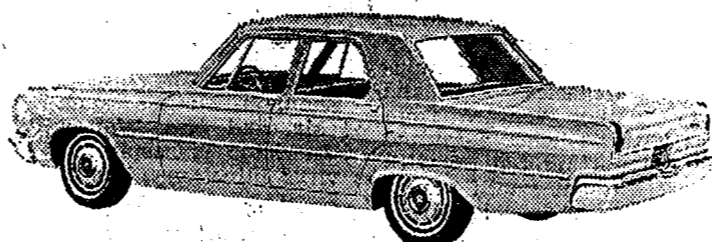

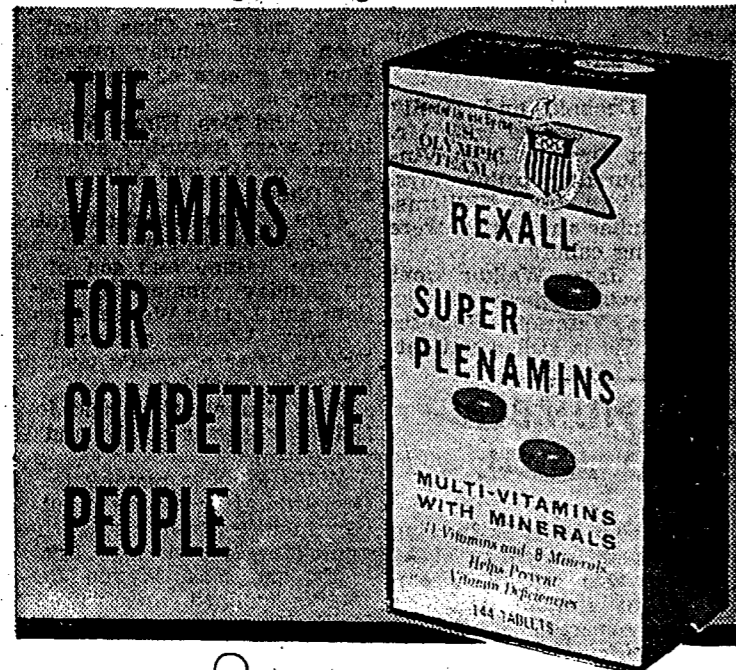

Wild mountain goat in circular trap on Snow Peak resists Ray Rogers, Coeur d'Alene area biologist, who is "bulldogging" the animal so it can be "hog-tied", blindfolded, and horns blunted by rubber tubing, then tranquilized for air, truck and boat trip to new home on shores of Lake Pend Oreille.

Altogether, 17 mountain goats have been trapped, tagged and liberated on rugged mountains above Echo Bay as a means of re-establishing this highly prized trophy animal where it has not been for many years.


