Reserve quarterback Mark Pearson threw four touchdown passes, all to Ken Heimgartner, to take the Kendrick Tigers to a 31-27 District II, eight-man high school, football victory over the Deary Mustangs here Friday night. Deary led most of the first half, but couldn't maintain the pace.

Bob Kellom got the Mustangs on the scoreboard first with a 15-yard first quarter dash. Ron Rueppel passed to Ed Lundstrom for the conversion. Kendrick pulled even before the quarter ended on Bruce Vincent's 60-yard dash and Heimgartner's conversion.

Then Rueppel passed 28 yards to Kellom, who also converted, as Deary again went ahead in the second period. Pearson clicked on his first scoring effort afterwards but a missed conversion on the 45-yard play left Deary ahead, and the Mustangs added still more as Rueppel passed for 15 yards to Rick Swecker for an unconverted touchdown just before the halftime.

The teams played to a standoff in the third period, with no scoring, and then Pearson went to work in the final stanza, hitting Heimgartner on touchdown passes of 20, 45 and 25 yards. None of the conversion tries were good.

Lundstrom of Deary closed out the scoring on a 60-yard dash in the final 30 seconds, and Kellom converted.

The Tigers will play Troy at Troy this Friday evening.

## PETER J. SMITH DIES AT AGE 93

Peter John Smith, 93, a pioneer whose occupations included making bricks, breaking horses, farming and hauling wood, died at 10:15 a. m. Thursday, Oct. 21 at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lewiston of the infirmities of age.

Smith, whose home was at 2604 16th Ave., Lewiston, had lived in Lewiston since 1954.

He was born Oct. 27, 1871, in Benton County, Iowa, one of 12 children of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Elias Smith. Smith married Cora Blanch Kibb in 1897 in Cherry County, Neb. When his family decided to move to Idaho in 1900, Smith, his wife and two children came along. By 1901 they were settled at Southwick, where he lived until he and his wife separated in 1914. He then went to Wyoming where he lived until 1941.

His son-in-law and daughter, the Rev. and Mrs. E. W. Pressnell, then of Deary, brought him back to Southwick in 1941. He farmed there until moving to Ahsahka in 1948. While at Ahsahka he hauled wood by the cord.

In 1954 he moved to Lewiston, where he occupied himself by keeping house, tending two horses, and a flock of chickens, fishing and hunting.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Pressnell of Culedeas; three sisters, Mrs. Ida McAllister of Spokane, Mrs. George Baker and Mrs. Margaret Parker, both of Coos Bay, Ore.; eight grandchildren, 25 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p. m. Saturday at the Brower-Wann Chapel with the Rev. Arlie Whybark, pastor of the Clarkston U. B. Church officiating. Burial was in the Southwick Cemetery.

## IS 'MAKING LIKE AN OSTRICH' GOING TO HELP KEEP TRAIN?

As the days have passed since the Northern Pacific announced it was going to discontinue its passenger service on this branch line Nov. 1st — and the first protest meeting was held in Kendrick Friday, October 8, with Lewiston, Juliaetta, Kendrick, Troy, Moscow and Pullman participating — interest has climbed and other communities have gone all-out in protest against the proposed removal. Garfield filed a protest, Colfax filed a protest, and the Colfax Gazette-Commoner devoted a great deal of time and space, including pictures, to a fine presentation and protest of the problem.

### Not So Spokane!

That is, almost all communities except Spokane, and its Spokane papers. They, like the "proverbial ostrich" have chosen to ignore the problem, apparently hoping that by "hiding their heads" they can avoid any responsibility one way or the other — or else they're just plain "not interested."

To our knowledge this item, taken from the Spokesman-Review, Thursday, October 21, is every bit of space devoted to this problem:

"NP Trains Get Brief Reprieve — Washington — The Interstate Commerce Commission has halted the scheduled Oct. 31 discontinuance of two Northern Pacific Railway trains between Spokane and Lewiston, Idaho, Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., reported Wednesday. He said an investigation had been ordered and that the train service will be continued pending a hearing and decision whether continuance of Trains 311 and 314 was in the public interest."

In the same issue over twice as much space was devoted to an account of someone inspecting a dump ground!

As will be noted in the article following, many desire to turn the train schedule "around" for better connections and more time at Spokane — but apparently the Spokane Chamber of Commerce and Spokane's big daily papers "couldn't care less." No wonder the Sunday editions are filled with "Houses for Rent and For Sale" in that city!

### Others Go Into Battle

From Senator Frank Church of Idaho to Geo. F. Brocke, Sr., local chairman, comes the following copy of an order from the ICC:

"Order, Service date October 20, 1965. At a session of the Interstate Commerce Commission, Division 3, held at its office in Washington, D. C., on the 19th day of October, A. D., 1965. Finance Docket No. 23820.

"Northern Pacific Railway Co. Discontinuance of Trains Nos. 311 and 314 between Spokane, Wash., and Lewiston, Idaho

"It appearing that on Sept. 27, 1965, the Northern Pacific Railway Co. filed with this commission notices under Section 13a(1) of the Interstate Commerce Act, as amended, that effective October 31, 1965, said carrier will discontinue service of its passenger trains Nos. 311 and 314 between Spokane, Wash., and Lewiston, Idaho:

"It further appearing, That complaints by certain individuals, associations, communities and railway employees have been received requesting suspension of the proposed discontinuance pending investigation to determine the extent of public need for the trains in question;

"It further appearing, That discontinuance of the said train service by the Northern Pacific Railway Co. may not be warranted by the public convenience and necessity, and that operation of such service may not unduly burden interstate commerce;

"It further appearing, That the due and timely execution of this Commission's functions in this proceeding imperatively and unavoidably requires the omission of an examiner's recommended decision herein, for the reason that under the provisions of Section 13a(1) of the Interstate Commerce Act the said train service may be discontinued unless a decision herein is made before expiration of the four-month period hereinafter provided for;

"It is ordered, That an investigation of the proposed discontinuance of train service described hereinabove be, and it is hereby, instituted under the provisions of Section 13a(1) of the Interstate Commerce Act, and that the matter be assigned for hearing at a time and place hereafter to be fixed;

"It is further ordered, That the train service described hereinabove be continued pending hearing and decision in said investigation, but not for a longer period than four months beyond the date when the discontinuance otherwise would have become effective unless otherwise ordered herein; and

"It is further ordered, That a recommended decision by the examiner to whom the investigation is assigned for hearing be omitted as part of the decision-making process in this proceeding, and the record herein shall be considered as certified to the Commission, Division 3, for initial decision when received by the Secretary of the Commission for filing in the docket.

"By the Commission, Division 3. — H. NEIL CARLSON, Secretary."

## P. F. I. TO DEDICATE HUGE NEW MILL NEAR PIERCE, IDAHO

San Francisco, Calif. — Potlatch Forests, Inc., will dedicate a multi-million dollar plywood mill at Jaype, Idaho, Nov. 30, and the nation's biggest hardwood sawmill at Warren, Arkansas, Dec. 2. Addition of the Jaype mill will increase the company's annual plywood production capacity to 300 million square feet (3/8" basis). This is more than double present plywood production. Benton R. Cancell, president of the San Francisco-based forest products company, said start of operations at the two new mills continues a long-range program to expand and improve the company's production facilities.

The Jaype mill is located near the heart of the Potlatch logging area some 80 miles east of Lewiston, Ida. It is built on a 45-acre site with seven acres under roof. The mill will produce 150 million square feet of sheathing plywood and 50 million feet of studs a year. The main building

is 900 feet long and 300 feet wide. One of the major products to be produced in the Jaype mill is 1/2-inch, 3-ply plywood. This plywood sheathing, which Potlatch calls "Triple-Dek" is formed of thicker plies than standard plywood and is gaining increasing acceptance in the home building and heavy construction industries.

Idaho Gov. Robert E. Smylie, U. S. Senator Len E. Jordan and U. S. Congressman Compton I. White and George Hanson, head a list of dignitaries expected to attend the Jaype ceremonies.

While at Jaype the dedication group will visit the huge Dworshak Dam project on the North Fork of the Clearwater river, and also tour a 150-home housing development sponsored by Potlatch at Pierce, Idaho, for Jaype mill employees and other new residents coming into the area.

### ABOUT YOU AND MEDICARE KITS

Lewiston — By now all elderly social security of railroad retirement beneficiaries in the area served by the Lewiston district office of the Social Security should have received their kits and the enclosed application for the supplementary medical insurance part of Medicare, James B. Myers, district manager, said.

About 600 other older persons — those not on the S. S. or Railroad retirement rolls — have already been in touch with the district office in Lewiston, he reports. But many others need to take action to protect their Medicare rights.

Eight out of ten aged persons will be reached through the mass mailing he noted. About a third of those who will not be reached this way are receiving old-age pension assistance payments and will hear directly from their welfare agencies.

Another third are still working full time and will need to file S. S. applications.

The enrollment period for those who will be 65 or over before the end of the year closes March 31, 1966, Myers pointed out. The March 31 deadline is very important. Everyone who is 65 or will be by Jan. 1, 1966, must return the medical insurance enrollment card by that date — whether received in the mail or picked up at an S. S. district office, if he or she wants full protection

when the program goes into effect July 1, 1966.

For the housebound, the district office will make arrangements to have an S. S. representative pay a visit to them at home.

### TAXES GO UP ON AVERAGE EARNER

Wash., D. C. — For most wage earners last year's income tax cut will be more than wiped out by a combination of the ever-rising cost of living, and the increase in Social Security taxes — including Medicare, recently enacted by Congress.

A married man with two children whose salary was \$4,000 in 1963, will need \$87.00 more in 1966 if he is to maintain the same buying power. If he earned \$12,000 in 1963, his 1966 income will have to be \$12,247 to maintain the status quo.

If a married man with two children was in the \$25,000 per year bracket in 1963, and remains there next year, he will be ahead of the game by only \$4.00 in terms of buying power.

These figures are based upon data from the Departments of Labor and Treasury, and are computed by using the minimum standard deduction equal to 10 percent of gross income, whichever is larger. No allowances are made for state and or local taxes, which are increasing steadily. — Senator Len B. Jordan.

### U. OF I. TO SEAT NEW PRESIDENT

U. of I., Moscow — The biggest academic procession in the University of Idaho's history will be held at 10 a. m., Saturday, Oct. 30, for the inauguration of Dr. Ernest W. Hartung as the 12th president of the

university. A total of 123 universities and colleges and 10 learned and professional societies will be represented at the ceremonies. The representatives traditionally march in the order of the founding of their institutions, with a representative of Harvard university, founded in 1636, usually heading the procession of delegates. The Uni-

versity of Idaho procession will be no exception, with Scott Bruce Lukins, Spokane attorney, representing Harvard in the No. 1 position.

President Hartung will give the inaugural address after his introduction by Curtis T. Eaton, Twin Falls, president of the Board of Regents. Dr. Hartung will present his views on the university's role in higher education.

Greetings from the State of Idaho will be given by Gov. Robert E. Smylie; from the faculty of the university by Prof. William C. Banks; from the alumni by Charles Herndon, Salmon, president of the Idaho Alumni Association, and from the students by William V. McCann, Jr., Lewiston, president of the Associated Students. Invocation and benediction will be by Rev. Richard A. Lundy, First Presbyterian Church, Moscow. The professional and recreational will be played by the University Symphonic band, conducted by Warren Bellis. Singing will be by the Vandaleer Concert Choir, conducted by Glen R. Lockery. The entire audience will participate in the singing of the alma mater, "Here We Have Idaho," led by Prof. Hall M. Macklin, head of the music department.

Following the ceremonies a luncheon will be held in the Student Union for the representatives of the various institutions and learned professional societies. At the luncheon, Dr. Francis Horn, president of the University of Rhode Island where Hartung served as vice president before coming to Idaho, will be the principal speaker. Among the honored guests will be Senator Len B. Jordan of Idaho.

### S. S. AND FARMERS

Boise — Farmers should regularly deposit social security taxes for their farm employees, Internal Revenue officials warned this week.

**Washington Utilities Acts**  
 The Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, A. J. McGinn, State Representative, sent a copy of the following telegram, sent by the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission, as follows:

"Olympia, Wash., Oct. 13, 1965 — H. Neil Carlson, Secretary; Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D. C.:

"Re: Proposed discontinuance passenger trains 311 and 314 Northern Pacific Railway Company between Spokane, Washington and Lewiston, Idaho, filed under Section 13a(1) Interstate Commerce Act scheduled to become effective October 31, 1965. The Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission desires and requests that the Interstate Commerce Commission make a thorough investigation into this proposal and if necessary have public hearings at appropriate points in this state. We have received protests from the Pasalla, Washington, Chamber of Commerce and the Garfield Chamber of Commerce which request that the Northern Pacific Railroad reverse its schedule between Spokane, Washing-

ton and Lewiston, Idaho, which they state will result in vastly better service and increased patronage of the line. The notice and statement of the railroad filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission contains exhibits indicating that there is a quite substantial patronage of the line by passengers between the affected points. — Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission. By: Robert D. Timm, Secretary."

Mr. McGinn, of the BRT, also said in part in his letter:

"On October 4, 1965, I air-mailed a letter to A. H. Chesser, National Legislative Representative for the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, requesting that he oppose the discontinuance of Northern Pacific trains numbers 311-314 now operating between Spokane and Lewiston."

"On October 6, 1965, our Brotherhood officially filed a protest and asked that hearings be held at various points that would be affected on this line."

It has been suggested by several area residents that Lewiston, Juliaetta, Kendrick, Troy and Moscow, the Idaho communities affected, employ an attorney to coordinate and prepare information for presentation at the coming hearings. What action may be taken on this matter is not known at this time, as it will necessarily be a matter for the various Chambers of Commerce and Committee heads to decide.
