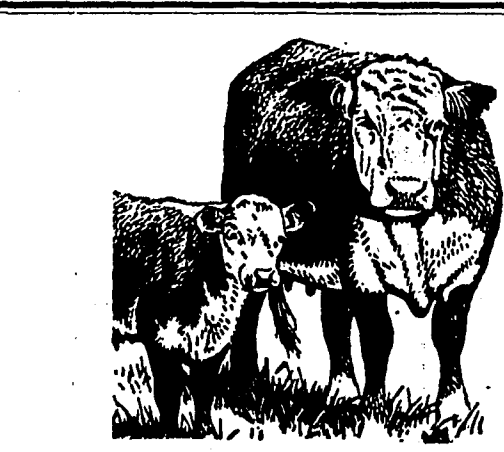

CHECKING BIG GAME WINTER BROWSE

Boise — Biologist Dale Turner checks big game browse on winter range along the South Fork of the Boise River as part of chores for this time of year. Winter range is the limiting factor for big game populations in Idaho.
 Where herd numbers and browse feed are in good balance, elk and deer populations remain vigorous, thrifty and highly productive. Plants and shrubs also come through in good shape. Where numbers and feed are out of balance, both animals and range suffer.

INVESTMENT COURSE TO BE OFFERED

Persons interested in stock market investments, how to follow the trends and how to read quotations are invited to take advantage of an accelerated lecture series on securities investments to be offered this week by the University of Idaho di-

vision of adult education.
 The bureau of business and economic research and the College of Business Administration, in cooperation with the special programs division of adult education, will present the accelerated course in securities investments. The class will meet three times.
 Dr. Norman Nybrot, associate director of the bureau of business and economic research and professor of economics, will conduct the series with the help of other university staff members, and Robert Holder of Merrill, Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith of Spokane.
 "The principal objective of the series is to serve, in a practical way, adult citizens who have little experience and knowledge in the area of investments in securities, but are interested in learning. Market practices will be explained and the reading and use of financial information and services will be emphasized," Dr. Nybrot stated.
 The short course is offered, for no credit, at a cost of \$3.00 per student. The first lecture will be in Room 227 of the Administration building on Friday, March 12, from 4 to 5:45 p. m. Other meetings will be from 8:30 to 10:00 a. m. on Saturday, March 13, and 4 to 5:45 p. m. on Monday, March 15. Places and procedures will be announced at the first meeting.
 Persons wishing to take the course are asked to obtain registration information from the University of Idaho, division of adult education, Moscow, as soon as possible.

TIMBER SALES SET ALL TIME RECORD

Missoula — the volume of timber sold in the 16 National Forests of the Northern Region reached an all-time record high in 1964, Neal M. Rahm, regional forester, announced last week.
 "The 1,535,236,000 board feet of timber sold in the national forests of eastern Washington, northern Idaho, Montana and western Dakotas last year represents an increase of 4,785,000 board feet over the previous high of 1963," Rahm said.
 Timber sold in northern region forests in 1964 is equivalent to the volume of timber required to build more than 133,000 average size houses (11,500 board feet per house).
 Douglas Fir and western larch represented more than 44 percent of the total saw log volume cut in these national forests in 1964.
 The record high volume of timber sold in the northern region national forests was the result of 2,747 separate timber sales. The timber is offered in sales of various size classes to provide opportunity for purchase by both large and small operators.
 Reforestation in the 16 national forests included: Planting, 14,580 acres; direct seeding, 1,080 acres; site preparation, 29,165 acres, and natural regeneration, 25,759 acres.
 Last year the Forest Service's Coeur d'Alene tree nursery at Coeur d'Alene, and the Savenac tree nursery at Haugen, Mont., produced and shipped 8,660,000 trees for planting. Production at these two nurseries is expected to exceed 12 million trees in 1965.

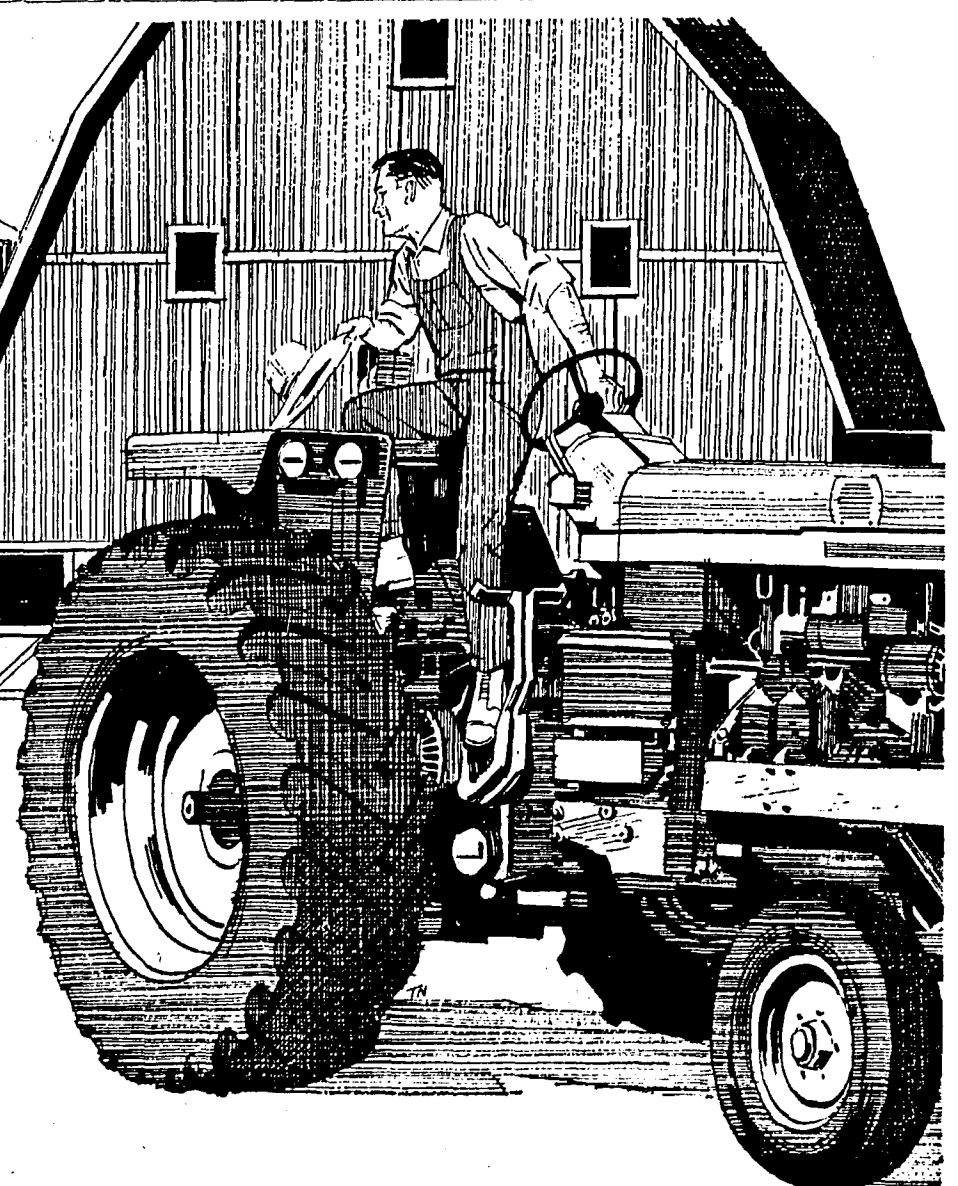

 Available evergreens are Ponderosa Pine, Lodgepole Pine, Austrian Pine, Douglas Fir, Norway Spruce, Blue Spruce, Juniper and Red Cedar. Hardwoods still in supply are Russian Olive, Siberian Pea, Honeysuckle, Black Locust, Green Ash, Siberian Elm, Golden Willow and Hybrid Poplar.
