**HOTEL BE USED TO HOUSE STUDENTS**

U. of I., Moscow — The Moscow

Hotel will be used this semester to take care of an overflow of men students at the University of Idaho — perhaps about 60 — it was announced by President Ernest W. Hartung. Resident enrollment this fall now appears certain to rise above any expectations. Earlier predictions had

been made that it would pass the 5,500 mark. Just what it will be will not be known until after registration, Sept. 21 and 22, because pre-circulated statistics are not holding true to form.

Dr. Hartung, who has long been dedicated to the philosophy of "bringing higher education to the greatest possible number of qualified young men and women," commented: "Higher percentages of applicants than in previous years, both among old and new students, are showing up at the university, and it is vital that we do everything possible to help the students find living quarters."

Arrangements to provide a dormitory-type atmosphere are being made by Robert Greene, director of dormitories, and Guy P. Wicks, associate dean of students.

This is not the first time the Moscow Hotel has served a large group of students. When new fraternity houses have not been ready for occupancy, members have utilized the hotel.

Power Co. announced this week that on Sept. 27, it is returning to envelope billing for its services. John B. Murray, Palouse Division manager, said that W. W. P. changed from envelope to postcard billing almost twenty years ago, but that the development of flexible and highly efficient envelope inserting systems has made it feasible for the company to again use envelopes.

"There are a number of reasons why envelope billing is becoming increasingly popular with utility companies across the nation," Murray said. "First, there are indications that more and more customers have come to view their utility service bills as a personal matter and as such, to be handled more confidentially. Secondly, each year more and more of our customers have asked that we include a return envelope with our statement and we obviously could not do this with a postcard-type statement."

"When W. W. P. changed to postcard billing 20 years ago most of our customers still came to a company office or pay station to pay their utility bill," Murray pointed out. "Today, these same people pay their bills by check. Just the single fact that envelope billing provides them with a return envelope, already addressed, will be a convenience greatly appreciated by our customers."

The electronic inserting machine to be used by W. W. P. will be the largest of its kind west of the Mississippi river. After inserting the customer's utility bill and a pre-addressed return envelope it can insert special notices such as greetings to new customers and information for the company's electric, gas, water or steam users. The company processes and mails about 8,000 customer service accounts each working day, a total of approximately 168,000 each month.

"We do not intend to load our service bills with any large number of additional inserts," Murray said, "but we will resume sending 'Timely Cooking Tips' to all of our customers as a part of a little 'Gazette' they will receive with each statement."

"This popular little folder will be remembered by many of our customers, particularly housewives, who were W. W. P. customers before we went to postcard billing. Some of our customers still have bound volumes of these recipes and they prize them very highly."

"Additional items to be published in the 'Gazette' will cover use and care of electric and gas equipment and appliances, fabric care, vacation ideas, party ideas, and information about the company we feel our customers should know."

"The costs associated with the change will be offset by the efficiencies of the high-speed inserter and conveniences accruing to our customers," Murray said.

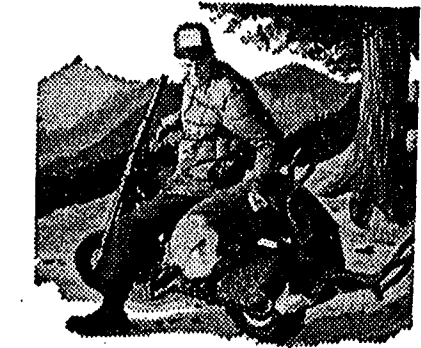



**U. OF I. TO BUILD NEW DORMITORY**

U. of I., Moscow — The University

of Idaho Board of Regents, meeting at Boise, approved a loan agreement for \$1,300,000 with the U. S. Housing and Home Finance Agency for construction of a fourth dormitory unit of the Wallace Residence Cen-

ter, Dr. Ernest W. Hartung, announced last week.

This unit, which will house 315 single men students when completed in the fall of 1967, will complete the center for more than a thousand students. As with all dormitories at the university, the financing is provided by Regent's Bonds, to be paid off from revenue.

Authorization was given by the Regents for the university to call for bids on the construction of a new potato storage warehouse at

Aberdeen. Plans were also to be developed for an insectary building at the Parma branch experiment station, an abattoir and meats laboratory on the university farm at Moscow, and improved irrigation laterals at the Parma and Twin Falls Branch Experiment Stations.

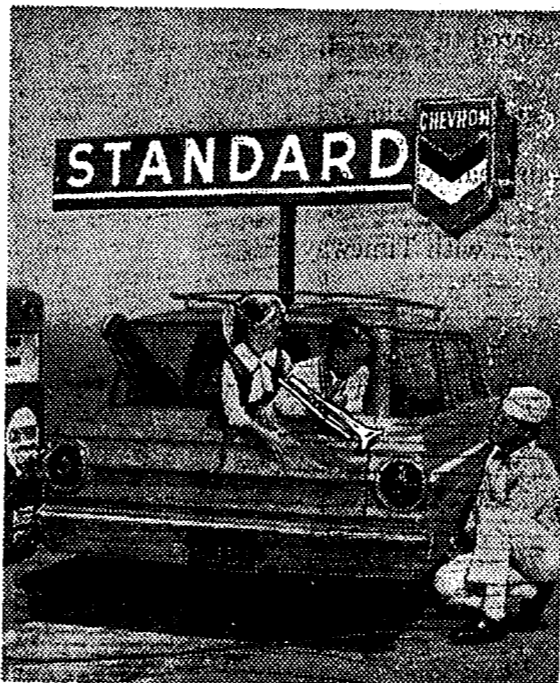
