The early-arriving women registered for sorority rush between 10:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m. Sunday at Forney Hall. From 5:00 to 9:00 p. m. they took their first tour of all sorority houses. Sorority rush continued throughout the week until Friday afternoon, when each coed pledged a selected house.

Their rush activities also continued through Friday.

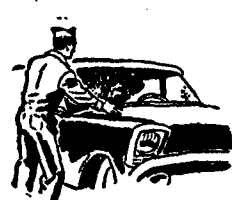

STILL TRAVELING

Wash., D. C. — Although Mariner IV has not been in the news too much since transmission on July 14 of the first close photograph of Mars, the spacecraft still is transmitting engineering and scientific data as it continues its 570-day orbit around the sun. Mariner IV is operating properly and the signals are strong, according to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

On its 285th day of travel, Mariner IV had covered about 365,000,000 miles and its speed, relative to the earth, was 77,331 miles per hour.

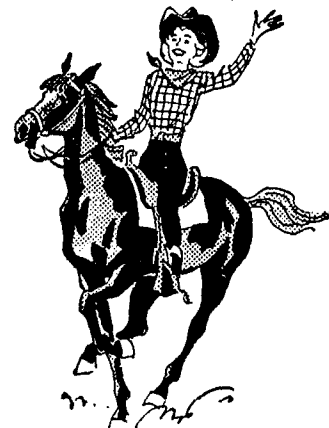
