

U. OF I. TO AID WEEVIL ENEMIES

U. of I., Moscow — The alfalfa weevil, a costly insect pest that has survived a variety of cultural and chemical control attempts in Idaho, may soon face a stronger attack from its natural insect enemies.

University of Idaho entomologists will begin research this summer to offered to college juniors majoring in help natural parasites of the weevil to do a better job. The study is part of a cooperative western states Service committee has announced part of a cooperative western states research project to evaluate biologi-cal control agents to replace or sup-plement pesticides in insect control. The Idaho work will be directed by Dr. Guy W. Bishop, entomologist with the Aberdeen Branch Experi-ment station where he is also in scholastic standings and a back-ground of 4-H work. Winners will be

announced in December. ment station, where he is also in charge of potato leafroll vector research in the eastern Idaho seed po-

tato producing areas. Key insects in the weevil control study are species of tiny parasitic wasps from the weevil's home area in Europe.

One of these wasps accompanied the weevil in its migration from Utah into southern Idaho in 1911. A second parasite was released at Caldwell, and Moscow last year. Others will be brought into the state this summer.

"The first wasp is doing a good job in some areas of Idaho, but it is too early to be certain that the second one survived," Bishop says. "We do know these parasites are ef-fective in Europe. The alfalfa weevil is not an economic problem there because the natural insect balance keeps it in check."

While continuing his potato leafroll vector research this summer, Bishop will attempt "to find out







tapered sunshade and mortises suggested for special strength. These aspects are detailed in the free plans, though, and all cutting specified can be ac-complished in seconds with portable electric saws designed for home craftsmen. Accuracy, then, is your chief concern.

The 1x4 posts joining the sandbox and sunshade are fast-ened with 2-inch carriage bolts so the two sections easily can be disassembled for storage.

All material should be coated with a sealer before coloring. with exterior paint, and screws and nails' should be counter-sunk so no metal protrudes to" catch and tear clothing.

When the work is completed, just add sand, relax and watch those youngsters beam!

can be made from a combination of pine or fir lumber and tempered hardboard, with the latter being utilized for table top and bench seats. Legs, ties and supports, and top under-pieces of lumber can be cut with the power saw and countersunk screw holes quickly made with the portable electric drill. The one-piece hardboard table top, 3 by 6 feet and bench seats, two of them 1 by 4 feet and two 1 by 6 feet, need simple mounting on frames. If you want lawn chairs of

comparable construction, hardboard can be used for chair seats and backs with %-inch pine, cedar, or cypress for legs. arms, and framework. Your portable electric jig saw will come in handy to round the chair arms, backs, and legs. Finish yard furniture in exterior grade enamel or stain for longer life.
