FAMILY POT-LUCK DINNER SUNDAY

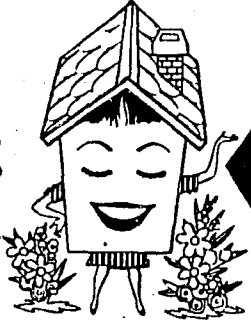

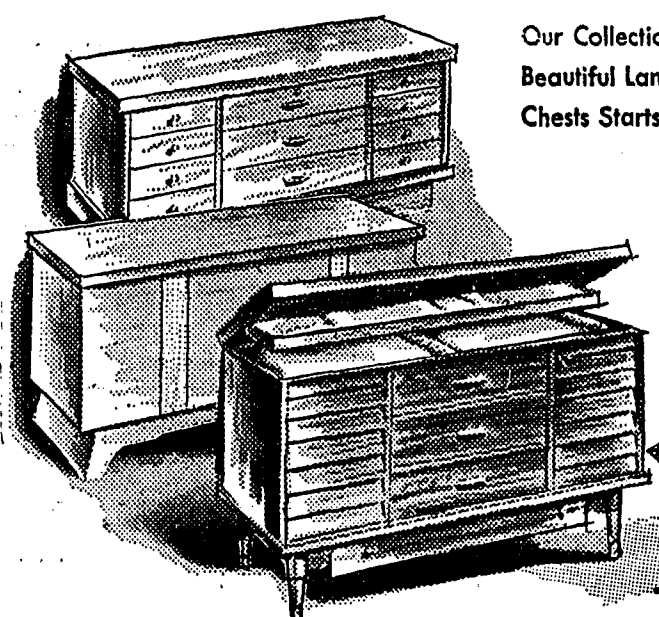

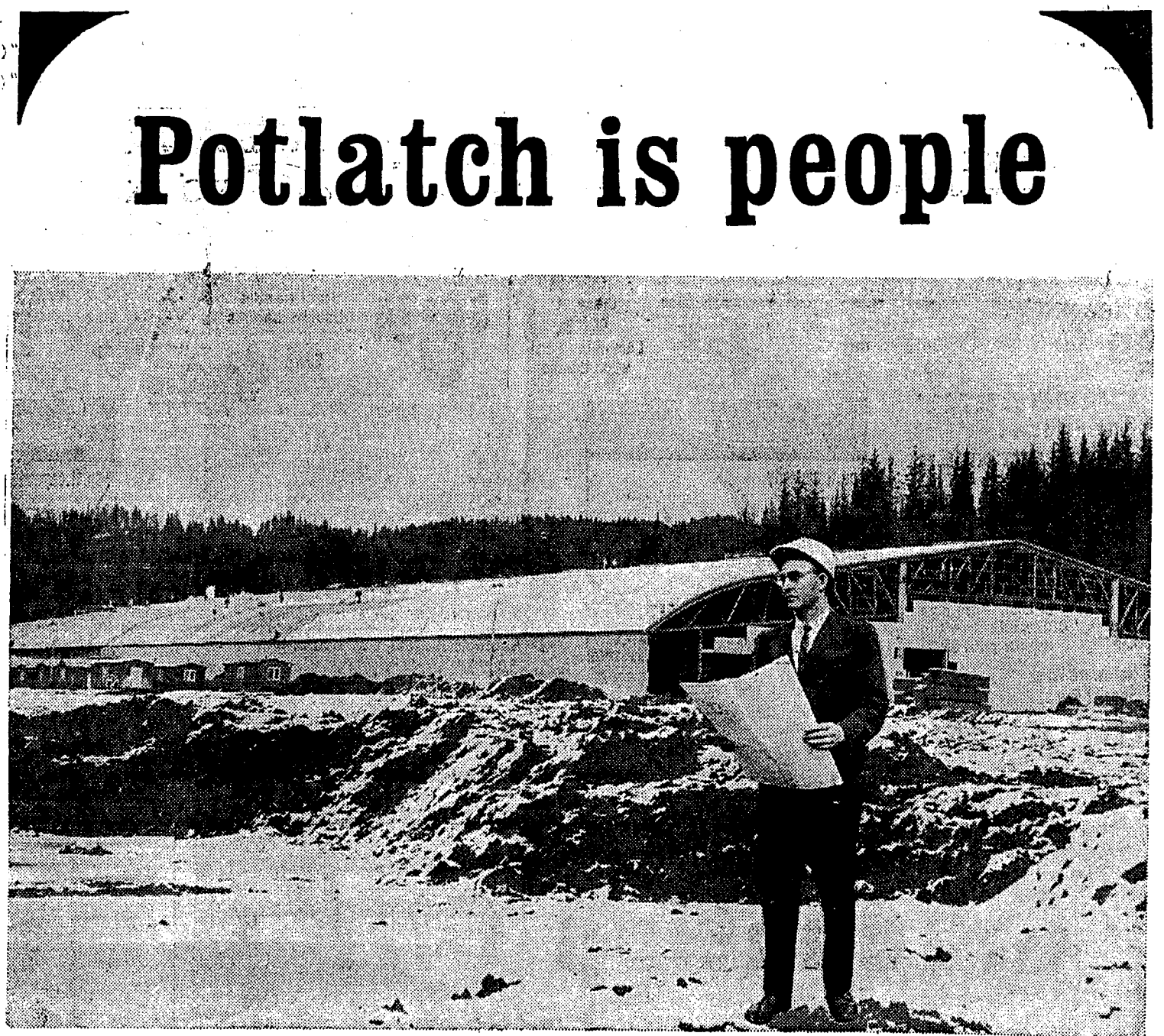
