#### CHILD CHOKES ON PILL, DIES LATER

Marcia Rae Whybark, daughter of Mrs. Ernest Warren, Walla Walla, died Saturday afternoon at St. Mary's Hospital in Walla Walla despite the best efforts of doctors, and use of an iron lung, in a drive to keep her alive.

The little blonde girl was playing normally at her home in Walla Walla Wednesday morning, although she had had a slight cold. Mrs. Ernest Warren, her mother, gave her a half-pill for medication, three of which on preceding days the child had swallowed without any difficulty.

This time the half-pill descended into Marcia's trachea, blocking the bronchial passage, and she became unconscious. By the time she reached the hospital, after initial first aid measures had failed to revive her, her heart had stopped beating. Heart massage and a defibrillator restored her heart action after an estimated 30 minutes.

An elapsed time of four minutes in supply oxygen to the brain through the blood stream may cause permanent damage. Without normal brain and nerve cells to control chest action, respiration is possible only with the aid of an iron lung.

Funeral services for the little girl daughter of Mrs. Ernest Warren of Walla Walla and Ray Whybark of Bovill were held Wednesday afternoon at 2:00 at Short's Chapel in Moscow.

### YOUTH CAMP HAS DATE TO OPEN

Boise — State Forester Roger L. Guernsey announced last week that the Idaho Youth Conservation Camp will run from June 21 to August 17 this year, and he urged all interested boys to write the State Forestry Department, State Capitol, Boise, Idaho, 83701, for an application blank. "Applications are due back at the State Forester's office by May 20," he said.

Any resident boy between the ages of 14 and 17 inclusive, who is in good health and character and is interested in forestry work, is eligible to apply.

Sixty-seven boys will be selected by lot to attend the Camp, which will be located in the Priest Lake State Forest. The boys will be selected from the various counties in the same numbers as representatives in the legislature under the new reapportionment system. The drawings for successful applicants will be conducted in the counties by the state senators or persons they designate.

The State Forester said the boys are paid \$1 per day, and are furnished transportation to and from camp, plenty of good food, medical care if needed, and a pair of boots and socks. The work will consist of trail

maintenance, erosion control, stream clearance to benefit fish life, and other conservation projects. Crews will be rotated for special details at Farragut State Park, the scene of the 1965 International Girl Scout Roundup.

John Schwartz, teacher at Potlatch High school, who was assistant camp director last year, will be the camp director. Jack Gillette, deputy state forester is project officer for the State Forestry department.

Egg protein comes so near to perfection that scientists use it as a standard to measure the value in other foods. Eggs are also a good source of vitamin A, and they contain the B vitamins — B-1, B-2 and B-12. Eggs are second only to fish liver as a natural source of vitamin

D. Furthermore, the specialist says, eggs are easily and completely digested. They are excellent for children and teen-agers, providing stamina and helping to take care of the body's food needs during periods of rapid growth. They are valuable in adult diets because of food value, convenience and economy.

Another point is that eggs are useful in reducing diets. They contain generous amounts of proteins and other essentials with moderate numbers of calories. Two eggs contribute 154 calories.

On the other side of the picture eggs are also recommended for gaining weight, when consumed in different diets prescribed by a physician. They add a plus value to milk and fruit beverages. Hard-cooked as snacks, they provide a bonus food with lunch and dinner.



