**Arl Burns, Former Resident, Dies**  
Arl Burns, 72, a retired employe of the State Highway Department and a resident of Orofino since 1950, died at 2:40 Monday afternoon at Clearwater Valley Hospital, Orofino, where he had been a patient eight days. Death was attributed to cancer. He had undergone surgery at Spokane about two months ago.

He was born June 10, 1892, at Bolivar, Mo., a son of Mr. and Mrs. James Burns. He moved with his parents to New Mexico in 1900. Two years later they moved to Rocky Ford, Colo., and to St. John, Wash., in 1908. He completed his schooling at St. John and farmed with his father.

In 1912 he moved to Fix Ridge, near Juliaetta, where he bought a farm and operated it until 1928.

He married Cora Weatherby Dec. 7, 1913. She died Feb. 18, 1945, at Juliaetta. In 1928 he sold his farm and they moved to Juliaetta, where he operated a truck farm. He moved to Orofino in 1950, where he was employed by the Highway Department until his retirement five years ago.

He married Naomi Walrath at Orofino Dec. 9, 1953. She died in 1957.

He was a member of the Lewiston Elks Lodge and the United Brethren Church at Juliaetta.

Survivors are four daughters, Mrs. Lawrence (Marcella) Wilson, Astoria; Mrs. Ray (Virginia) Splawn, Spokane; Mrs. Earl (Jean) Parks of Stayton, Ore.; and Mrs. Floyd (Betty) Heimgartner, Juliaetta; a son, Robert, superintendent of schools at Bonners Ferry; a stepson, T. M. Walrath, Orofino; a sister, Mrs. Gordon Penland, Juliaetta; 13 grandchildren, six step-grandchildren and a great-grandchild. Members of the family suggest that memorial contributions may be made to any charitable organization.

Funeral services will be at 11 a. m. Saturday at Gilbert's Chapel, Orofino. The Rev. M. Warren Haines, pastor of the Orofino Nazarene Church will officiate. Burial will be in the Fix Ridge Cemetery at 2 p. m.

Schools of the district were in session again Tuesday, with Christmas programs all held that day. The Juliaetta and Southwick Elementary program were held Tuesday afternoon and the Jr. and Sr. High School Christmas musical at 8:00 Tuesday evening.

The Elementary schools were dismissed for vacation at 2:00 o'clock on Wednesday, and the Kendrick Jr. and Sr. High at 2:20. Schools will reopen on Monday morning, January 4th.

## AH, WEATHER, WE HAVE BEEN REALLY GETTING OUR SHARE

The weather here this past week has "been something to write home about" or "not to write home about" depending on the point of view — but we certainly have had winter in all its worst aspects.

Thursday dawned clear and cold — yes, "cold," the "official" thermometer recording a low of 18 below zero and a high of 8 above — for the same reading as recorded by the U. S. Weather Bureau at Lewiston. This is somewhat unusual, for Lewiston generally records about 3 degrees warmer than Kendrick, summer and winter.

Friday the low was 2 above, and the high 14 above.

We might add that Friday, during the cold snap, it was common to see cars and trucks of all makes and description being towed or pushed on the streets in an effort to get their motors running — and local garages did a "land office business" in snow tires and tractionizing service — not to mention sales of de-icers for gas lines and light motor oils.

Saturday the low was 18 above, and as the temperature rose to 30 above, about 2:30 p. m., rain began to fall, and as it hit the snow-covered ground turned into ice!

Sunday, with the temperature at 34 degrees above, snow began to fall and continued until between four and five more inches "decorated" the area.

Monday, with the temperature at 32 degrees some snow fell, and then at about 8:30 a. m. a pouring rain began, which turned streets and highways into icy slush.

**Schools Forced To Close**  
The snow and bitter cold of Wednesday and Thursday of last week forced the closing of all schools in Joint District No. 283, and in most of the adjoining districts.

Wednesday and Thursday snow plows operated at capacity, but in some sections they proved incapable of opening the roads. On Little Bear ridge a bulldozer owned and operated by Ellis Anderson did the job, supplemented by the Kendrick Highway District plows.

On Big Bear ridge the huge D-8 Cat belonging to Everett Farrington did the work the Highway District plows were unable to do. From Big Bear ridge the Cat went to Texas ridge to open the snow-plugged roads. On Friday, with roads open and temperatures moderate, school busses again made their rounds, and school was held as usual.

As a result of the snows of Saturday and Sunday plows were again in continuous operation, and with the aid of sanding trucks were able to keep traffic moving.

Monday morning school took up as usual, but as the pouring rain continued, and the snow-floor on the roads began to soften and loose all bottom, it was deemed best to send the busses and their loads of children home while safe travel was still possible.

Tuesday morning saw the pelting rain of Monday afternoon and night continue with the temperature rising 34 degrees. Streets were a sea of slush where they had not been plowed. In some sections roads were described as "bare," in others "deep with slush." School busses were able to travel, so it was "school as usual." The Potlatch river was rising rapidly, but still well below flood stage.

**THREE SUFFER BROKEN BONES**  
Becky Eichner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald Eichner fractured the large bone in her left arm in a coasting accident last Thursday on the north slope of the school house hill. The injured arm was placed in a cast at the office of Dr. D. A. Christensen.

Mrs. Irene Millard fell on ice near the Hattie Lohman home in west Kendrick Saturday, breaking a leg below the knee. She was taken to the St. Joseph's Hospital at Lewiston and is recuperating satisfactorily.

Mrs. Don Cantril of Southwick fell while crossing the street between the Thurber & Olderness store and the Variety & Gift store Wednesday of last week, breaking the small bone in one ankle. She is on crutches but getting about.

Dr. Christensen reduced the fractures in both cases.

## CHRISTMAS LETTER FROM TODD NELSON IN PEACE CORPS

Todd Nelson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Nelson, who is with the Peace Corps, and stationed in Colombia, South America, has written the following very interesting letter, and we believe it should be shared with all who know him. The letter was enclosed in a Colombia Christmas Card — most unusual by our standards, and it may be seen at the Gazette:

Cuerpo de Paz  
Yolomb'o, Antioquia  
Colombia, South America  
December 7, 1964  
Felices Pasquas,

Everyone says it is Christmas time, but it is still Spring or early Summer here. By the way, "here" is a small Colombian mountain town called Yolomb'o in the department of Antioquia. The land is beautiful rolling mountains at 5,000 feet in a subtropical climate. We have 10 feet of rain annually. But during the dry season — from mid-December until March — there is not a drop of rain. And the Choco (The Pacific coast department due West of Antioquia has over 300 inches of rainfall annually.

The Antioquians are a friendly, hard working people. The land is mostly poor and usually too steep for efficient cultivation. The main agriculture is cana (A sugar cane), coffee, cattle, pigs, and beans. Although the land is supposedly the poorest in Colombia, the Antioquians are the best off, making a reasonable living.

The Antioquians are eager to improve their living conditions so we really enjoy working with them. So far, our main work has been in helping the people build rural one-room schools. There are many small communities (veredas) which are a long ways from town, always via a trail. I have met several teen-age boys in isolated and scattered communities who are entirely illiterate. They are intelligent, well-mannered, and neatly dressed; however, their parents just could not afford the expense of sending them "out" to school. They are now the very ones working hardest for getting a school in the vereda. Sadly, rural communities without any school facilities are not at all uncommon in Colombia.

The Colombian government is working towards getting more schools, but it is a tremendous task.

To date, our main sources of funds outside the veredas have been the local and national governments, Alianza para el Progreso, and the National Federation of Coffee Growers. There is a new program recently started in the United States called "School to School" in which an American school donates \$1,000 to be used for a Colombian school. It is still a small program, but it could be very effective and provide much-needed funds. When the people themselves do the work, a rural school can be built for \$1,000 and that is including the furnishings.

Bogota is a large metropolis located on a long, narrow plateau about 8,000 feet high. The Colombians all say Bogota is very cold since it has a year-round temperature of 50 to 60 degrees. The city is well-known for its excellent restaurants at reasonable prices. Although there are many foreigners in Bogota, it is still a very Latin city.

My favorite city is Medellin, the capitol of Antioquia. It is located in a large, deep canyon surrounded on all sides by high, green mountains that are never snow-capped. The airport is the second best in Colombia, but the approach is so hazardous that only the very smallest of jets can land. Even DC-3's have a rough time landing. However, there has never been a crash. But few American pilots are allowed to land commercial flights at most Colombian airports (excepting at Bogota) because they are nearly all treacherously located.

Medellin is busily rebuilding its entire business section. Although smaller than Bogota, there is far more construction in Medellin. The people take a special pride in keeping their city beautifully clean and in good repair. Although the foreign population is relatively small, the city is very cosmopolitan. There are numerous modern restaurants with excellent service, and recently several small pastry shops have been opened.

A ride on the railroad between the Magdalena River and Medellin is one of the greatest experiences available. The narrow gauge trains, pulled by shining black steam engines, chug along through deep, green valleys across the middle range of the Andes. At the divide you take about ten minutes to go through the longest tunnel in South America. Several times a month my partner and I travel along this route to the Eastern side of the divide and then go up to the summit of the canyon to Yolomb'o.

Most of the time we make the trip to Medellin via a cambo bus instead of by train. It is quite different and always interesting. The cambo busses

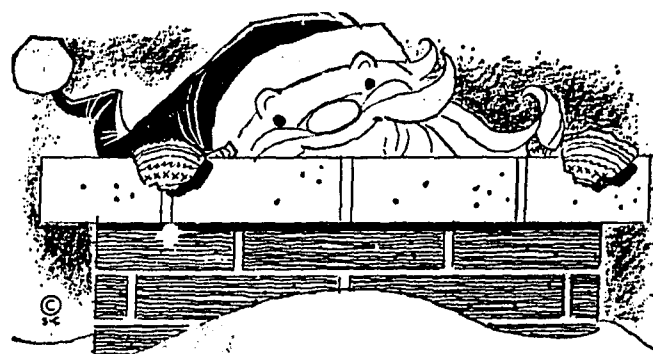

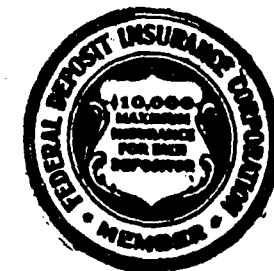

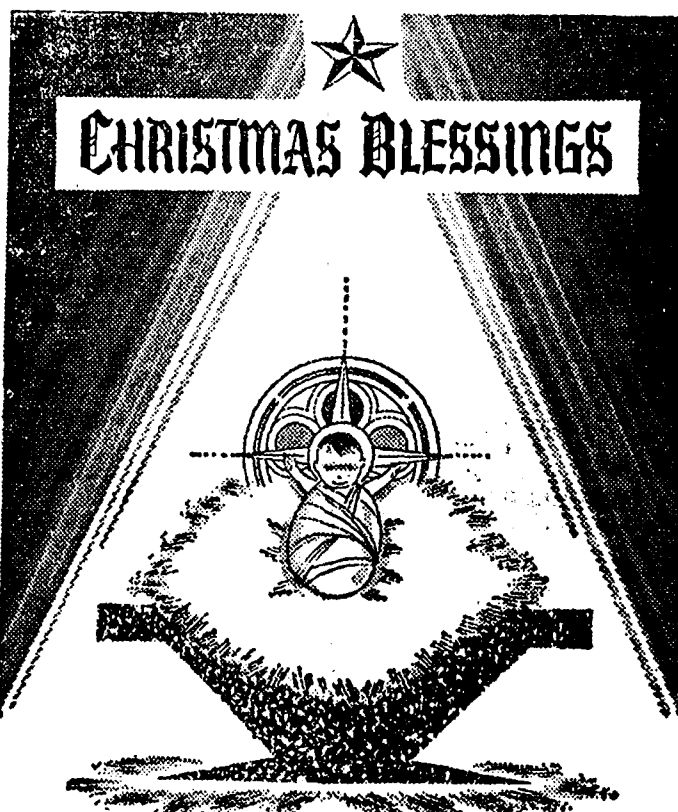

**USE SEAT BELTS**

Chicago — Facial injuries in automobile accidents usually are caused

by hitting the windshield or dash, and can be avoided with the proper use of seat belts. A study of 110 accidents in which 150 people were killed showed that being thrown

from the car caused the most deaths. Seat belt would have kept many of these people alive, according to the experts.

**POWER COMPANY TO SPEND MILLIONS ON IMPROVEMENTS**

Spokane — Almost \$10 million has been budgeted by the Washington Water Power Company for expansion and improvements next year in the utility's eastern Washington and northern Idaho service area, according to George M. Brunzell, president. Biggest items in the 1965 program are \$1,193,000 to complete the 230,000-volt Noxon Rapids-Hot Springs transmission line and \$702,000 to be invested in the development of underground natural gas storage facilities near Chehalis, Wash. The Montana transmission line

will connect the facilities of W. W. P. with those of the Montana Power Co. This interconnection will eventually become a part of a 570-mile, high capacity transmission network designed to further coordination of five investor-owned utility systems — W. W. P. Co., Montana Power Co., Idaho Power Co., Utah Power & Light and Pacific Power & Light. Total cost of the project is estimated at \$22 million.

Brunzell said the company will spend nearly \$1 million to improve its electrical system serving an area from Moscow to Grangeville, Idaho. "Our program includes increased capacity for transmission lines, new substations and increased capacity at existing substations, and new lines," he said.

W. W. P. celebrated its 75th anniversary in 1964, and Brunzell pointed out that in those 75 years, the company has made many significant contributions to the progress of the electric industry.

"Only the old-timers remember that W. W. P. was one of the first utilities to transmit electric power over long distances, that we made one of the first inter-connections in the United States, that when the Long-Lake dam was built it was the biggest hydroelectric plant in the world. W. W. P. employees helped develop the first successful electric range, the first workable electric hot water heater, the first electric refrigeration unit, pioneer farm electrification and farm power use. We developed sources of electric power and then went out and sold our customers on using that power."

Brunzell said that the growth of the company and its contributions to the development of the 26,000-square mile area it serves can be seen in the fact that just ten years ago, in 1954, the company's total plant investment was \$138 million, and in 194 the plant investment went over the \$300 million mark.

**"BEAR FACTS" NOW BEING STUDIED**

Yellowstone Natl. Park — The "Bear Facts" about hibernation habits in Yellowstone National Park will be studied this winter. A huge grizzly bear has been equipped with an electronic watch and a tiny transmitter to determine whether he really sleeps through the winter. If the animal moves anywhere in the 3,458 square-mile park, researchers will be able to track him by monitoring the sound broadcast by a tiny tuning fork in the watch.

**PUMICE POPULAR**

Chicago — Pumice, a volcanic rock used in building by the ancient Romans, still is popular. U. S. consumption of the bubble-pocked rock, light enough to float, was 2.3 million tons last year. Builders claim the material has excellent acoustical and insulation properties.

**ALIENS REQUIRED TO REGISTER**

Wash. D. C. — District Director R. G. Hoffeller of the Immigration and Naturalization service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future.

All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of the month. Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement:

(1) accredited diplomats; (2) persons accredited to certain international organizations; and (3) Those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any post office or immigration and naturalization service office during the month

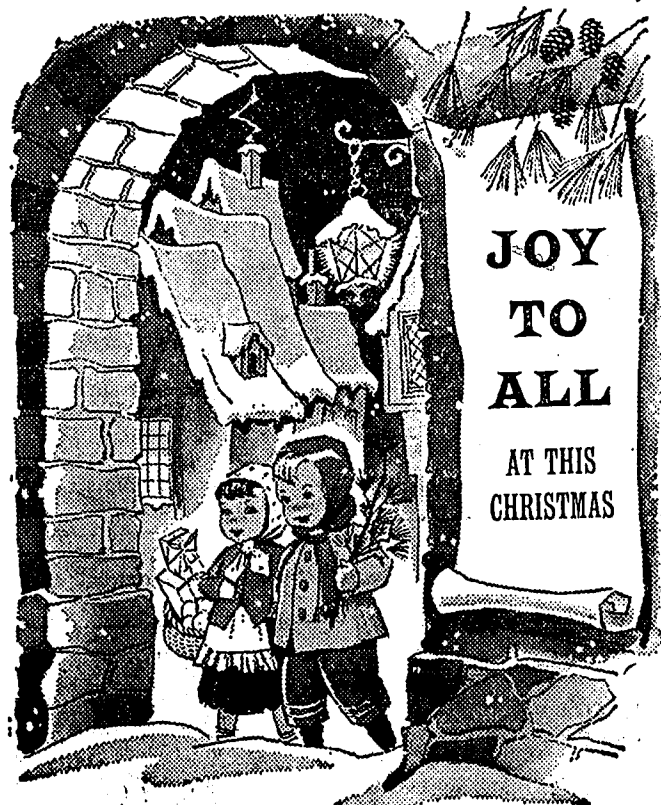
of January. Mr. Hoffeller said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

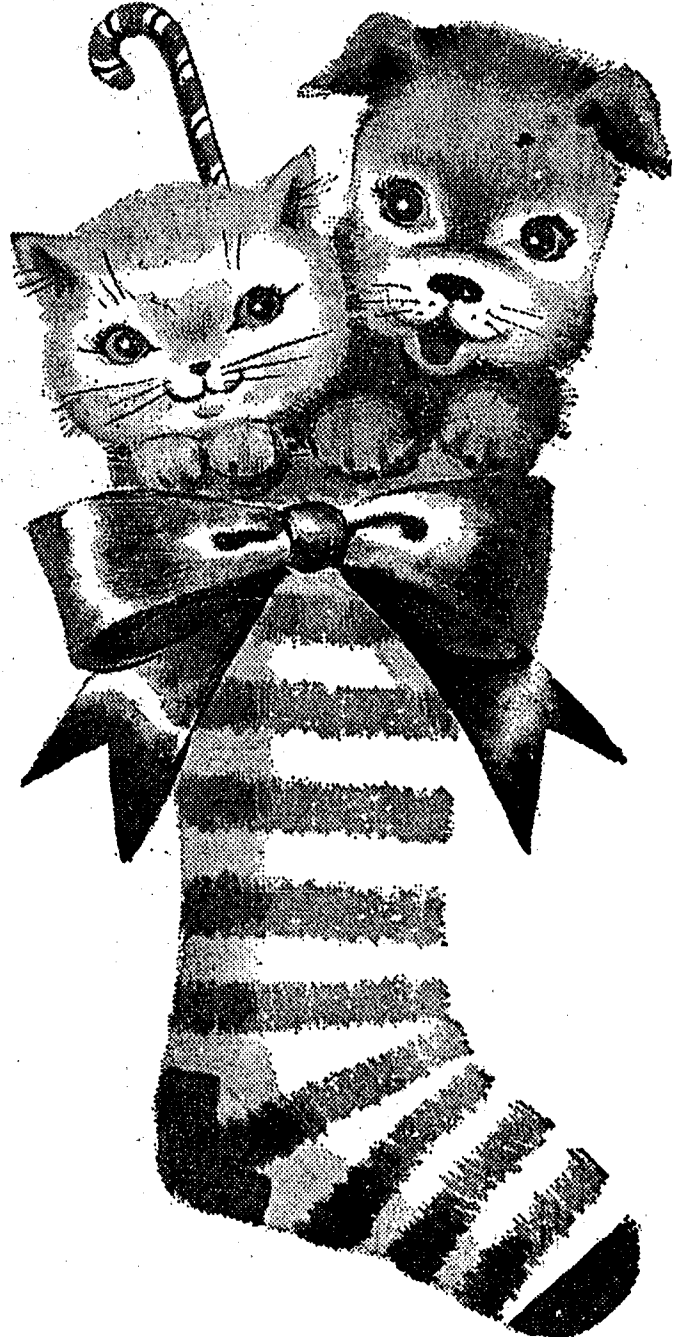

**CENSUS SAYS THAT TRADE IS UP IN \$'S**

Wash., D. C. — Latah county's 206 retail establishments had \$30.9 million in sales in 1963, an increase of 31 percent from 1958, the U. S. Bureau of the Census has just reported after tabulating data gather-

ed from all firms in the 1963 census of business. The last previous business census was in 1958.

Retail trade in the county meant jobs (exclusive of proprietors) for 931 men and women and a yearly payroll of \$2.9 million.

In volume of business the county's food stores had sales of \$7.3 million, an increase of 62 percent from 1958. In other retail business, the county's

eating and drinking places had sales of \$1.6 million, and gasoline service stations had sales of \$2.3 million. Auto dealers and related retail trade establishments had sales of \$5.7 million. General merchandise group stores had sales of \$3 million, and lumber, building materials, hardware and farm equipment dealers had sales of \$5.5 million.

For the state as a whole, the census bureau reported 7,311 retail establishments had sales of \$947 million, up 16 percent from 1958.

Census reports to be issued during the next few months will give state and county figures on wholesale and service trades, manufacturers and mineral industries.

**U. OF I. RECEIVES SCIENCE GRANTS**

U. of I., Moscow, A total of \$141,860 has been granted by the National Science Foundation to the University of Idaho for two science and mathematics institutes, to be held next summer, it was announced today by President D. R. Theophilus.

One hundred- and- ten high school and junior high school teachers will receive stipends under the grants to attend the institutes. Each student will be awarded up to \$75 a week for the eight-week courses plus allowances for dependents.

The Science and Mathematics institute, headed by Dr. Edgar H. Grahn, will be held for the ninth con-

secutive year. Seventy-five students most of them continuing on a three-year program leading to master's degrees in natural science, will attend the institute. A total of more than 500 stipends have been awarded during the years, and more than 100 will have completed their master's work by the end of the coming summer session.

Dr. Delmer L. Boyer heads the specialized Mathematics institute, which will be held for the sixth consecutive summer. Thirty-five students will again participate in this program, and will be awarded similar stipends to those of the Science and Mathematics institute.

Competition for attendance at the institutes is keen, with the university each year receiving more than 2,000 applications.

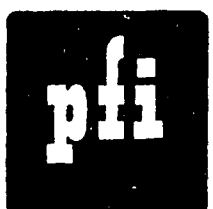

**POTLATCH BOOMING LICENSES BE SOLD WATER EVERYWHERE ON JANUARY 9TH STILL RAINING**

Under the impact of almost 48 hours of continuous rain, and a night temperature of 42 degrees, the Potlatch river and its tributaries, Big and Little Bear creeks were really on the move Wednesday morning, although not quite at the danger point as we go to press.

In Kendrick the new home of Mrs. Jessie Bateman, situated at the rear of the former Frank Crocker home, now occupied by Virgil Dygert and family, some four inches of water covered the floor, due, apparently, to a clogged storm drain which allowed water running off the school house hill, to make a lake of the area. The tanks of the Kendrick Rochdale Co. were almost completely surrounded by water up to a foot in depth, and water was lapping at the edge of the Forestry Service building.

Mrs. Bateman has left her home, and her sons piled her furniture as high as possible above the water.

A slide between the C. H. Fry home and the Bear creek bridge has blocked that road. Other slides are reported as numerous, and motorists are urged to use the utmost caution. A slide of trees, brush and mud caused by rushing waters and the thaw came down at the rear of the Walter Brocke home on Main Street, threatening to fill their back yard and basement with mud and water. Efforts were being made to turn the torrent as we go to press.

In the east part of Kendrick the Brown Trailer Court, the Ed. Brown home and the Kathryn Morey home have miniature lakes around them. Further out across Bear creek, the Dick Pippin home and the Bertha Anderson home are almost completely surrounded by water, and a part of Muscat Field is under water.

Johnson homes have water in their back yards, and the gymkhana grounds of the Ridge Riders Saddle Club are covered inches deep. Contrary to some reports, the Mead & Howard sawmill has but little water in their yards and appears in no danger.

A last-minute call said the upper Cedar Creek bridge at Cedar ridge was completely awash.

We could go on and on, but there are so many rumors that cannot be confirmed, that it is felt best not to attempt a full report on conditions. Due to road conditions no school was held Wednesday!

**SONIC BOOMS TO BE STUDIED IN N. M.**

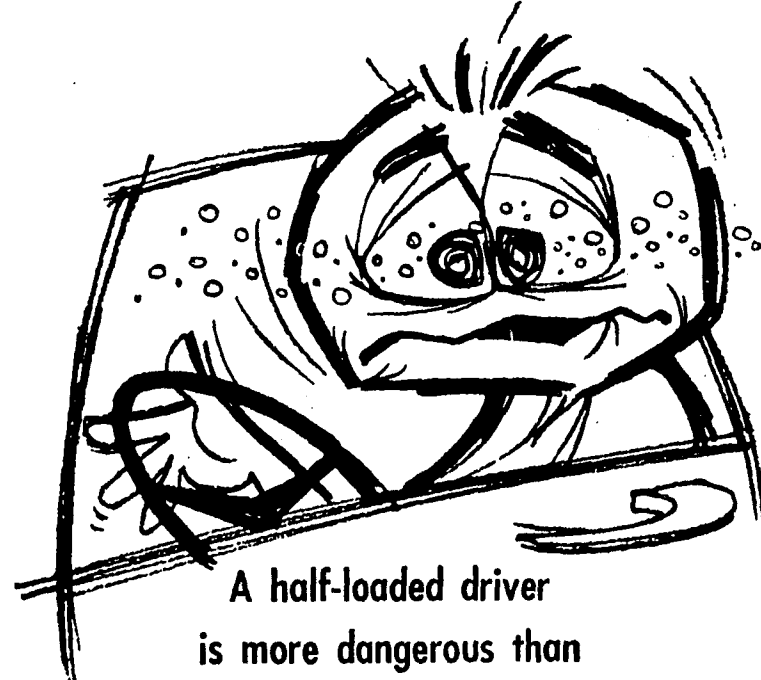

The tests are an essential element of the national supersonic transport development program, according to the FAA, which recently conducted a study of public reactions to the sonic booms.

Chicago — Olympic athletes will be in for a surprise when they get to Mexico City for the 1968 games, says the American Medical Association. The high altitude will have virtually no effect on sprinters, but long distance runners will turn in considerably slower performances than normal because long runs require a continuous and abundant supply of oxygen. 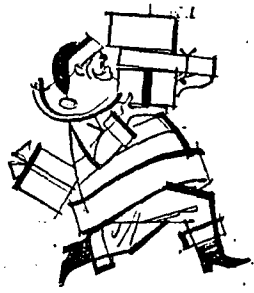

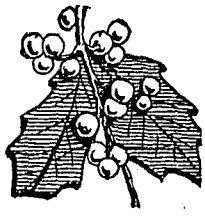

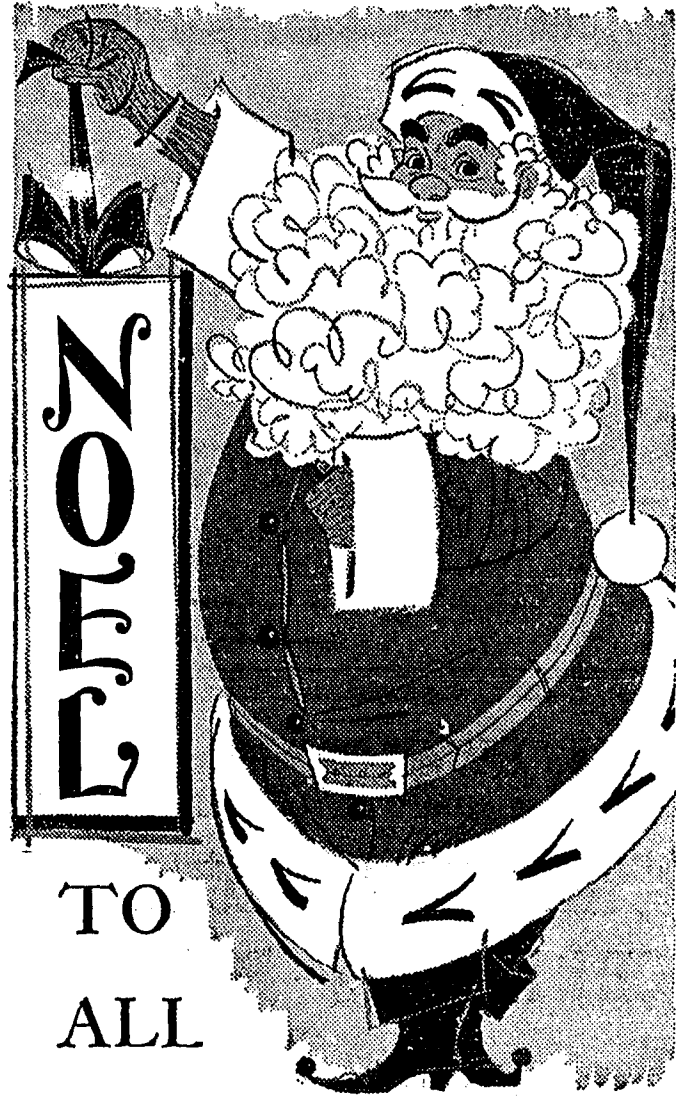

make maximum use of all available space by using special made wooden bodies. The seats, including the front one for the driver and four passengers, extend the entire width of the bus with all entrances on the right hand side. Most buses have from 6 to 8 rows with 5 to 7 adults fitting in each row. Many of the passengers, including my partner and I, carry lots of small baggage which conveniently fits under the seat or around one's feet. But be careful about stepping on a package, it just might contain several chickens. Larger baggage and over-flow passengers get a ride on top where it is much smoother riding and cleaner. But do beware of low hanging wires and sudden stops.

The people like to talk to gringos and are very glad to help one with his Spanish. When we first arrived here, they were always careful to talk slowly and helped us improve our spoken Spanish. Although a relatively small country, Colombians have several regional accents and idioms. The Antioquianians are especially noted for theirs which we have proceeded to pick up.

U. of I., Moscow — Christmas vacation for 5,175 University of Idaho students, began officially at 5:00 p. m., Friday, December 18.

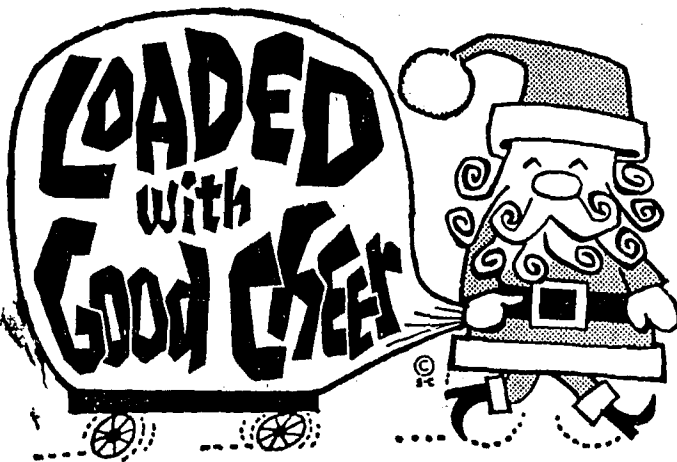

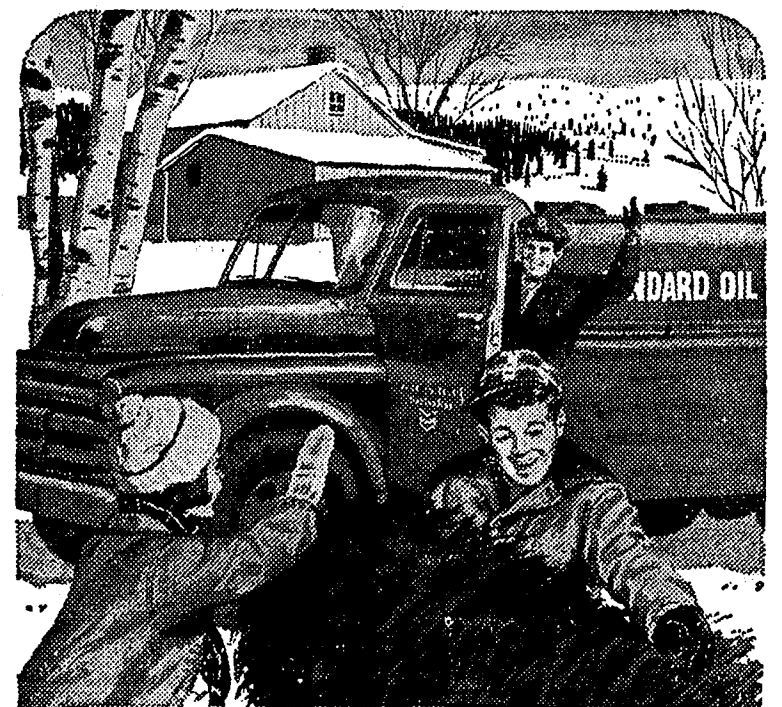
