GEO. F. BROCKE, SR., WRITES ON DOINGS **OF LEGISLATURE**

Boise (March 6) — This is the 62nd day of the 38th Sesiion of the Idaho Legislature. At this time only one major item of the governor's legislative program has passed both houses — this is the Parks Bill.

This week has been a hectic one. Tuesday the Senate, after five hours of debate, killed the Sales Tax measure. However, reconsideration was asked, so the bill is still alive and can be voted on again at such time as the majority leadership feels they have the necessary votes to pass it.

To get these votes, two bills are in the House that hold the key to the situation. One is Senate Bill No. 181, which is the referendum act which - providing the necessary petitions are signed by the people ---would allow the people to vote on the Sales Tax issue.

The other bill that is holding up the Sales Tax bill is House Bill No. 261, the equalized assessed valuation bill. This bill would adjust the valuation of all real, personal and utilitics in each county on the same basis. In theory this sounds very good, as all counties are using different percents of cash value for taxing purposes. Under this bill real property would be assessed at 20 percent of its cash value, personal property at 20 percent of its cash value, and utilities at 40 percent of their cash value.

If this bill were to become law, personal property would, in most counties, decline in value, making for some reduction in taxes in this field, while at the same time real taxes would be increased to offset the loss in the personal property tax. Some of the loss in personal property would be offset by the increase in the utilities tax ratio, which would be upped from 30 percent to 40 percent.




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
