

## DIST. AND OTHERS FACE FUND CUTS

From the office of Supt. James V. Muscat comes the following information on the proposed distribution of school funds by the state:

Kendrick will not receive any more noney under the New Formula than they are now receiving. This year Kendrick will receive \$69,839.68 from the state and county towards education. This is with an appropriation of \$40 million. The Legislature is discussing appropriations of \$55 to \$60 million, and Kendrick Joint District will not receive any more. This is due to the Formula now under discussion.

Kendrick is not the only district to receive less — there are many — "ll small. For example, Latah county schools — Potlatch, Genesee, Kendrick and Whitepine are "all on the floor" or not receiving their share ith the extra amount being considered for distribution this coming biennium.

There are many questions: Just what schools are getting the money? The answer to that is very simple. The big school districts within the state are getting the majority of the money being distributed. With the formula based on sparsity only, the small schools are not getting an equal share of any new money, because the sparsity is not great enough. It is common knowledge that the larger the class the less expensive it is to teach (the pupil cost ratio is less).

Another factor thart has hurt the small schools is the equalization mill levy. Dr. Raymond Berry, in his formula, had it at 15 mills, but now that has been changed to 22 mills. This makes a difference of approximately \$17,500 less to this district.

With any school district, one must develop a program that best fits the students of that community. The trustees, teachers and administration have tried to do just that. 




