### \$7 FEE TO USE THE RECREATION AREAS

Wash., D. C. — Rep. Compton I. White, Jr., Idaho, said he has been assured Department of Interior regulations on the National Parks and Forest recreation use fee "are firmly within the limits of the intent of Congress."

A \$7 annual user fee goes into effect nationwide on June 1st and Stewart Udall, Interior secretary, has outlined two alternative plans for daily and weekly visits to recreation areas.

White, in the last session of Congress, forced an amendment to the use fee bill that exempts persons who enter recreational areas but are not classified as users, from having to purchase the \$7 sticker.

After conferring with Udall, White said, "the regulations on the surface appear to carry out the intent of the legislation. I fully support the theory that users of Federal recreational facilities should pay for the maintenance and development."

Under one of the alternatives in the regulations, Udall said, a daily entrance or admission rate per area, usually 25c or 50c per person will be charged.

Udall said the second alternative, for a series of visits, will admit the purchaser to the particular area for an unrestricted number of visits for the balance of the calendar year — in effect a season pass to that area. This fee will be a multiple of from two to five times the daily rate, Udall said.

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**PEAS AND LENTILS AT JAPANESE FAIR**

Tokyo — United States dry peas and lentils are being introduced to many who had never seen them before at the Tokyo International Trade Fair now underway. These products are in the spotlight here through a planned industry effort designed to expand overseas markets.

Thousands of Japanese daily view the colorful pea and lentil booth in the Washington State Pavilion. The exhibit is designed to help popularize these products in Japan. Par-

ticipation at the Tokyo Fair represents the U. S. industries first step in an aggressive world-wide merchandising effort.

The Tokyo promotion is a joint effort of the Pacific Northwest Pea Growers and Dealers Association and the Foreign Agricultural Service, U. S. D. A. If the effort in Japan is successful, plans call for extending the foreign marketing work to other parts of the world believed to be expanding markets for U. S. dry peas and lentils.

On exhibit at the booth are samples of whole and split peas, Austrian winter peas, lentils, packaged and canned processed foods and the many other fine products made from these

commodities. Large color transparencies tell the story of growing, harvesting, processing and shipping. A special display case highlights dry peas and lentils in meal planning. An information counter allows for meeting visitors and answering their questions.

On hand at the booth talking shop with the Japanese are Ed. Dumas, Wayne Chastain and Joe Spiruta. Dumas is a veteran trader in dry peas and lentils, managing his own company at Moscow, Idaho. Chastain is the manager of the Inland Empire Pea Growers Association of Spokane and Spiruta is a marketing specialist with the Washington State Department of Agriculture.

Several million viewers are expect-

ed to visit the exhibit before the Fair closes May 6. Many will receive recipes and samples. Japanese traders, pulse dealers, canners and importers are given special market information.

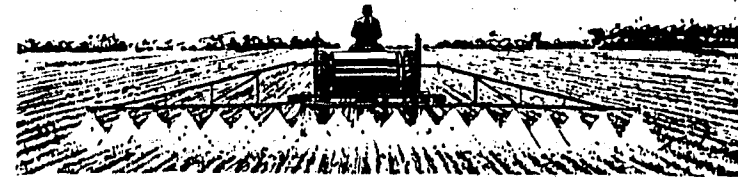
Japanese use U. S. dry peas much differently than in other parts of the world. Here most of the dry peas are fried, salted and then eaten as a snack with beer or sake. Some are cooked, sugared and eaten at breakfast time. A considerable quantity are made into paste for use in commercial baking, serving much the same purpose as jam or custard in western baking.

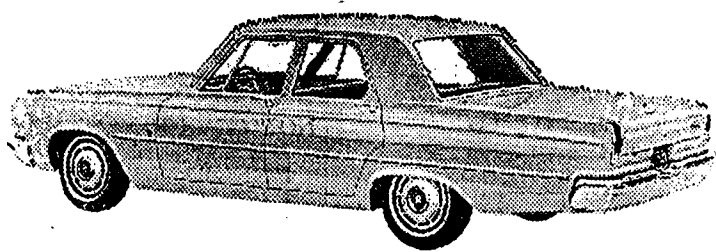

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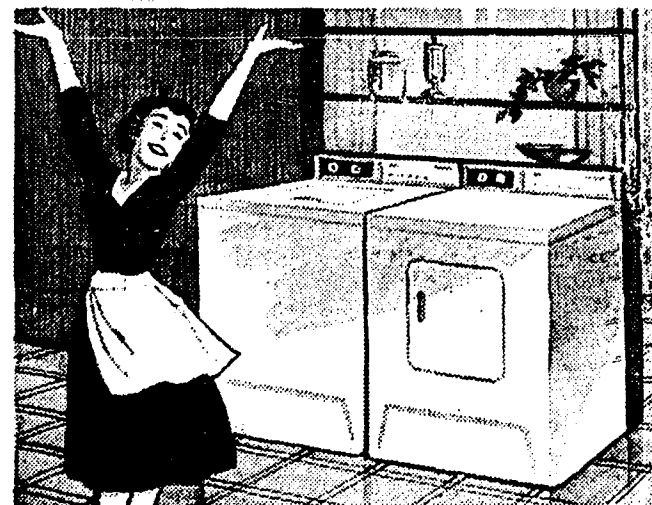

### DO YOU GROW YOUR OWN SALADS?

Moscow — For Idaho salad fans, growing conditions in most parts of the state are favorable for production of several favorite varieties, says Tony Horn, horticulturist of the University of Idaho Extension service. Lettuce is a cool weather crop. It can be planted early. Once the plants are hardened off they can stand several degrees below freezing temperatures. Early planting is a safeguard against formation of seed stalks in some varieties, and bitter leaves in others. Garden soil high in organic matter and enriched with fertilizer is recommended. Application of one pound of 10-10-0 or similar plant food to 100 square feet sets the stage for a successful crop.

Leaf lettuce, characterized by loose leaves, matures more rapidly than other kinds. Salad Bowl, Grand Rapids and Black-Seeded Simpson are among the varieties that will do well in Idaho. They reach their peak in about 50 days from planting. The Butterhead of Boston-type matures in about 70 days. Bibb lettuce is suitable for spring or fall. Transplants rather than seed usually do best. High temperatures cause some Bibb varieties to go to seed. Recent types such as Summer Bibb resist heat. Buttercrunch is similar to Bibb, but larger.



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
