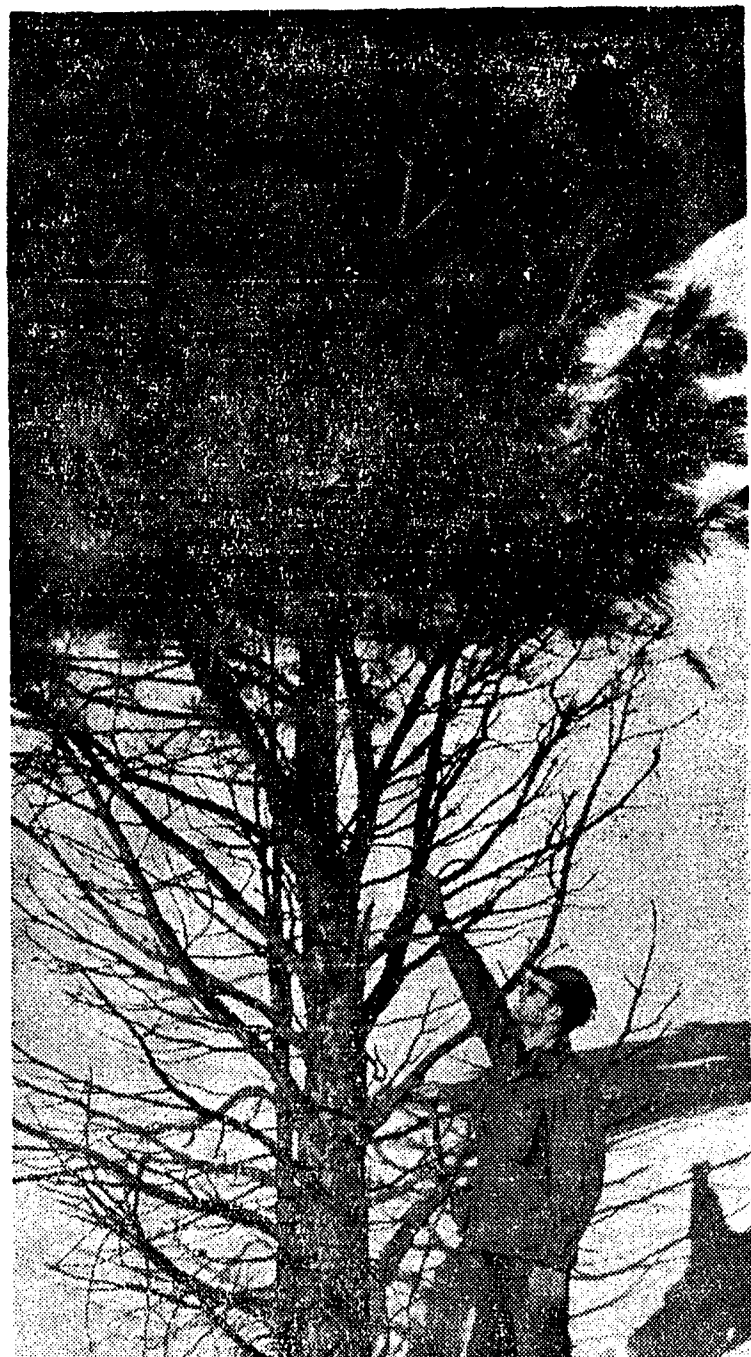

**DEER SUFFER FOOD LACK IN WINTER**

Boise — Over-used winter ranges result in high-lined trees like this, even though pines are poor deer feed. Big game animals — deer in this case — have stripped the tree of green needles as high as they can reach. Fawns suffer most because they cannot reach as high as mature animals. When sharing winter range with deer, elk of course have the advantage because of their greater reach.

Artificially feeding big game animals is unwise because only a relatively small number of animals can be fed during any feeding operation, and because the concentrated animals cause long-term damage to the range. Moreover, the digestive system of big game animals seldom are ready to handle the artificial feeds when feeding operations begin.

**NAMED TO NATL. WILDLIFE SOCIETY**

U. of I., Moscow — Dr. Kenneth E. Hungerford, professor of wildlife management at the University of Idaho, has been elected to the national council of the Wildlife Society, dedicated to the establishment of high professional standards in wildlife management.

As representative of Region Six, Dr. Hungerford will be the spokesman for the states of Alaska, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington, and the territory of Guam. His three-year council term will begin in March.

A member of the college of forestry, wildlife and range sciences since 1943, Dr. Hungerford is assistant unit leader of the Idaho Cooperative Wildlife Research unit. He is a past president and secretary-treasurer of the Northwest Section of the Wildlife Society, and currently is president of the year-old Idaho chapter.

**U. OF I. PURCHASES TV EQUIPMENT**

U. of I., Moscow, The University of Idaho today awarded purchase of \$112,492 worth of television equipment to Radio Corporation of America to put the university's television station on the air this spring, it was announced today by Professor Gordon Law, acting director of communications. The purchase is to be supported by a \$3,299 grant from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and welfare.

Law said the equipment would consist of a transmitter tower, antenna and necessary supplementary units. The transmitter and antenna will come from Lubbock, Texas, where they had been formerly used by Station KCBT-TV. The tower will be supplied by Pacific Tower Co., Portland.

When the tower and antenna are erected on Paradise ridge, about four miles southeast of Moscow, a height of 1,100 feet above average terrain will be attained. The tower will be 800 feet high, and the antenna will extend 87 feet above it.

The concrete block building to house the transmitter has been completed. Wiring to the building is also finished.

The station will broadcast directly within a radius of 70 miles of the Paradise Ridge site, and will operate a minimum of four hours a day. Cable feeds will be available as far south as New Meadows and as far north as Bonners Ferry.

According to Law, the eventual plan for Idaho is to have educational television stations at Boise and on the Idaho State University campus at Pocatello. Both Campuses have made application to the Federal Communications Commission for channel licenses, he said. With a relay tower at LaGrande, Ore., the Moscow signals would be relayed to Boise and from there to Pocatello. The Pocatello and Boise channels would be able to broadcast to Moscow via the LaGrande relay point.

"We hope by September of 1966 to cover 90 percent of the State of Idaho with the network," Law said.

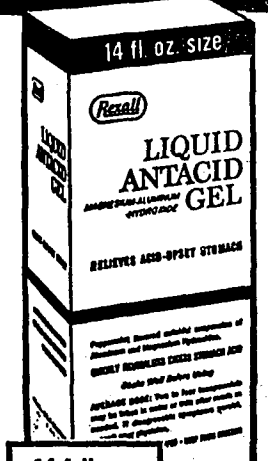

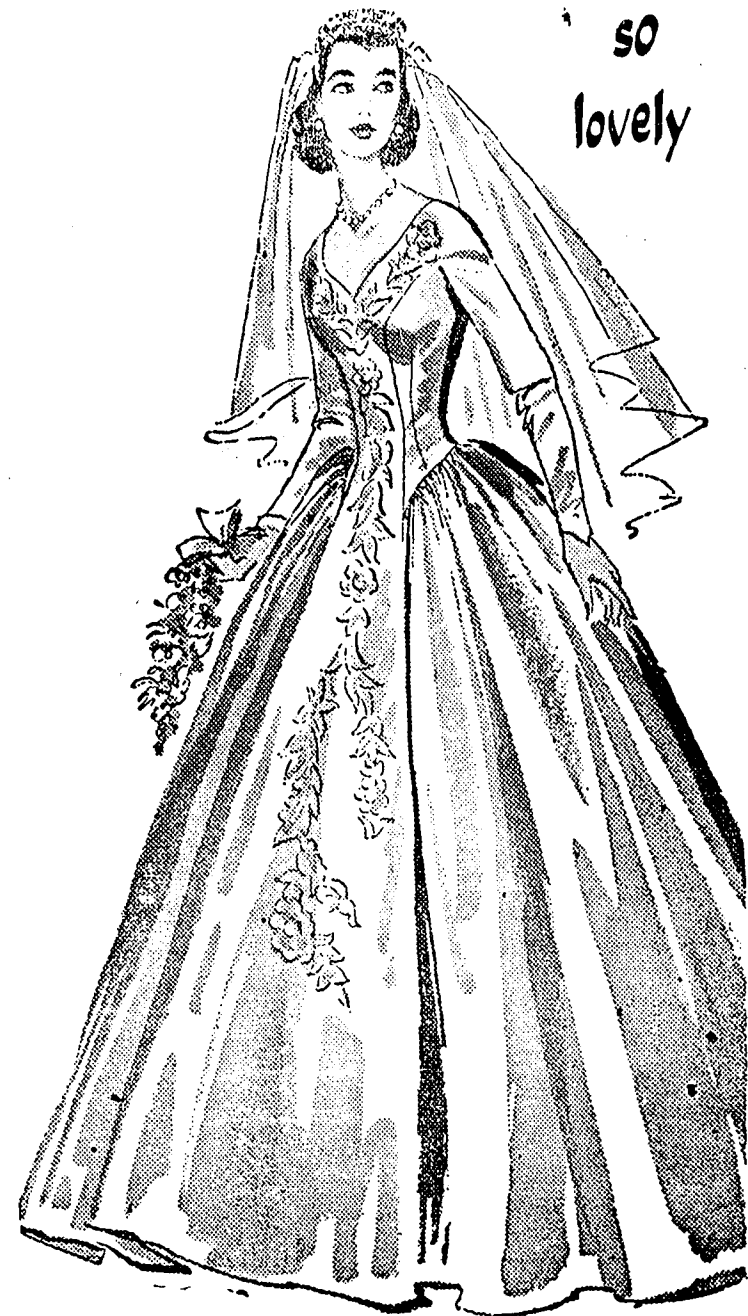

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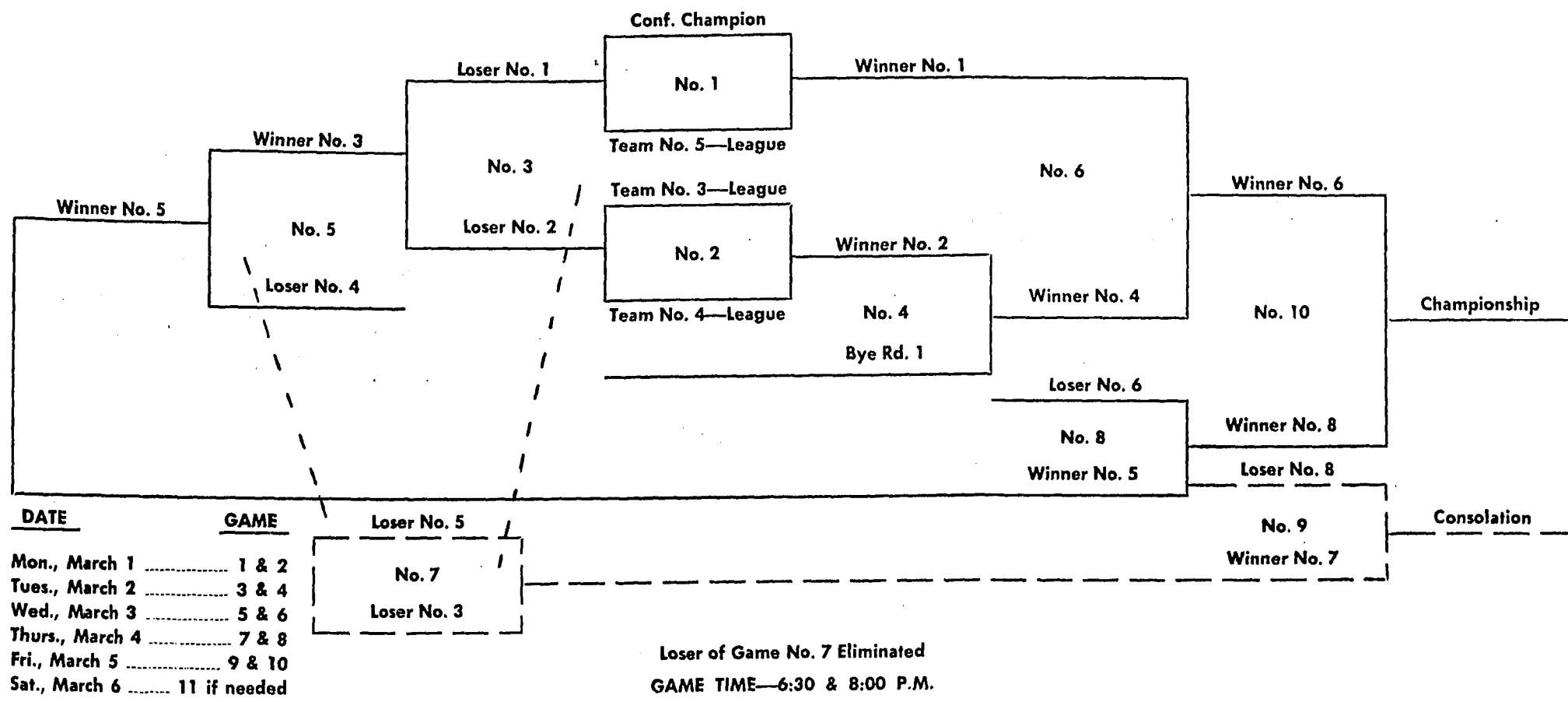

**POTLATCH YOUTH IS IFYE DELEGATE**

Jerry Howard, University of Idaho senior and a former Latah County 4-H'er, has been chosen the 1965 International Farm Youth Exchange delegate to Korea beginning April 1, 1965. Jerry is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Howard of Potlatch, Idaho.

During grade school and high school Jerry's ability in numerous 4-H projects over a ten year period enabled him to win trips to National 4-H Club Congress meetings in Chicago and Washington D. C. In 1962, his continued interest in 4-H helped him to win one of two National Milwaukee Grain and Marketing Scholarships.

Before leaving for Korea in April, Jerry will spend a good deal of time preparing himself by studying the history, politics, religions, agriculture, and various other phases of Korean life. He will also study different types of American customs that people of Korea may be interested in. Learning the Korean language is also one of Jerry's goals before leaving Idaho.

The International Farm Youth Exchange is a two-way exchange. Selected farm youth from the United States live and work with farm families in other countries from six to nine months and, in turn, farm youth from cooperating countries come here to live and work with our farm families. After their return home, U. S. delegates devote considerable time sharing the benefits of their experiences with others, giving talks and participating in civic programs.

No state or federal funds are used to finance the actual exchange. The IFYE national budget is made possible by contributions from individuals, foundations and industries interested in rural youth and international understanding. One-half of the funds are raised in the community that is sponsoring the delegate, through individuals and club groups. This helps to create interest in the delegate who will represent their community.

To help finance Jerry as an IFYE, the 4-H'ers of Latah County are sponsoring a county wide Hootenanny, February 20th, with all proceeds from this going into the fund to finance Jerry's trip. The Hootenanny will be held in the ballroom of the Student Union Building on the University of Idaho campus. There will be two performances -- a matinee from 1:30 to 4:00 in the afternoon and the evening performance from 8:00 to 12:00 -- featuring the Paradons at the dance which will complete the evening's activities.

**TESTS SET UP FOR BEAN FOR SEED**

U. I. Moscow A laboratory and field testing program to detect halo blight infection in bean seed has been set up by the University of Idaho's College of Agriculture in cooperation with Idaho's bean seed industry, the State Commissioner of Agriculture and the Idaho Crop Improvement association.

Goal of the program is to reduce and eliminate if possible, the amount of diseased bean seed planted in the state, according to Dr. A. M. Finley, head of the department of plant science.

Laboratory testing will begin immediately, Dr. Finley said. Small samples of seed introduced into Idaho from known halo blight-infested areas will be tested in the university plant pathology laboratory. If the seed appears to be free of infection, larger samples will be grown and tested at Yuma, Ariz. in late February and March.

"If we find evidence of halo blight in either laboratory or field tests, we will advise strongly that the seed not be planted in Idaho" Dr. Finley said.

This kind of attack against halo blight is necessary because there is no chemical means of controlling the disease, he pointed out. Four or five diseased plants per acre can destroy a field of beans. Since the disease spreads quickly, one infested field can endanger a bean-growing area.

In Idaho's case, halo blight infection threatens the total bean seed industry.

"Idaho became the nation's No. 1 source of bean seed because it was free of halo blight and other bacterial seed diseases," Dr. Finley said. "Bean varieties developed in the commercial areas could be grown for increase here without concern over seed diseases. Our climate effectively choked out infection."

Not so today, he added. Halo blight infection was noted throughout the southern Idaho bean producing areas last year.

Dr. Harry S. Fenwick, plant pathologist with the Idaho Agricultural Extension Service, will be in charge of the university testing program.

Beginning about February 15, he will supervise planting at the field test plot in Arizona. As soon as the bean plants emerge, he will conduct daily field readings at the site. Reports of the readings on each sample will be relayed to the originating seed dealer immediately.

Dr. Fenwick will also conduct field tests at the university's plant science farm near Moscow later in the spring too late to plant in Arizona.

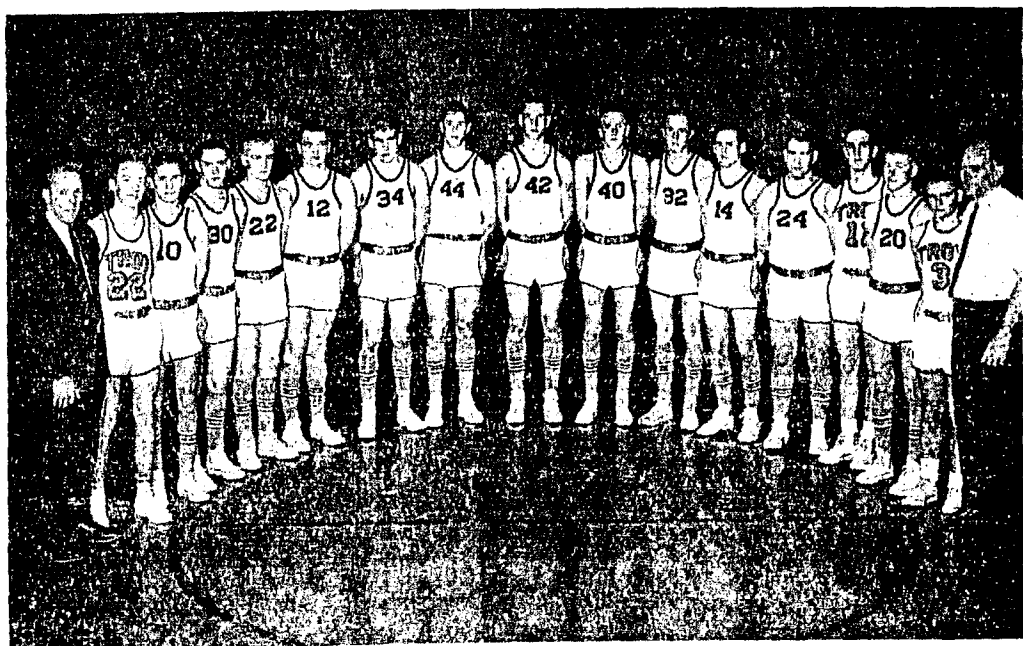

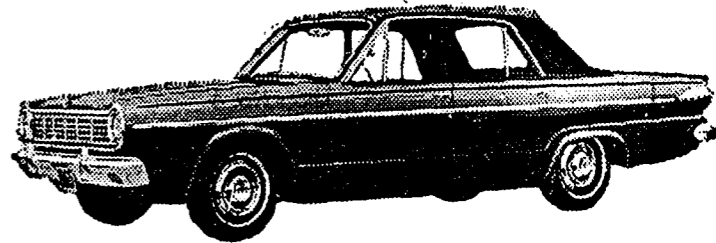

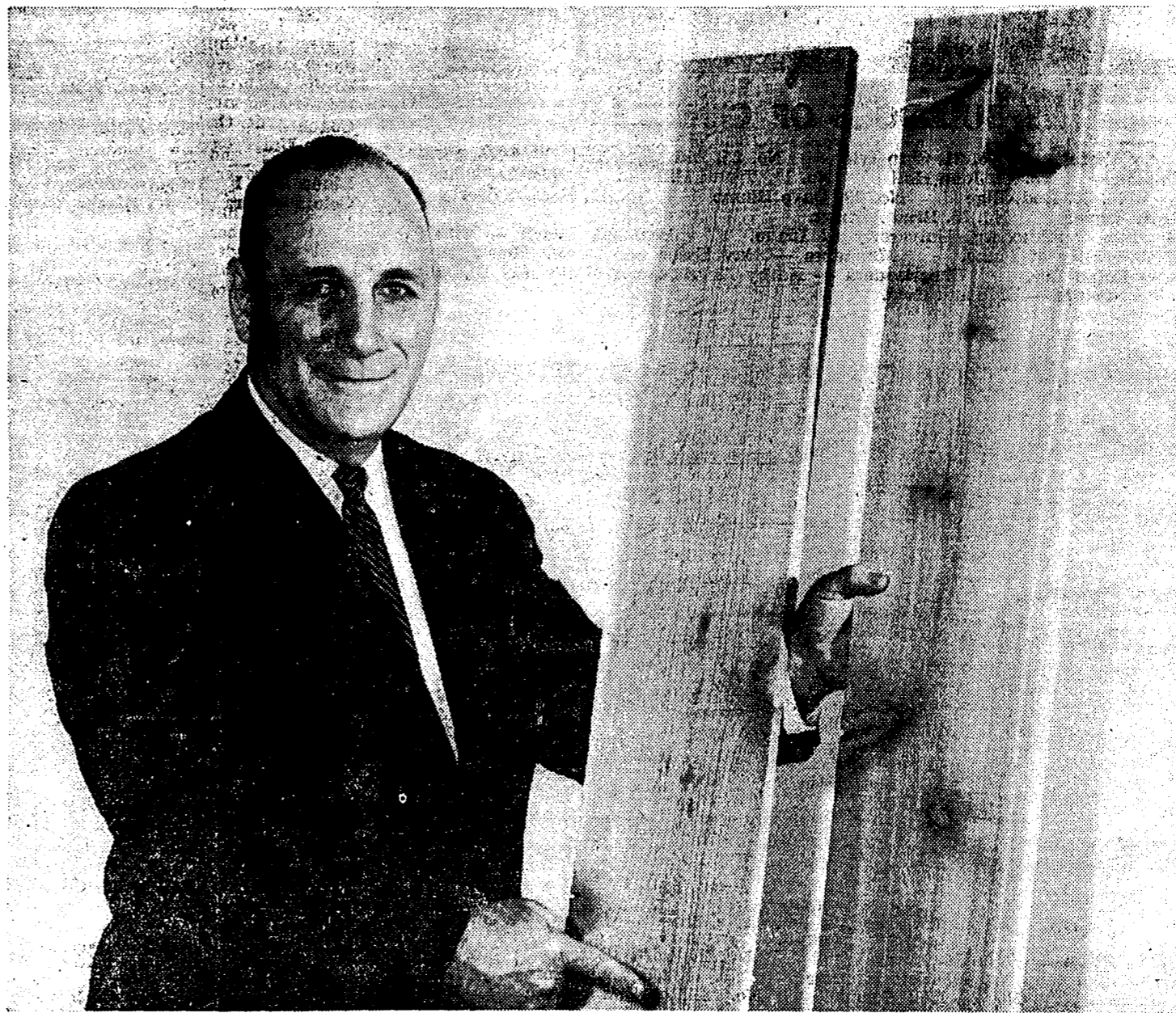
