The mountain bluebird, bluest of the blue, is the State Bird of Idaho, as designated in 1931.

Idaho is a state bigger than New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts and New Hampshire combined.

Idaho is about the size of Great Britain, including England, Scotland and Wales.

Idaho lies halfway between the equator and the north pole.

The Bruneau River Canyon in southwestern Idaho stretches for 67 miles across the Owyhee desert in Idaho.

The Perrine Memorial Bridge, 2 1/2 miles north of Twin Falls, Idaho, is the highest bridge for its length in the world, and is built across the Snake river. The bridge is 1,400 feet long, and 476 feet above water level.

Idaho is noted for the grandeur of its mountains.

Mt. Borah is the highest mountain in Idaho — 12,655 feet.

The largest lake in Idaho, with a surface area of more than 180 square miles is Lake Pend Oreille.

Lake Coeur d'Alene in Idaho, has been called one of the five most beautiful lakes in the world.

The Kamloops trout and Kokanee Salmon are found in Lake Pend Oreille in Idaho.

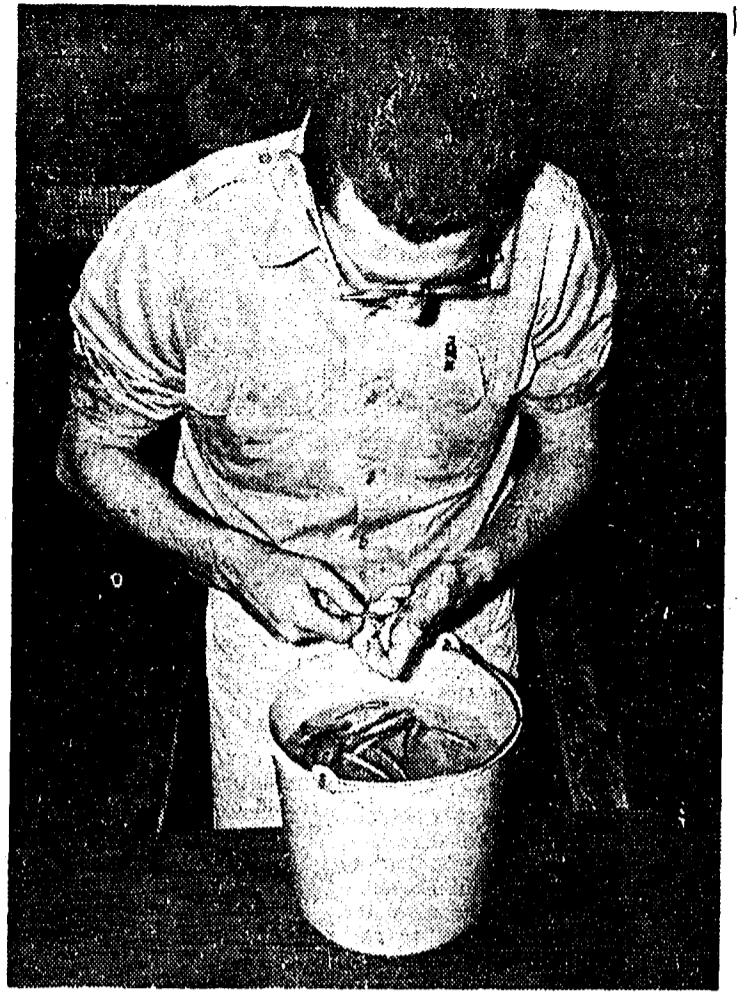
The Salmon river in Idaho has the distinction of being one of the longest streams lying wholly within one state, and of rushing through a gorge that is a fifth of a mile deeper than the Grand Canyon of the Colorado.

Higher than Niagara, Shoshone Falls, on the Snake river near Twin Falls, Idaho, plunges over a basalt horseshoe rim nearly 1,000 feet wide and drops 212 feet.

Hells Canyon, the deepest canyon — deepest river gorge on the North American continent, is situated in Idaho. It is the narrowest major gorge on the continent.

Bruneau Canyon in Idaho is one of the deepest, most narrow canyons on the earth — man can easily hurl a rock from rim to rim.

Idaho produces 72 kinds of precious and semi-precious stones. It is said that Idaho gem beds cannot be duplicated in any other state, and that

they are second only to those of Africa.

What is said to have been the largest diamond ever found in the United States, weighing 10.6 carats, was found more than 25 years ago between McCall and New Meadows. From one opal mine in Owyhee county in 1893, were taken 7,000 carats in the rough.

In a recent U. S. Geologic survey, Idaho was listed as one of only three states in the continental United States with no shortage of water. Whatever the industrial needs are, Idaho can take care of them.

The Bear river, which crosses the southeast end of Idaho, is the largest river in the U. S. which does not flow into an ocean. It empties into Great Salt Lake.

Gold occurs in some form in nearly all counties of Idaho. The principal gold mining counties in Idaho have been Boise, Idaho, Owyhee, Lemhi,

Shoshone, Elmore, Custer, Blaine, Valley, Clearwater, Cassia, Camas and Gem.

Silver is one of Idaho's leading mineral commodities.

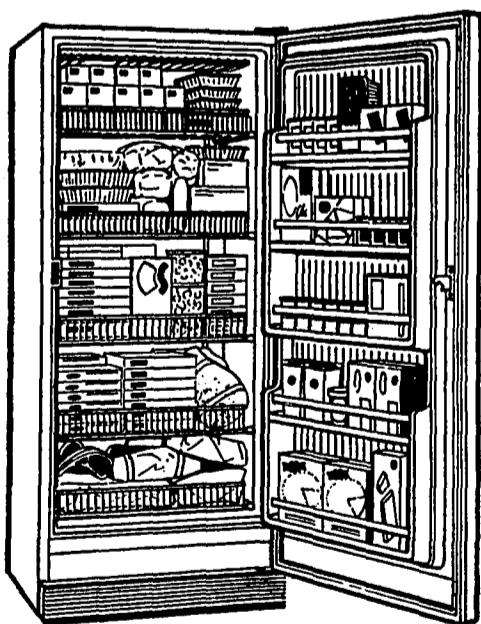

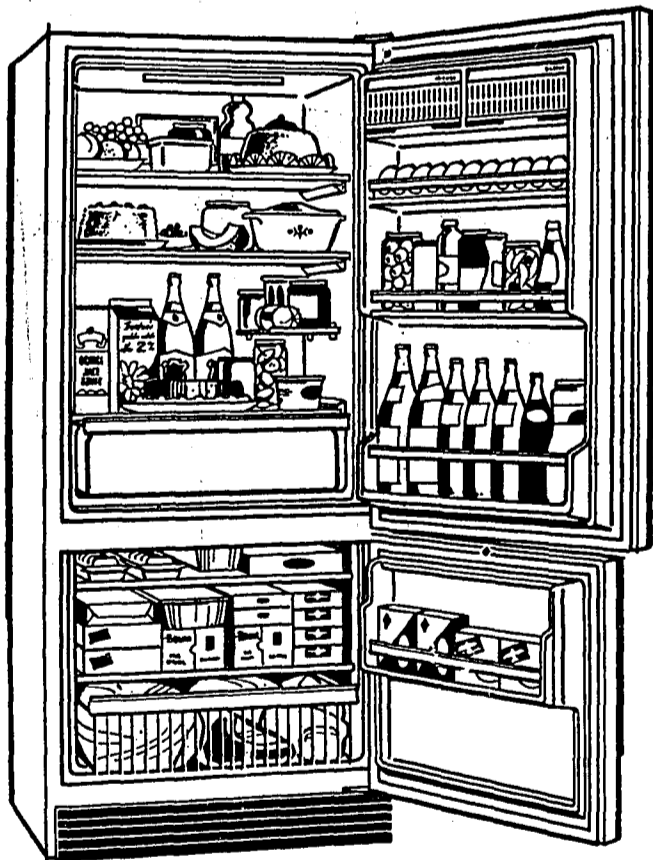

ANCIENT SKULL

Chicago — The skull of an "ape man" believed to have lived 500,000 to 600,000 years ago has been found by Chinese anthropologists. The skull, discovered in northwest central China, may be the oldest such specimen ever found.

U. OF I. TO AID WEEVIL ENEMIES

U. of I., Moscow — The alfalfa weevil, a costly insect pest that has survived a variety of cultural and chemical control attempts in Idaho, may soon face a stronger attack from its natural insect enemies.

University of Idaho entomologists will begin research this summer to help natural parasites of the weevil to do a better job. The study is part of a cooperative western states research project to evaluate biological control agents to replace or supplement pesticides in insect control.

The Idaho work will be directed by Dr. Guy W. Bishop, entomologist with the Aberdeen Branch Experiment station, where he is also in charge of potato leafroll vector research in the eastern Idaho seed potato producing areas.

Key insects in the weevil control study are species of tiny parasitic wasps from the weevil's home area in Europe.

One of these wasps accompanied the weevil in its migration from Utah into southern Idaho in 1911. A second parasite was released at Caldwell and Moscow last year. Others will be brought into the state this summer.

"The first wasp is doing a good job in some areas of Idaho, but it is too early to be certain that the second one survived," Bishop says. "We do know these parasites are effective in Europe. The alfalfa weevil is not an economic problem there because the natural insect balance keeps it in check."

While continuing his potato leafroll vector research this summer, Bishop will attempt "to find out

what we can do to help these parasites control alfalfa weevil under our conditions."

He will study the adaptability of the wasps to Idaho and evaluate their effectiveness in limiting alfalfa weevil damage. He will also observe the effects of native Idaho insects, alfalfa cultural practices and pesticides use on the wasps.

The studies will be made throughout the state. The alfalfa weevil has been established in southern Idaho areas for many years, but only invaded north Idaho in 1952.

HOME ECONOMICS CAN PAY OFF BIG

Chicago — Girls with an aptitude for home economics are encouraged to maintain high ratings in both 4-H and school work by the lure of home economics scholarships.

Again in 1965 six scholarships of \$300 each and three of \$500 each are offered to college juniors majoring in home economics, the National 4-H Service committee has announced. The candidates must have high scholastic standings and a background of 4-H work. Winners will be announced in December.

Candidates must be currently enrolled in a 4-H Club or have been a former 4-H member. The girls should make application to the state 4-H Club leader. The completed special scholarship application must include a statement explaining interest in home economics as a major course of study and financial need. More than two million home eco-

nomics projects are completed annually by 4-H Club members, according to figures released by the Federal Extension Service, U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. These include nutrition, bread baking, meal planning, sewing, food preservation, home improvement and related endeavors. The scholarships are provided by the sponsors through the National 4-H Service committee, with the Cooperative Extension Service designating the recipients. More information and application forms are available from the county or state 4-H Club office.

COLORED FERTILIZER

Chicago — Colored fertilizers will make life easier for the farmer or gardener, says a chemical company, which recently introduced a line of pigments for tinting agricultural chemicals. Coloring the fertilizer makes it easier to see what land has been covered and what kinds of chemicals have been used.

Hues available include yellow, red, orange, violet, blue and green.

ARMY HELPING GIRL SCOUT PREPARATION

Farragut, Idaho — a company of 200 army combat engineers from Ft. Lewis, Wash., are building a tent city here for the 1965 Girl Scout Senior Roundup. Some 11,000 Girl Scouts and leaders are expected to occupy the camp between July 15th and 28th.

Combat engineers of the 4th Engineer Battalion, 4th Infantry Division

have been augmented by signal maintenance personnel, plumbers, electricians and carpenters. They are under the command of Capt. Robert J. Reilly.

An army spokesman said the engineers will stake out the location of approximately 1,800 military tents, pitch them, and later strike them when the camp is over. They will also lay out 280 Girl Scout Troop sites, where the girls will pitch their own sleeping tents.

Thirty shower houses and 44 "powder rooms" will be built by the engineers and the plumbing fixtures installed. Equipment in the central kitchen will be installed, maintained and disconnected. The engineers will also operate a garbage land fill site to dispose of waste from the tent city.

Scaffolding for the Girl Scouts' outdoor amphitheater will be erected and later dismantled. One hundred and eight-five flags will fly over the tent city from poles put up by the engineers.

All army tentage is to be in place by June 27th.

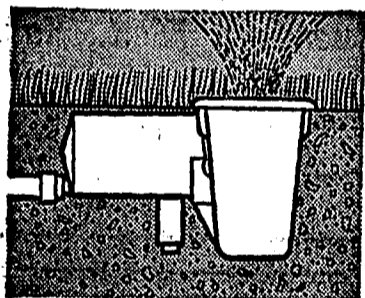

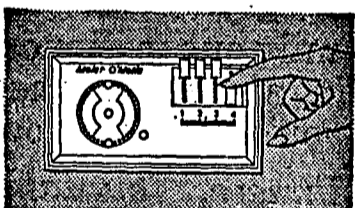
