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4-H'ERS HAVE FUN TAKING PICTURES

Chicago — A popular and rewarding pursuit for 4-H Club boys and girls throughout the state is taking pictures. After several years as a pilot project, the 4-H photography awards program has just completed its first year on a nation-wide basis. Well over 3,300 members in 1,241 counties qualified for a county photography award, reports Kenneth H. Anderson, associate director of the National 4-H Service committee. The young camera enthusiasts sent in glowing and colorfully illustrated reports of their efforts, Anderson noted. The 4-H Service committee was one of the early planners of the program and responsible for obtaining the backing of a large camera company. The leisure-time-hobby has turned into a real help for school, church and club activities. Club members are supplied with how-to-do-it manuals prepared by experts. Local club leaders usually are parents or young adults with an interest in photography.

U. OF I. ANTENNA TOWER GOING UP

U. of I., Moscow — The last section of an 80-foot antenna tower being constructed for the University of Idaho TV station, KUID-TV, was lifted into place last week. When the antenna is completed on Paradise Ridge, about four miles southeast of Moscow, a height of 1,100 feet above the average terrain will be attained, according to Gordon Law, acting director of communications. Expecting to first go on the air with test patterns and music, Law said the station will broadcast directly within a radius of 70 miles of the ridge site. When regular schedules are established, the station will operate a minimum of four-hours a day. Cable feeds will be available

as far south as New Meadows, and as far north as Bonners Ferry. The eventual plan for Idaho is to have educational television stations at Boise and the Idaho State University campus at Pocatello. Both campuses have made applications to the FCC for channel licenses, Law noted. With a relay tower at LaGrande, Ore., the Moscow signals would be relayed to Boise and from there to Pocatello. The Pocatello and Boise channels would be able to broadcast to Moscow via the LaGrande relay point. "We hope by September of 1966 to cover 90 percent of the state of Idaho with the network," Law said.

TEMPERATURE HITS FOR RECORD LOW!

After some 18 days of the most beautiful spring weather that anyone could want, even though it was chill, and a heavy frost every night — "Old Man Winter" decided to have just one more fling before giving way to spring, and Tuesday night the temperature dropped to 20 degrees here in the valley, and readings of 8 and 10 above were common on the hills. Wednesday night the reading went another five degrees lower, recording 15 here in the valley, and 4 to 6 above on the hills. We were told that Elk River recorded 2 below zero! Both readings were, according to the Lewiston weather bureau (closest official station) record lows for the date. On neither day did it warm up very much, and Thursday remained just a little above the freezing point all day. Thursday a warming trend began, with the temperature rising slowly. However, it was not until a brief rain fell Saturday night that the reading rose into the 50 degrees. Sunday was a sunny day, but the temperature remained cool until late evening, when it began to warm up and rain fell, a gentle rain, almost all night. A rain that was welcomed

by the farmers, as a crust was beginning to form on plowed fields, and fall wheat was doing poorly. Monday one could all but see the grass turn green, and the Potlatch river rose just a little bit, due to the rain in the upper country.

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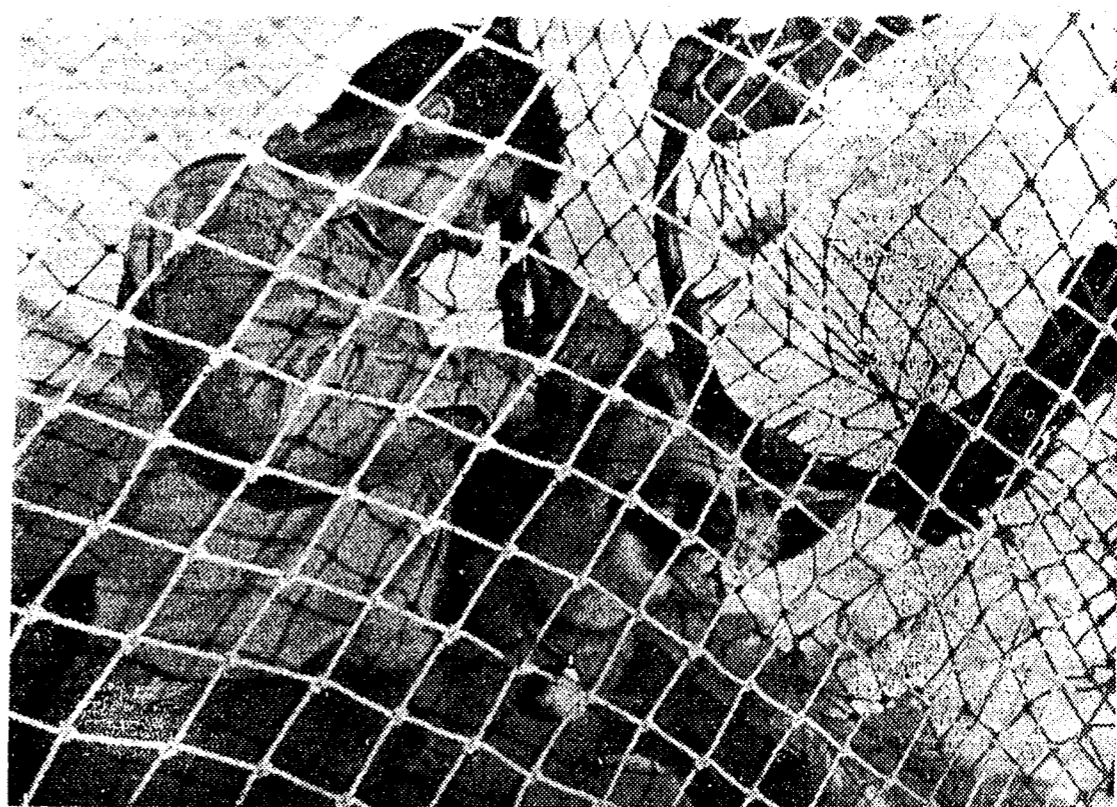

TRAP AND TAG DEER AND ELK

One of 500 deer, and about half that many elk, is shown in a trap with Dale Jensen, Pocatello, game biologist, as he places numbered tag in animal's ear for future identification. These animals were trapped

throughout the state during 1964-65. The purpose is to check seasonal migration routes, distribution, survival, herd composition by age and sex.

Most big game animals fared well this past winter because of chinook winds and thaws. Grass now is turning green at lower elevations in some places.

J. EDGAR HOOVER TELLS OF PROBLEMS IN AUTHORITY

The FBI's scope of authority is neither vague or complex. Its responsibilities are clearly defined and strictly limited by Federal statutes and Presidential directives. Regardless of these specific provisions, as well as the great effort which has been made over the years to clarify the FBI's role in law enforcement, false information and misunderstandings in the recent past have led to some public confusion.

Many persons — some obviously without facts and others obviously by design — have misrepresented the FBI's work and investigative activities. A few groups if you are to believe their public comments, consider the FBI to be all powerful — in effect, a police arm of the Federal government to be used to squelch trouble and strife any place at any time. Others persist that we overstep the bounds of our authority and that the discharge of our prescribed duties in certain areas is an invasion of the responsibilities belonging to State and local authorities.

In both instances, emotions and expediency have beclouded the true facts and issues. Time and again since becoming Director of the FBI, I have stressed the exacting limitations within which this bureau operates. These controls have always been honored. The FBI has never overstepped its legal boundaries, nor shall it in the future. On the other hand, we have never failed to vigorously meet the obligations rightly belonging to us without fear or favor. Suffice it to say, we do not intend to deviate from this practice.

Once again, for the sake of those who do not know and those who choose to ignore the extent of our responsibilities, I should like to state briefly what the FBI is, what it is not, and what it can and cannot do.

The FBI is an investigative agency. It investigates violations of certain Federal statutes. The facts it gathers are presented without recommendation or opinion to the Attorney General, his assistant, or the United States Attorneys who determine if the evidence warrants prosecution. The FBI also performs an intelligence function, particularly in the field of security, to assist this country in preserving its internal security.

The FBI is a service agency. Its facilities are available without charge to all duly constituted law enforcement agencies. These functions include Uniform Crime Reporting, the Identification Division, the FBI Laboratory, and the FBI National Academy.

The FBI is not a national police force. By law, the FBI cannot go into a State, county or city and take over or assume the authority of local officials.

The FBI is not a protective agency. It has no authority to protect or guard anyone under any circumstances.

The FBI is not a clearance agency. There is no such thing as an "FBI clearance." When called upon by another government agency to investigate an individual who is being considered for a sensitive position, the FBI presents the facts and evidence it gathers to the employing agency which must decide whether or not the person is granted a security clearance.

As long as the directorship of the FBI is entrusted to me, this bureau shall never become a lackey to self-serving individuals or pressure groups of any persuasion. Furthermore, the FBI shall discharge its assigned responsibilities with the same dispatch and thoroughness which have characterized its activities in the past.
