P. F. I. BUYS HUGE PLYWOOD PLANT

Lewiston - Purchase of a major interest in the St. Maries Plywood Co. was announced last week by Pot-latch Forests, Inc. The St. Maries plant began production one year ago and has an annual capacity of about 80 million square feet of sheathing plywood.

Pollatch, with executive offices in San Francisco and general offices in San Francisco and general offices in Lewiston, Idaho, is a major producer of forest products ranging from lum-ber and wood specialty items to pulp, paperboard, tissue and packaging products and fine papers. Annual plywood production alone now totals some 380 million square feet (3/8" basic) from the large plant in Lewbasis) from the large plant in Lew-iston, a multi-million dollar plant started up last month at Jaype, Idaho, and the St. Maries plant.

The St. Maries transaction included the purchase of the equity formerly owned by the Carolina Pacific Plywood, Inc., of Medford, Ore., and a portion of the remaining equity owned by the Atlas Tie Co. of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Atlas Tie will retain its management contract and Potlatch will handle product sales.

Plant operations will continue unchanged with John M. Richards continuing as vice president and general manager of St. Maries. A new president will be elected later to fill the vacancy created by the resigna-tion of B. D. Mitchell of Carolina Pacific.







Section 4: Licenses and Bonds for Sewer Connections.

No connections shall be made with any sewers or drains of the Village sewer system except by persons regularly licensed to perform such work. The license fee for persons engaged in such work in the Village of Kendrick shall be \$10.00 per year or a part thereof and shall be paid at the time of application for license. In addition to the application any person intending to engage in such work in the Village of Kendrick shall comply with, and furnish evidence of compliance, with the laws of the State of Idaho pertaining to private contractors and shall file a separate bond in the office of the Village Clerk in the penal sum of \$1000.00, said bond to be in a form approved by the Board of Trustees and conditioned that the said applicant will indemnify and hold harmless the Village of Kendrick from all claims, damages and accidents occasioned by the applicant or those in his employee or under his direction, resulting from the making of any connections of a private sewer or drain with the Village sewer system or for any other purpose, and that he will restore any street alley, parkway or other public place which may be disturbed by such work to a condition as good as it was prior to the commencement of his work, providing, however, that this section shall not prevent any property owner from making connections from his premises to the sewer system if such connection shall meet the specifications as herein set forth; provided, however, if the connection is to be made by the property owner, the Village may extend the sewer stub or line from the sewer system main to the owner's property line and the owner will pay the Village the cost of such extension and installation under such agreement as the Village may enter into with the property owner. 





Or soak beans with soda in measured amount of water overnight. To cook, put kettle of beans with soaking water on high heat. Add salt and oil or butter to keep down the foam. When boiling, reduce heat to simmer. Cover tightly and cook 2 hours or until tender.
