



HUGE ANTLERS

Boise - Huge Antlers totalled 410 points on a preliminary measurement and were the second largest ever measured in Idaho. The big bull was bagged last month on South Mountain in the Owyhees by Cecil Coonts of Wilder, who fired the killing shot and Bill Blackman of Homedale. The top Idaho elk trophy, measuring 414 and 4/8 points, ranks Number 4 in the all-time Boone and Crockett Club record books. It was bagged on the Weiser River by Elmer Bacus in 1954. The Idaho Fish and Game Department says that new Idaho game trophy records are set almost every year in several different categories.

potato industry is taking giant strides toward keeping fresh Idaho Russets on the housewife's table 12 months of the year, a University of Idaho horticulturist believes.

Walter C. Sparks, whose potato storage research at the Aberdeen branch Agricultural Experiment station has gained worldwide recognition, estimates that storage for more than 4 million sacks (hundred weight) of potatoes has been built during 1965 alone in southern Idaho.

And, he says, at least half of these new facilities are equipped with the humidity, airflow and temperature controls necessary for extended potato storage.

"Most of the shippers are aiming at a 12-month marketing season for fresh Idaho Russets, Sparks points out. "Now our fresh season runs from about mid-August until May. That leaves nearly three months each summer when no fresh Idaho potatoes are available and buyers have to turn to other sources.

From a storage standpoint, the year-around marketing goal is well within reach.

"Our research proves we can store potatoes for 10 1/2 or 11 months with no more storage loss than we used to have in eight months," Sparks says. "The three critical factors, are humidity, airflow and temperature."

"For successful storage, you must be able to hold humidity above 90 percent, to force airflow through the potatoes at a rate of 10 cubic feet per minute per ton, and to keep temperature within a range of 40 to 45 degrees in the pile," the horticulturist says.

"If airflow and humidity are adequately controlled and if a good sprout inhibitor has been used, the best storage temperature is 45 degrees throughout the storage period.

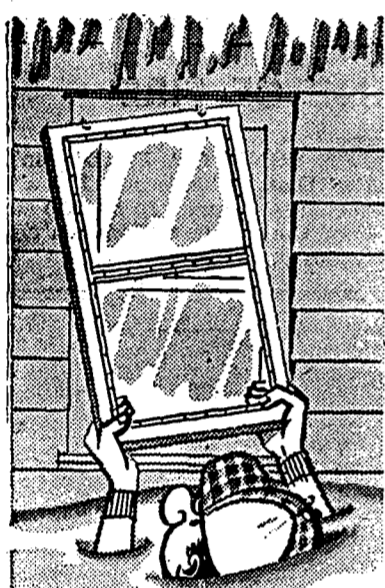

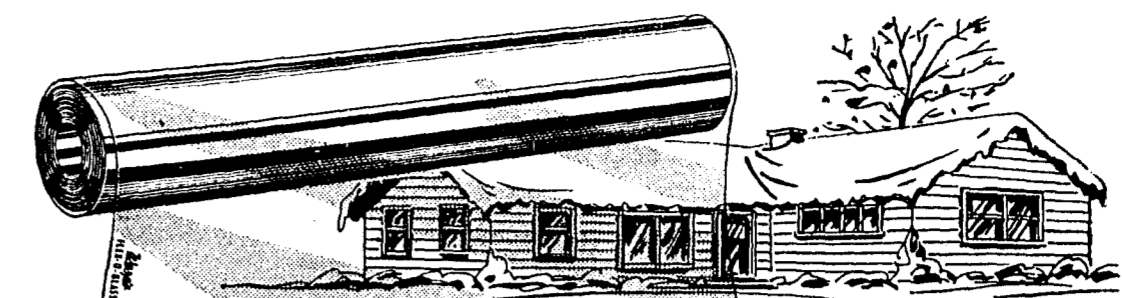

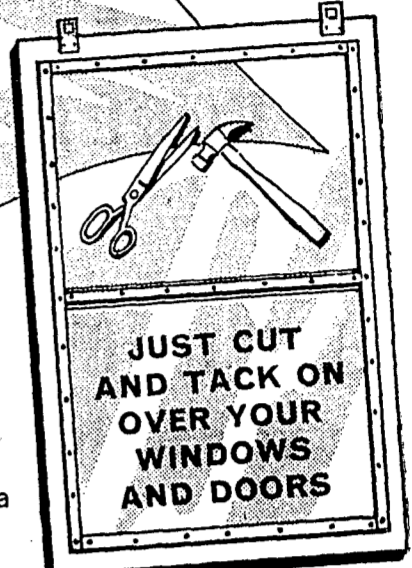

PLATE DEADLINE SET FOR JAN. 18

Latah County Assessor today announced the 1966 vehicle license plates would go on sale December 1, 1965 and that all vehicles must be licensed by January 18, 1966. He stated that there would be strict enforcement commencing January 19, 1966 for vehicles operating with expired license plates. The Commissioner of Law Enforcement has extended the registration time to January 18, 1966. This will allow expeditious handling of all applicants at the state and county level as well as providing at least one pay period after the holidays in order that all registrants may comply before the deadline authorized. The Assessor advised those persons who have purchased a new vehicle during the year and have not transferred the title to do so prior to registration as all vehicles — except small two-wheeled trailers must be titled prior to registration. The Assessor warned all passenger vehicle owners to register in the county of their residence. Failure to register in your home county is a violation of the Idaho registration act.

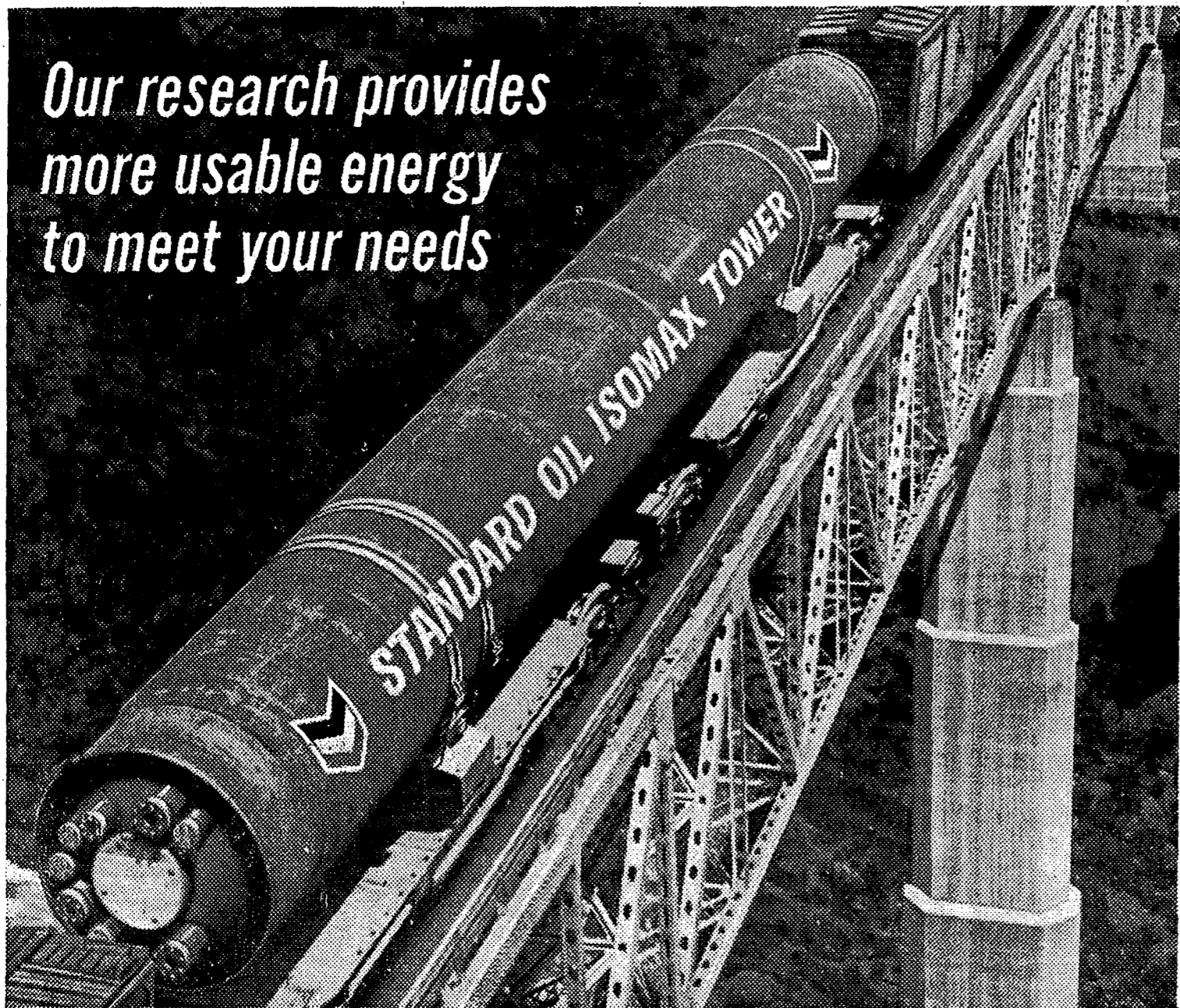
DEATH RAYS NEW PEST KILLERS
