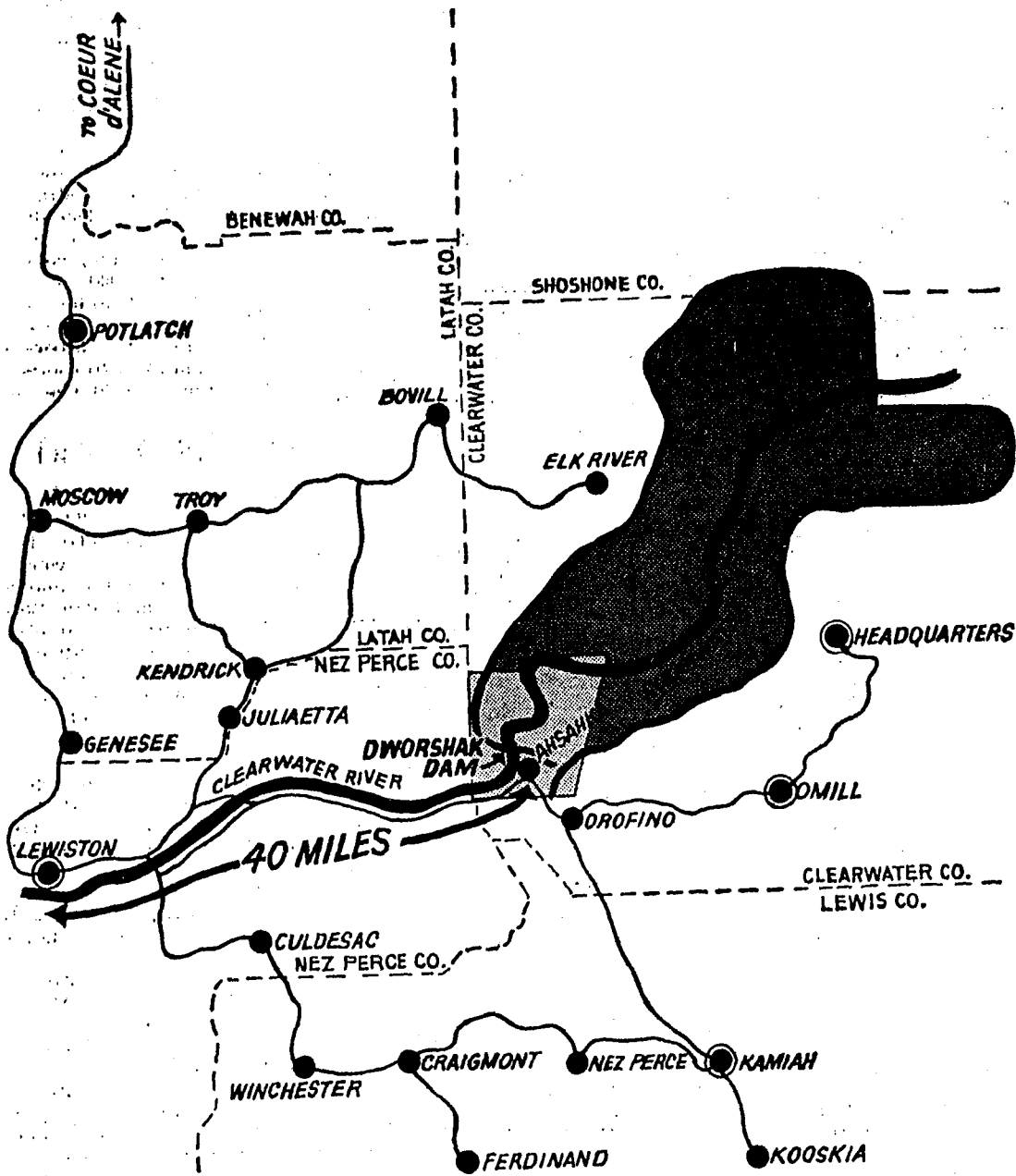

SNOW SURVEY IS UNDERWAY NOW

Moscow — The first of the monthly snow surveys for the 1964-65 season was carried out by Fred Chugg, Soil Conservation Service, and Vanie Penton, University of Idaho engineering experiment station. The trip of Nov. 28 for all snow courses on Moscow Mountain required chains and four-wheel drive to complete the three-hour trip.
 The depth of snow on the Moscow Mountain course was 13.6 inches, which is 4.7 inches more than last year and 2.7 inches above the last seven year average of 11.1 inches. However, the water content is the same as last year at 2.1 inches and below the seven-year average by 0.7 inches for this date.
 The remaining four courses are East Twin, which has 10.4 inches of snow containing 17 inches of water; West Twin with 9.1 inches of snow and 1.5 inches of water; Howard Creek with 8.3 inches of snow and 1.0 inches of water, and Crumarine Creek with 8.1 inches snow and 1.2 inches of water. Compared to last year's report these same four courses had a trace, to scattered snow cover.
 The snow survey will continue on the first of each month through May 1st. It is conducted through the cooperative efforts of Prof. C. C. Warnick, University of Idaho experiment station; the Soil Conservation Service, and the Latah Soil Conservation district supervisors.

 Main emphasis this year of the National 4-H Safety program has been safe use of household chemicals and drugs, reports the National 4-H Safety Development Committee.
 Throughout the state, 4-H Club members and leaders have alerted families and communities to the dangers that misuse of common household products can cause.
 There are at least 250,000 chemicals and drugs for home use that would be harmful if improperly used, they warn. These include everyday items such as cleaning aids, cosmetics, medicines, paints and insecticides.
 They point out that in one year more than 1,300 deaths resulted from accidental home poisoning, of which 30 per cent were children under 5 years of age. Another 200,000 persons suffered disabling illnesses.
 This year marks the 20th anniversary of the 4-H safety program sponsored by General Motors in cooperation with the Extension Service and the National 4-H Service Committee. Safety program membership is around one-half million.
 During this time hundreds of clubs have been cited for conducting life-saving community projects, and thousands of boys and girls have been individually recognized for doing an excellent job in promoting safety, the committee reports.
 The 4-H'er with the best project in the state will be the 1964 safety delegate to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. Medals will be presented to four county champions, while eight members from across the nation will receive \$500 college scholarships. Clubs also will be honored for outstanding local safety programs.
 Enrollment for the 1965 program begins this fall. Traffic safety will predominate. However, numerous projects will be carried out in the home and on the farm involving other vital areas of safety.

All electors of said Village having the qualifications to vote at general elections for the election of Village officers of said Village, and who are taxpayers of said Village, are entitled to vote at the election herein noticed. 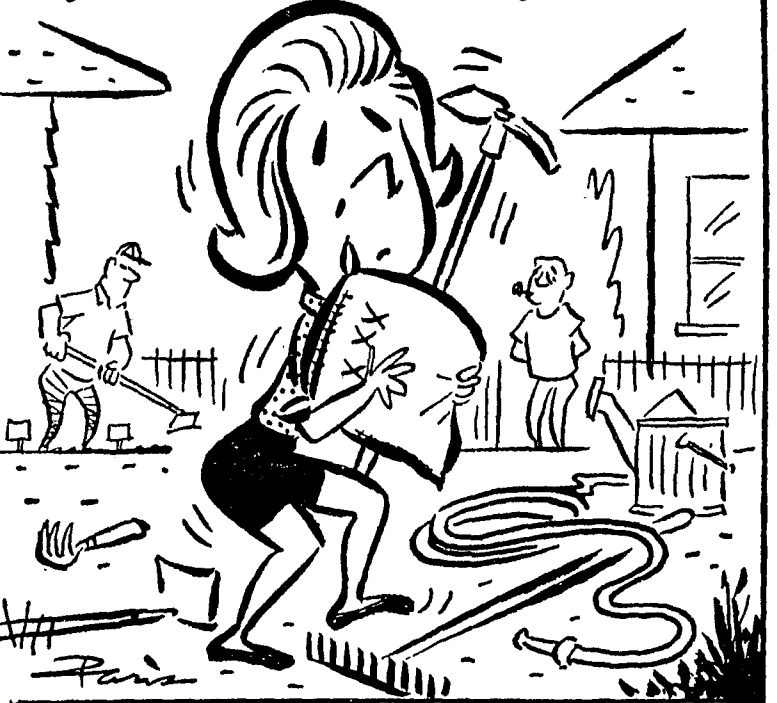

IDAHO GROWS LOTS OF GRASS SEED

Moscow — Idaho grows more grass seed than is generally realized, Homer Futter, county extension agent, noted this week on the basis of a report by Harold Finnell, manager of the Idaho Crop Improvement Association.

Twenty-four varieties on a total of 6,300 acres met certification requirements. Excellent seed is available from growers to specialize in top quality production, Finnell said. Most of the production is in northern Idaho. Kootenai county leads with 2,800 acres. Nez Perce is second with 430.

Merion Kentucky Bluegrass, a turf grass, is the top variety in acreage. Slightly more than 2,000 acres were inspected in 1964. Greener Intermediate Wheatgrass was second with 881 acres, and Latah Orchardgrass was third with 590 acres. Other varieties with more than 100 acres each were Delta Kentucky Bluegrass, Newport Kentucky Bluegrass, Manchur Smooth Brome, Alta Tall Fescue, and Topar Pubescent Wheatgrass.

Grass seed accounts for only about five percent of Idaho's total seed certification, the report said, but the crop commands increasing attention because Idaho seed is highly regarded in states where most of the production is marketed.

Teenagers Learn to Bake Bread in 4-H

Today's young teenagers are plunging right into homemaking tasks and enjoying outstanding success. For example, 13-year old Annette Eachor, a 4-H Club member, already has spent three years on various food projects.

Loves to Bake

Her favorite is baking bread, seven loaves at a time. Not only do her parents and two younger sisters enjoy the freshly baked bread, but so do friends and neighbors. Annette manages to find time to bake and sell bread.

Her recipe printed here is easy to follow, says Annette. She is one of more than a half-million 4-H members from Maine to California who are participating in the national 4-H bread program conducted by the Extension Service and sponsored by Standard Brands.

WHITE BREAD (Sponge Method)
Makes 7 Loaves

- 1 pkg. active dry yeast
- 3 1/2 cups warm water (105°-115°F.)
- 4 tablespoons sugar
- Dissolve yeast with water in a bowl. Add sugar. Stir until dissolved. Stir 6 cups sifted flour into mixture. Cover and let rise in a warm place until bubbly on top. Then add:
- 2 cups scalded milk—cooled to lukewarm
- 4 tablespoons melted shortening
- 2 tablespoons salt
- 12 cups sifted flour

Knead dough until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl and let rise until double in bulk. Divide into 7 equal portions. Let rest 10 minutes. Shape into loaves and place in greased pans. Let rise again until double in size. Bake at 350° for 40-45 minutes. Remove from pans and cool.

Tested recipes and baking guides are furnished by the sponsor along with county, state and national awards. The youthful cooks not only learn to bake bread by modern methods, but they also try out recipes for raised coffee cakes, rolls, doughnuts and fancy holiday breads.

Shows Others How

Demonstrations and contests are part of the program. Meal planning, nutrition and balanced diets are studied and put into practice. Success with bread plus general 4-H accomplishments can earn for the member an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in



"Kneading the bread dough is a very important step in bread baking," says 4-H'er Annette Eachor, "and it's as easy as it looks. All it takes is a little practice."

Chicago and a \$500 college scholarship given by Standard Brands. County winners receive medals.

Annette is not yet eligible to compete for the state trip award, but next year when she is 14, she can try. The pretty brunette gets plenty of encouragement at home because her mother was a 4-H member and attended the Chicago congress as winner in a dairy foods project.

Any girl or boy can join a 4-H Club. Depending upon the local club, a member can start on bread immediately or gradually work up to the project in connection with other foods projects.
