In 1880, for every 100 persons engaged in all phases of Idaho agriculture, about 20 were employed in stock raising.

Since there are more varied weather conditions over the great area of Idaho than exist in the Kingdoms of Britain, Scotland and Wales, the kinds of farming employed in the state are varied. By 1890 agriculture overtook mining as a provider of employment, and soon far surpassed the mining industry in this respect.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Chicago — The nation's best 4-H public speakers will compete for two \$500 scholarships offered by an oil company, sponsor since 1950 of the National 4-H Public Speaking program. Names of the winners will be announced at the National 4-H Club Congress next fall.

The scholarships will go to the top boy and girl winners, who will be selected by the Cooperative Extension Service. To be eligible for these national awards, the club member must have completed at least three years of 4-H work and be between the ages of 14 and 19 years, in addition to being an accomplished speaker.

The scholarship winners will also receive trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 28 through December 2.

GEOLOGY STUDY

U. of I., Moscow, Dr. Rolland R. Reid, Dean of the College of Mines at the University of Idaho, has been awarded a grant of \$10,900 by the National Science Foundation for support of research on the geology of the St. Joe area of Northern Idaho.

The grant will provide money for a number of radio-active age determinations, which will aid in determining the complex problems involving several metamorphic, structural and igneous events about the geologic history of Idaho, according to Dean Reid.

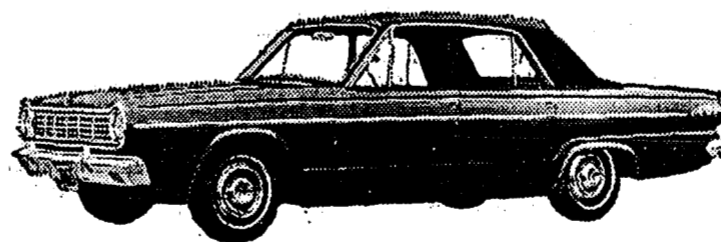

AROUSED OVER LACK OF SALMON IN SALMON RIVER

Wash., D. C. — Senator Len Jordan last week urged the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service to make a complete and thorough investigation of the rapidly diminishing summer salmon run on Idaho's Salmon River.

Jordan noted that John Woodworth, director of the Idaho Fish and Game Commission, has been forced to issue a closure on salmon fishing in Idaho because of the greatly depleted number of salmon that are getting into Idaho rivers to spawn this year. The Idaho senator also told U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service officials that Idaho sportsmen and small businesses that service the salmon sports fishermen, have been very aroused by the ban.

"It is not Woodworth's fault that the ban had to be placed," Jordan commented. "In fact he was acting in a judicious, prudent manner as prescribed by Idaho law to help save the salmon run," the Senator commented.

"Over the past decade considerable sums of money have been expended by the federal government in attempts to improve the salmon run, Jordan noted. Now, ten years later, we find that instead of improving the salmon run, it has dropped even lower."

Senator Jordan noted that the State of Idaho had expended considerable sums also in seeking to im-

prove conditions for the spawning salmon. It has built fish ladders, fish screens and improved spawning areas to aid salmon propagation, the Idaho senator explained. "However, this year the salmon haven't gotten to Idaho due to no fault of Idahoans or Idaho terrain."

Senator Jordan noted that not only the Idaho Fish and Game Commission but most Idahoans in general, have backed past programs for salmon run improvements. They have given overwhelming support to proposals of the Idaho Wild Life Federation to keep the Salmon River and its tributaries free of dams or other such obstacles. In fact, we have been commended nationally for our efforts in this regard, Jordan said.

"Now that the situation has deteriorated to the point where the year's run is one of the lowest in recent years, the people of Idaho are demanding an explanation. They want to know if all of their efforts and the large sums of money that have been expended cannot aid the situation — or can anything be done to reverse the decreasing salmon run into Idaho?"
