By the way, "here" has "been something to write home is a small Colombian mountain town about" or "not to write home about" called Yolomb'o in the department depending on the point of view — of Antioquia. The land is beautiful rolling mountains at 5,000 feet in a subtropic climate. We have 10 feet of rain annually. But during the dry season - from mid-December until

The Antioquanians are a friendly, hard working people. The land is mostly poor and usually too steep for efficient cultivation. the main agriculture is cana (A sugar cane), coffee, cattle, pigs, and beans. Although the land is supposedly the poorest in Colombia, the Antioquanians are the best off, making a reasonable living.

The Antioquanians are egar to improve their living conditions so we really enjoy working with them. helping the people build rural oneroom schools. There are many small
communities (veredas) which are a
long ways from town, always via a
trail. I have met several teen- age
