**COMMERCIAL CLUB MEETS WEDNESDAY**  
 March 15, 1945 — Nineteen members of the Kendrick Commercial Club enjoyed a fine 7:00 o'clock dinner at the McCoy Confectionery, and then met at the city hall for their business session.  
 G. F. Brocke reported that a quick survey of business institutions here suggested that in the post-war period we could undoubtedly support the following businesses or combinations: Laundry and dry cleaning; shoe, harness and canvas repair shop, a chick hatchery, plumbing and electric repair shop. He was appointed as a committee chairman to make a more thorough investigation. L. S. Thurber of the Merchants Committee concurred with Mr. Brocke's report.  
 E. T. Long, Highway Committee, reported that the Kendrick Highway District had purchased 1,500 tons of crushed rock to date for use on roads in the district. He said, however, that to date, soft roads made distribution impossible.  
 H. C. Schupfer of the Industrial Committee said that the concrete base plate for the big new city pump had been poured. A test of the well showed 245 feet-9 inches. The new pump will soon be put in and operationally tested in preparation for the coming summer.  
 Dr. Christensen of the Civic Improvement Committee reported that one of Kendrick's crying needs was for new homes, as quite a number of people had expressed a desire to locate here, but found no housing was available.
