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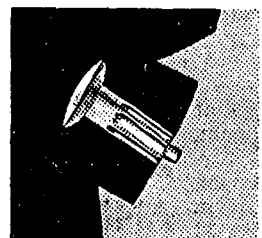
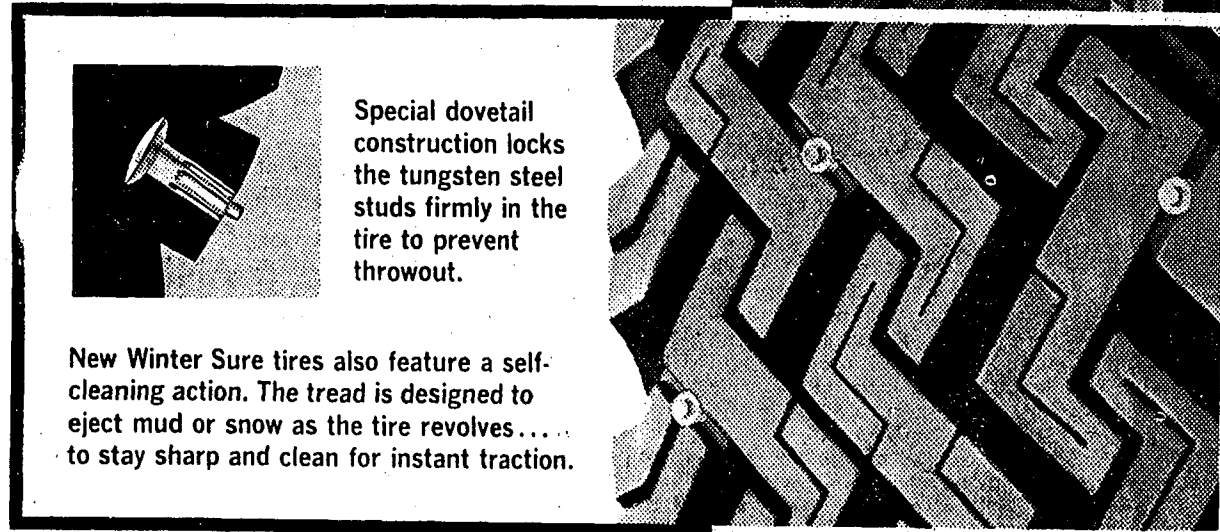

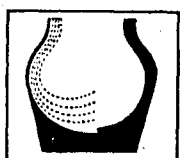

### LOSS OF SALMON TERRIFIC BLOW TO PACIFIC N. WEST

San Francisco — A plea for help to save the salmon and steelhead runs in the Columbia River and inland waters of Oregon and Washington. It will be an issue backed by all major sportsmen's organizations in California, Oregon, Idaho and Washington.

The issue will not affect the ocean troll. It will merely stop netting in the Columbia River and inland waters of Oregon and Washington. Why closure now? All agencies working with salmon and steelhead recognize that there have been huge declines in populations. The spring chinook has been netted practically to extinction. Only 12,000 spring chinook salmon crossed Ice Harbor dam on their way to their spawning streams this year. The need is for at least 200,000 spring chinook to support an ocean troll fishery, and a sports fishery for the economic growth of the great Columbia Basin.

What happened to the spring chinook salmon run this spring? They were overnetted to almost the point of extinction. The prized fall chinook formerly the most abundant of our salmon has decreased on the spawn beds to a very dangerous low in numbers. The number of effective spawners declined more than two-thirds of the mature fish needed.

This fact poses a problem of major significance because the entire salmon fishery, ocean troll and sports, depends basically on a four-year life cycle of the salmon.

Who loses a livelihood in the netted areas? No one, because no one makes a living netting. Surveys showed not a single case of livelihood netting salmon in inland waters.

Who are the netters? Regular business men, workers in industry of the area, owners of moorages, party boat operators, farm workers and, in some cases, even the retired. Some come from ocean fishery, and others net during vacation. Everyone nets on a strictly part-time basis. Otherwise, the netters are moonlighters.

Closure to netting means more salmon excaaping to the spawn beds and, last but not least, more salmon to sports fishery. These great fish are the key to a one hundred and fifty million dollar annual tourist business for the Columbia Basin in the near future. Eastern Oregon, eastern Washington and Idaho have gone as far as they can in agriculture, timber, mining. Large industry will be slow in developing, so the future lies in the development of the areas' greatest natural resource — recreation. Stream closure to netting benefits all Oregon, Washington and Idaho economically.

Sports fishermen for salmon and steelhead spent twenty-five million dollars in the Columbia Basin last year, while these great fish were worth approximately one million dollars to the gillnetters last year. What is your answer to this?

Closure to netting of the Columbia River and in all inland waters of Oregon and Washington will increase the number of mature salmon for spawning purposes.

Closure will make more salmon available for sports fishery, thus bringing about the establishment of more business to cater to sportsmen and tourists.

This alone would add millions of dollars to the tax rolls of the areas involved. Plus many additional millions of dollars will be spent by the sportsmen fishing these streams. Stream closure to netting means more salmon for the market by increasing the ocean troll catches. — Tony Whitney.

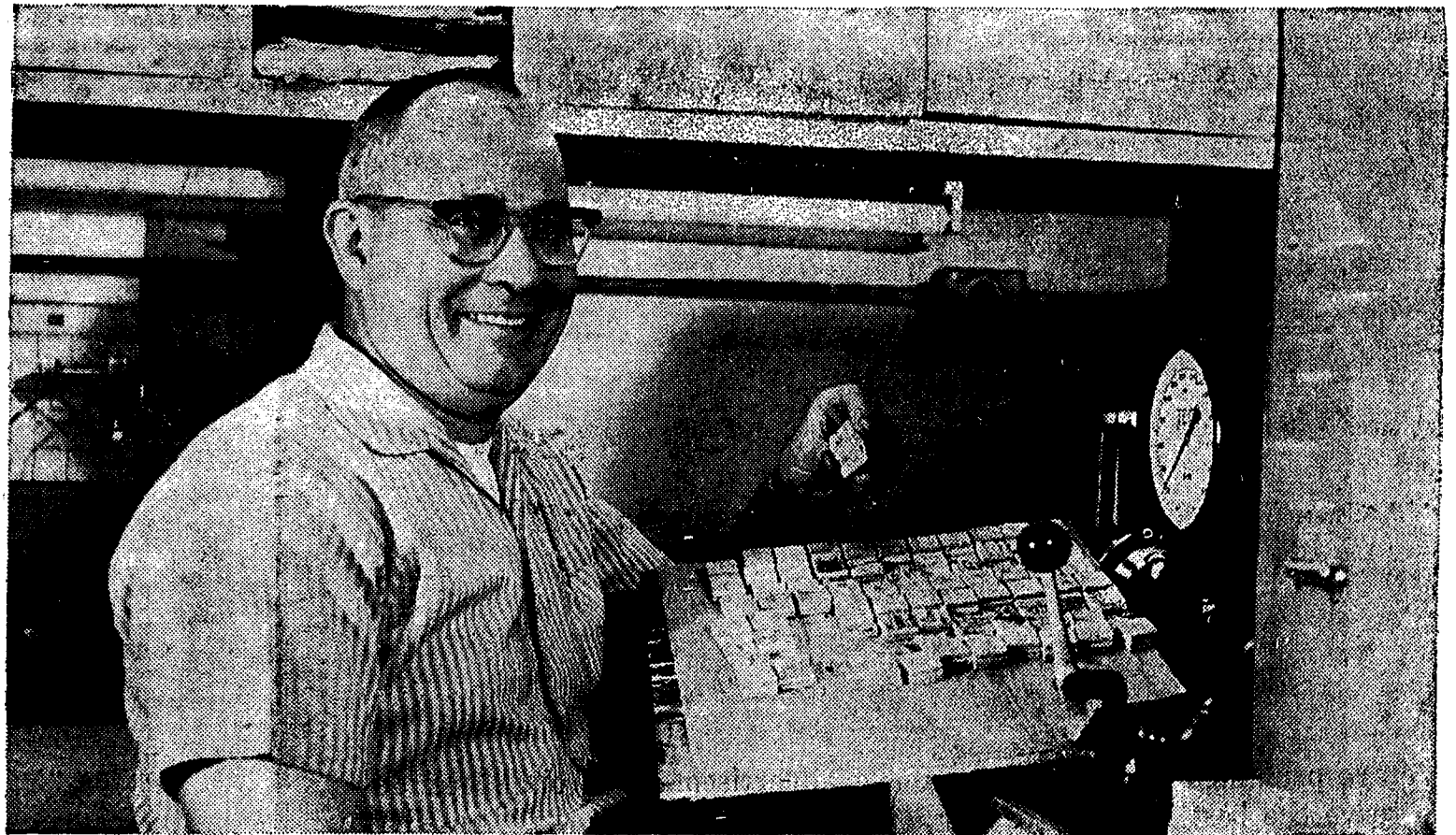

Here are a few of the important keys to remember when selecting your laundry equipment. They were compiled by Dorothy Smith, Home Economist for the Washington Water Power Co.

One or more speeds? If you do more than three or four loads a week, if you have a wide variety of fabrics, additional speeds are worth more than their slight additional cost. You get the vigorous action needed for heavier items, plus slower speeds for lighter things. This lets you do all your laundry automatically; no more hand washing.

How many cycles? This depends on the number of fabrics you frequently wash. If you do lots of synthetics and no-iron garments, insist on at least three cycles: regular, gentle and wash-and-wear. A good wash-and-wear cycle can save you hours at the ironing board.

Variable water level? This feature lets you match the quantity of water to the size and type of load.

Water Temperature control? You can choose between hot (140-180) for household whites, and warm or even cold wash and rinse temperatures which are important for synthetics and wash-and-wear.

Special soaking features? By all means if there's a baby in the family. Many washers offer a manual, soak, or pre-soak setting for diapers and heavily-soiled garments. At least one has an automatic soak period which saves steps if your washer is in the basement.

Automatic dispensers are important also if your washer is many steps away. No need to dash downstairs to add bleach or rinse conditioner. The washer pours in the additive at just the right time, automatically.

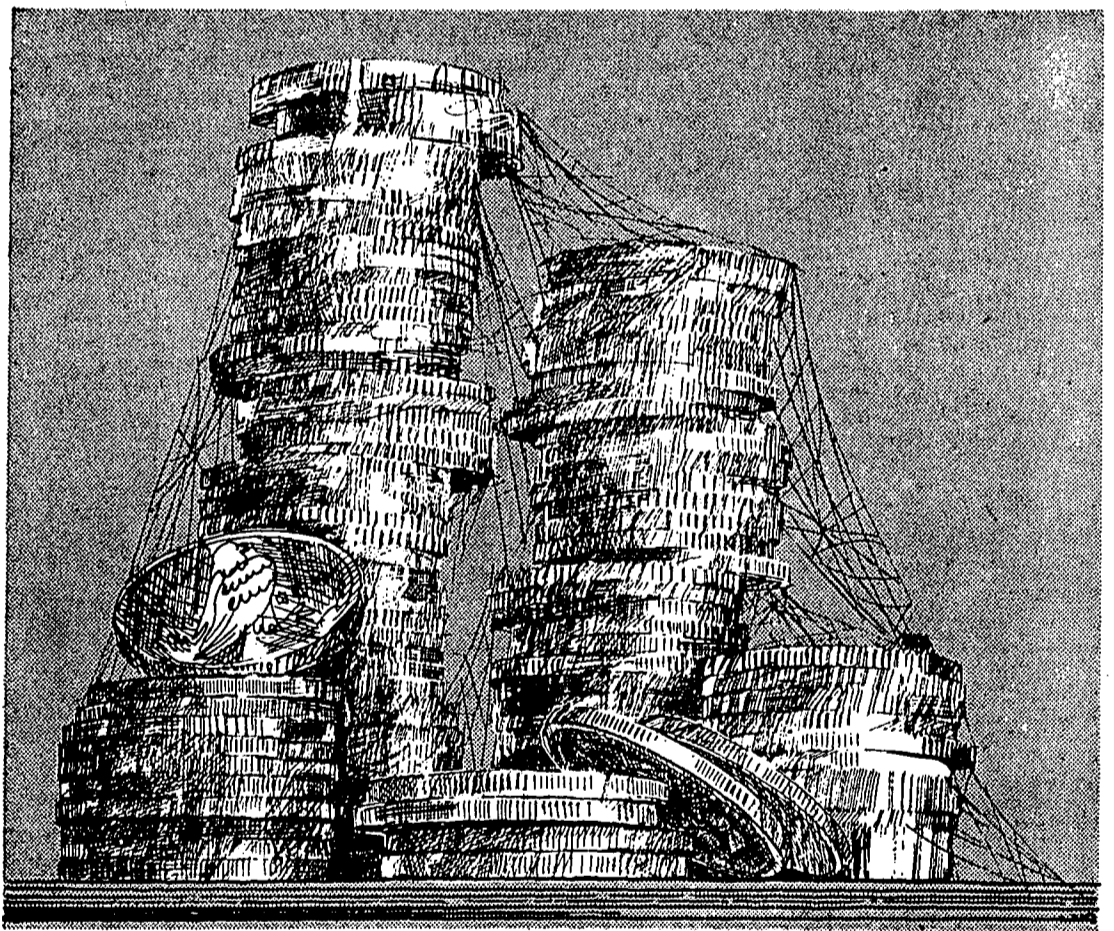

**SCHOLARSHIPS ARE ANNOUNCED**

U. of I., Moscow — More than \$3,000,000 in new buildings, Regent-hond financed without the use of tax funds, were officially added to the University of Idaho campus last month. Dedication ceremonies were held for the \$1,405,000 University Classroom Center, which will be paid off by student fees. In addition was the latest six-story addition to the Wallace Residence Center, which cost \$1,650,000 and was financed on the basis of income to be derived from residents. Dr. D. R. Theophilus, president emeritus of the university, under whose regime the University Classroom Center was started, gave the dedicatory address. He said: "The tremendous expansion of knowledge has brought about a great change in thinking on physical facilities for college campuses. Although the University of Idaho in the past has generally departmentalized its buildings, it was believed that more efficient use of instructional space and personnel was possible by use of an exclusive classroom or instructional center equipped with the modern media of communication. This is the University Classroom Center."

**NEW BUILDINGS ON U. OF I. CAMPUS**  
 U. of I., Moscow — Scholarships and awards valued at more than \$51,000 were officially accepted for the University of Idaho by the Board of Regents, President Ernest W. Hartung announced last week. A check for \$17,000 from the Potlatch Forest Foundation, Lewiston, was the largest single gift to be accepted by the Regents. The money is for scholarship awards to various students. Other large grants included \$2,850 from a Chicago foundation for the freshman agricultural scholarship program for the 1965-66 academic year, and \$1,500 from the National Association of Secondary School Principals, Washington, D. C., for a General Mills Betty Crocker Scholarship for Andrea Sue Cox of Kendrick. More than 90 separate gifts of money were given to the university in scholarships category at the meeting of the Regents last week. **A Service Of Thor Research Center For Better Farm Living**  
 Sticky doors often are a household nuisance but they needn't be. Doors stick for a number of reasons, but a little bit of troubleshooting probably will show what's wrong in a hurry. Homecraft specialists at the Thor Research Center have a few suggestions. They say that the first thing to check around sticking doors are the hinges. If the hinge screws are loose and won't hold securely, remove them and pack the holes with steel wool, wood plugs, plastic wood or wood dough.

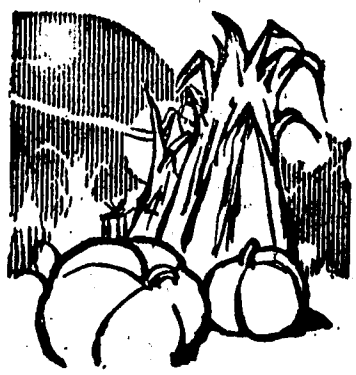
Slipping a cardboard shim behind the bottom hinge may eliminate sticking in that area. Loosen the hinge on the wall side, insert the cardboard filler to level the hinge, and replace the screws. If the hinges or loose screws obviously are not the cause of door binding, then most likely some part of the door edge is protruding farther than it should. This is where portable electric tools come in handy. It's best to remove the offending door and smooth the binding surfaces with an electric sander or the sanding accessories of an electric drill or polisher. Taking a door off its hinges can be done best by first slipping a block of wood under the outer corner to take the weight off the hinges. After you've done this, the Thor planners recommend, tap the hinge pins out, taking out the bottom one first. When replacing them, put in the top pin first. If the door is sticking at the bottom, push a piece of sandpaper under it and move the door back and forth a few times. 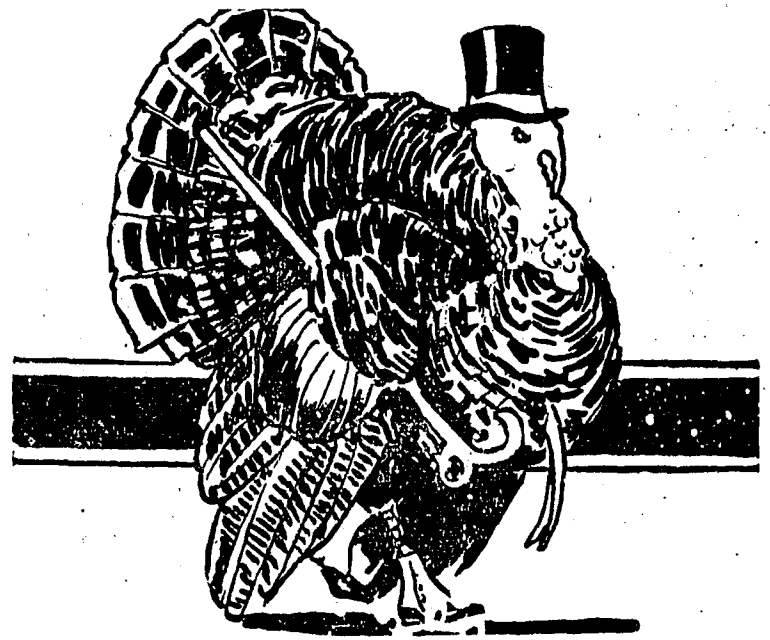

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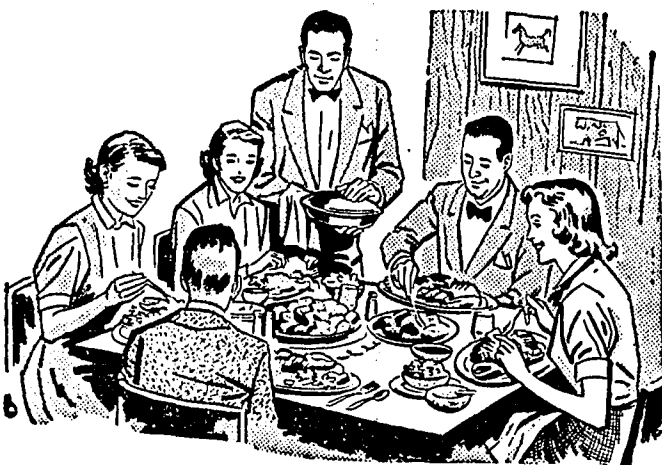
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
