TRUSTEES SET COSTS AT SWIM POOL

The prices of admission at the Area Living War Memorial Swimming Pool are the same as in previous years, and were set by the Kendrick Trustees. Individual admissions are: 14 years and under, 25c; 15 years and older, 50c. Season tickets for 14 years and under are \$5.00; for 15 years and older \$7.50.

The family ticket plan is as follows: 4 or less total family members (number must include all in family) \$12; 5 to 7 total members \$15, and 8 or more total members \$17.50. No person under six years of age will be admitted for regular swimming sessions unless accompanied by someone 16 years of age or older. The regular season ticket entitles the swimmer to admittance to all regular sessions and to the swim lessons.

Parents are asked to register their children for swimming lessons as soon as possible. The lessons will be July 13-31, Tuesdays through Saturdays. Beginners must be 6 years old by Sept. 1 to participate.

Again this summer a special lessons ticket will be offered. The price is \$3.00 and entitles the bearer to admittance for lessons, but not for

any of the regular swim sessions.

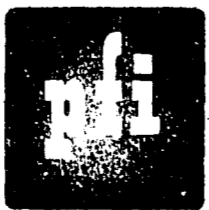

HELP AVAILABLE FOR WATER

Wash., D. C. — Idaho rural areas will be eligible for assistance to protect and improve their water systems if a bill sponsored by Sen. Frank Church, Idaho, passes the Congress.

The bill would authorize loans and grants to both public and private non-profit organizations in communities with a population under 5,000 and would help finance specific projects for works in storage, treatment, purification or distribution of water in our rural areas.

Church said the measure is design-

ed to encourage or establish projects to conserve our land and water, improve drainage facilities and establish recreational areas to benefit our rural communities.

"This bill could be of major importance to Idaho," Church said. "Many of our small communities have been unable to qualify for funds to install or enlarge their water systems. Under this proposal these areas would be eligible for such assistance."

STUDENTS WILL TEACH ELEMENTARY

U. of I., Moscow —Teachers and

students schooling in education this summer at the University of Idaho will also be providing summer school for Moscow area elementary students, according to Dr. John A. Snider, professor of elementary education.

For the 14th consecutive summer, area children will have the opportunity to attend morning summer school classes at no charge, as part of the university teacher education program.

"Students majoring in education and teachers attending summer school at the university, will be teaching the elementary school classes as a part of their study program," Dr. Snider said.

The classes, available for grades

one through six, will be held at the West Park school starting June 28, and lasting through August 5. Class enrollment will be limited to 25 students each, with emphasis on reading, spelling, writing, arithmetic and with some time in each grade devoted to science and social studies.

The only cost to the student for the six-week session will be that of personal supplies and transportation to and from school.

NEW WHEATS ARE BEING DEVELOPED BY UNIVERSITY

U. of I. Moscow — Three new stripe rust-resistant wheat potentially important to Idaho growers are being thoroughly tested by the University of Idaho Agricultural Experiment Station.

Two are soft white spring varieties seen as possible replacements for Lemhi and Federation, according to R. D. Ensign, associate director of the Experiment Station. The third is a hard red winter wheat in the Itana class. All are being increased this year, with the goal of releasing them for production in the 1966 crop year.

The new varieties were reported by experiment station administrators meeting at Moscow with members of the Idaho Wheat Commission. The commission provides financial support for University wheat research programs.

The new winter wheat variety, Itana 65, was developed in the wheat breeding research program directed by W. K. Pope, agronomist at the university's Moscow station. The stripe resistance is "better than any commercial hard red winter wheat in the west," Pope says. It has a high protein level and good tillering capacity. In other characteristics, it is similar to Itana.

The Lemhi-type spring wheat is a selection made by D. W. Sunderman, USDA agronomist at the University's Aberdeen experiment station. In addition to carrying resistance to stripe rust, it has yield and quality equal to Lemhi. These same factors — high yield, high quality and stripe rust resistance — are also characteristics of the Federation type spring wheat selection.

Wheat commission members also heard reports on the university's soil borne disease research program, the operation of the wheat quality laboratory at Aberdeen, and a southern Idaho wheat marketing study.

Research on soil borne diseases, principally snowmoulds and foot rots is being carried out by D. M. Huber, plant pathologist at Moscow. He is investigating affects of cultural and fertilization practices on soil organisms, evaluating chemical control methods and working cooperatively with plant breeders in an attempt to develop resistant lines of wheat.

The Aberdeen Wheat Quality laboratory, headed by Martin Wise, has been an important aid to the state's wheat breeding research programs since it was opened in 1960. All potential new Idaho varieties are tested there for milling and baking quality.

The wheat marketing study by G. Marousek, associate agricultural economist, is designed to provide the first comprehensive analysis of south Idaho wheat marketing programs and patterns, and the price cost factors which affect production and distribution of wheat in the area.

Each of these projects is supported

in part by the Idaho Wheat Commission. For fiscal 1965-66, the commission has approved grants of \$38,111 to aid wheat research programs now underway in the University Agricultural Experiment station.

HINTS ON SUMMER FLOWER GROWING

Pinch out the terminal tips of zinnias to grow more flowers. The plants will put out more branches below the pruned tip, become bushy and start more flower buds.

According to Pennsylvania State University many kinds of plants have more flowers when the terminal tips are removed. Pinching is a method you use to change plant growth.

A soil mulch is important in the summer care of your annuals. Any loose material, such as wood shavings or peanut hulls, spread two inches deep on the ground around plants works well. Weeds won't come through, soil dryness is reduced and the ground stays cooler.

Your garden soil in mid-summer sun may go over 100 degrees. That's much too hot for shallow rooted plants like zinnias, marigolds and a host of others. Growth of flower buds comes to a halt with roots in hot, dry soil.

So, to produce more flowers, pinch out growing tips on your tall-growing annuals. And keep your plants in better condition by covering the soil with mulch.


