**4-H PROGRAM HAS**  
**SCIENCE TRAINING**

Chicago — American young people's interest in science lagging? "Not so," says T. W. Thompson, service director for the National 4-H Service Committee. And he backs up his statement with facts taken from records representing some 78,000 inquiring 4-H entomologists.

Thompson pointed to the record of a 15-year-old New York Miss who was instrumental in organizing an International Teen Entomology group. Her 4-H project has broadened and now she supplies moth-eggs to the state agricultural experiment station, museums, and to entomologists in this and other countries. This summer the young scientist plans to study with an entomologist in England and after her return in the fall, an Australian Miss will join her in the study of entomology.

A New Mexican 4-H youth has amassed a collection of more than 2,000 insect specimens. The collection has been used in the instruction of 4-H members and school science classes. His interest has been directed to the control of insects on crops and he now assists airplane pilots dusting crops in his area.

Many other 4-H entomologists share their knowledge with others. An Indiana University student plans to write about the world of insects after graduating with a degree in journalism and zoology. Her 4-H insect collection is on loan to her state's 4-H training center. An Idaho 4-H girl has her own newspaper column which advises readers on methods of insect and pest control. She

hopes to become a member of the Peace Corps.

**SHOULD TEACH**  
**TRAFFIC SAFETY**

With schools in full swing all over our nation, parents should give real attention in teaching their children the habits of traffic safety.

Although schools and police departments have consolidated their efforts to protect and teach safety education to the children, parents should not depend entirely on educators and the police. The following rules are emphasized by the Idaho Department of Public Safety:

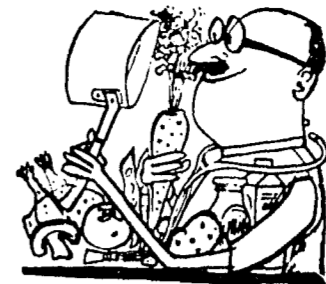
Parents need to set a good example and insist on obedience to crossing in marked areas only.

**WHAT FOODS ARE FATTENING???**

If someone were to ask the doctor in the kitchen what foods are fattening, he would have to give her a very peculiar answer. At least, it might seem peculiar, at first glance.

He would tell the lady that all foods are fattening, and no foods are fattening, and she would probably think that he was trying to be funny. And this business of fattening is anything but funny!

It is common in everyday conversation to hear:

"I never touch butter — it's fattening!"

"I just love chocolate, but it's so fattening!"

"Sugar in your coffee? My dear, how do you dare — it's so fattening!"

"I eat rice instead of potato, not nearly so fattening, you know."

"Do you realize that one martini is as fattening as a boiled egg?"

Well, doctor in the kitchen, answer those, with your double talk about all foods and no foods fattening — I never heard of such a thing!

It's Puzzling

I'll admit it is a little puzzling. And yet it is true. All foods are fattening, if you eat enough of

them. And none are, if you limit your intake. It's just as simple as that.

What it comes down to is that the diet as a whole is what is fattening, or slimming, or maintaining, according to the amount of food taken in the total diet and the amount of energy you expend.

Neither extreme is to be recommended. Each good food has its contribution to make. It is folly to omit basic foods like meat, eggs, fish, cheese, butter, milk, cream, poultry, whole grains or enriched cereals, vegetables and fruits from your diet, or cut them too low for good nutrition.

**Find A Combination**

The idea is to find a combination that will maintain your weight, and still keep all the four food groups that were described here last week in proper balance. Then, neither your foods nor your diet will be fattening, and you can enjoy good eating, plus the benefits of a nice figure, clothes that fit in sizes easy to buy, feet that carry your normal weight without complaining, and a general feeling of being right with your nutrition and your health, and the world in general.

**DIGGING PROOF OF**  
**ANCIENT INDIANS**

U. of I. Moscow — Carbon 14 tests, a method of determining the age of prehistoric articles — may prove out theories of University of Idaho archeologists and anthropologists as to the age of finds made this past summer in southwestern Idaho diggings of former Indian locations.

Five University of Idaho students, doing research in the Mann's Creek drainage in Washington county, have turned up Indian artifacts which

they believe may be eight to nine thousand years old. The oldest known civilization in the Northwest has been carbon dated at about 10,000 years, and was located on the Columbia river.

Doing excavation and site locations on a \$4,500 grant from the National Park service, the research was carried out during the recent summer months. The grant was part of a program of salvage by the National Park service by locating artifacts in the Mann's Creek area before a proposed dam is built on the stream.

According to Dr. Alfred W. Bowers, professor of anthropology and sociology, 96 camp grounds and sites of nomadic Indian tribes were located during the survey by the students. In addition to diggings in the area, a complete archeological survey of Washington county was undertaken, and maps made under a \$4,000 grant from the National Science Foundation.

Most of the diggings in the area were conducted within 3 or 4 feet of the surface, and findings unearthed included such articles as pestles and mortars (tools used for grinding foods) hunting implements and pieces of pottery that are uncommon to the Northwest area.

**GET FAT ON WATER?**

A strong advocate of a not so unique dietary liquid is Dr. Charles G. King, director Columbia University's Institute of Nutrition Sciences. The Columbia scientist says "a lot of foolish people court dehydration and its unpleasant and often dangerous consequences because they think water is fattening." Dr. King reports that at least two quarts of water daily are necessary for the body to function properly. He also points out that there isn't one calorie in a full reservoir.

The first on-site plant in the United States to supply oxygen for primary lead smelting and for zinc recovery from slag will be constructed at East Helena, Montana by National Cylinder Gas, Chicago. It will be Montana's first large air-separation facility.

**HARD WORK PAYS OFF FOR 4-H'ERS,  
WIN TRIP TO NATIONAL CONGRESS**

Four Idaho teen-agers including three from Nez Perce County, will soon head for the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov. 28-Dec. 2, and what will probably be the most exciting week in their lives.

They were named state winners in their 1965 club projects by the Cooperative Extension Service and awarded expense-paid trips.

They are Will Moore, 17, and Ernie Moore, 16, both of Lewiston; Jo Ann Schwarz, 17, of Kendrick, and Colleen Montell, 17, of Grangeville. The Moore boys and Miss Schwarz make up the Nez Perce County threesome. Miss Montell is from Idaho County.

Will Moore, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl C. Moore, won top honors in the poultry program and will be the guest in Chicago of Heisdorf & Nelson Farms, Inc.

He raised 595 fryers in his project and sells eggs to his neighbors, saving part of the proceeds for college. He won the county poultry award three consecutive years. Last year he attended the National 4-H Citizenship Short Course in Washington, D.C. His father is a 4-H leader.

Ernie Moore, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Moore, winner in the swine project, will have his trip donated by the Moor-man Mfg. Co. He was named the grand champion swine showman in the senior division at the Spokane Junior Livestock Show this year and last year.

In his project, he learned sound swine breeding, feeding and management practices. He

netted about \$240 on his swine this year. He also attended the 4-H Citizenship Short Course in Washington last year.

Miss Schwarz, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Schwarz, was the top 4-H'er in the entomology program, sponsored by the Hercules Powder Company.

"My entomology project has helped me to learn about the different types of insects—and tell the good from the bad. It has also taught me the difference in sprays and dusts and their correct application," she said.

Miss Schwarz, a Sunday school teacher, has a collection of 700 insects and has won entomology awards at the county level for six straight years. She also attended the citizenship course in Washington in 1964.

Miss Montell, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Montell, the safety champion, won special recognition from the Extension Service for her outstanding radio program promoting bicycle safety.

Miss Montell, who will be the guest of General Motors, last year was named the outstanding 4-H'er in her county. She has been the county's safety award winner for the last three years, and in 1963 attended the Governor's Safety Conference.

The four teen-agers will join 1,500 other young people from every state, Puerto Rico and Canada at the congress in Chicago's Conrad Hilton Hotel.

They will be eligible to win \$500 college scholarships that will be awarded to national winners by their sponsors

The ASCS County Committee for the coming year will be Clarence A. Jensen, Chairman, elected for a three year term; Roy R. Glenn, Vice Chairman, two year term; Melvin Procunier, Regular Member, one year term; Kenneth Butterfield, 1st alternate, one year term; and Wayne Davis, 2nd alternate, one year term.

All twenty four delegates representing eight communities elected the county committee for the coming year. Soon thereafter, particulars will be available.

**TAX HITS SALE OF PERSONAL PROPERTY**

The State Tax Collector announced today that there is a good deal of misconception as to the status of the sale of a business with respect to the Idaho Sales Tax Act. He advised that the Idaho Sales Tax Act provides that the 3 per cent sales tax applies to the sale price of tangible personal property includes, but is not limited to, vehicles, equipment, office furniture, hotel and motel linen and supplies, furniture, counters, tables, chairs, etc. The purchaser pays the tax which is to be remitted by the seller.

Where a business is sold, the seller will be provided with form St 127 by this office for the purpose of reporting the sale of the business. The sale of inventories or merchandise bought for resale is not subject to the sales tax. Only the sale of tangible personal property as defined in the Act is subject to the tax at the time the business is sold. This is not considered to be an occasional sale under Section 10 of the Act.

For an example: Seller sells a

grocery business for \$20,000. The purchase price is allocable as follows: \$10,000 to inventory; \$3,000 to accounts receivable; \$3,000 to a delivery truck used in the business and \$4,000 to fixtures such as display counters, cash registers, freezers, etc. The inventory is purchased for resale and is not subject to tax, the accounts receivable are intangibles and are not subject to tax. The part of the price allocable to the purchase of the truck and fixtures is taxable, thus, the seller will collect a tax of \$210.00 computed at 3 percent on \$7,000 which would be in this example, \$4,000 for the fixtures and \$3,000 for the delivery truck. On the sale of a business the successor is liable for any sales tax due.

**RESEARCH UNIT SET UP AT UNIVERSITY**

Moscow - A state Occupational Research Unit has been established at the University of Idaho under a \$100,000 grant from the U. S. Office of Education it was announced today by President Ernest W. Hartung.

"The Research Unit is a cooperative effort between the College of Education and the State Department of Vocational Education," explained Dr. Everett Samuelson, dean of the college. "The primary purpose of the unit is to research present and emerging occupations in Idaho to determine the skills and knowledge needed for such employment. This area of research has great implications for the non-college bound youth, and for secondary school curriculum change and modification."

Dr. Kenneth Loudermilk, assistant professor of psychology, has been appointed director of the unit. Formerly with the Idaho State Employment Service, he holds a M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Idaho.

An Advisory Committee composed of 10 persons representing business, industry and related agencies in Idaho has been appointed to work with the Research Unit.
