ABOUT NEW YEARS, PAST AND PRESENT

The Egyptians were the first to develop an "exact" system for the measuring of time. They developed a calendar about 4,000 B. C.

The Jewish calendar reads 5726 in relation to 3760 A. D. The Jews adopted their calendar in the 15th century.

The Moslem calendar consists of 12 months of the year beginning with the approximate new moon without any intercalation to keep them geared to the seasonal equinoxes.

Use of the notation A. D. was inaugurated by Germany's Charles III, who affixed the symbolism to the years of his reign beginning in 879.

The month of January takes its name from Janus, a two-faced Roman god supposedly possessed of the power to look back over the past and tell what the future held.

Christopher Columbus is generally considered to have been the first white man to celebrate New Year's Day in the western hemisphere.

In earlier times the "dipping" custom was believed to offer a glimpse into the future. The head of the family, eyes closed, opened the family Bible and indicated a passage with his finger.

ALIENS TO REGISTER

Wash., D. C. — R. G. Hoffeller, district director of the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service said this week that the period within which aliens must report their addresses is at hand.

The month of January has been set for the reporting period. All aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, must report their addresses to the government during that period.

Forms with which to make the report will be available at all post offices and offices of the Immigration service during the month of January.

Mr. Hoffeller urges all aliens to comply with the reporting requirements, as willful failure to do so may lead to serious consequences.

RESEARCH HEAD IS NAMED AT U. OF I.

U. of I., Moscow, Dr. Melbourne L. Jackson, dean of the Graduate School at the University of Idaho, has been appointed coordinator of research at the university, it was announced today by President Ernest W. Hartung, following approval by the Regents, meeting in Boise.

"The increasing availability of both federal and private funds for research work and the training of graduate students on research projects makes it desirable that we have a university official designated to review and coordinate our efforts in the area of research grant and contract applications," said Dr. Hartung.

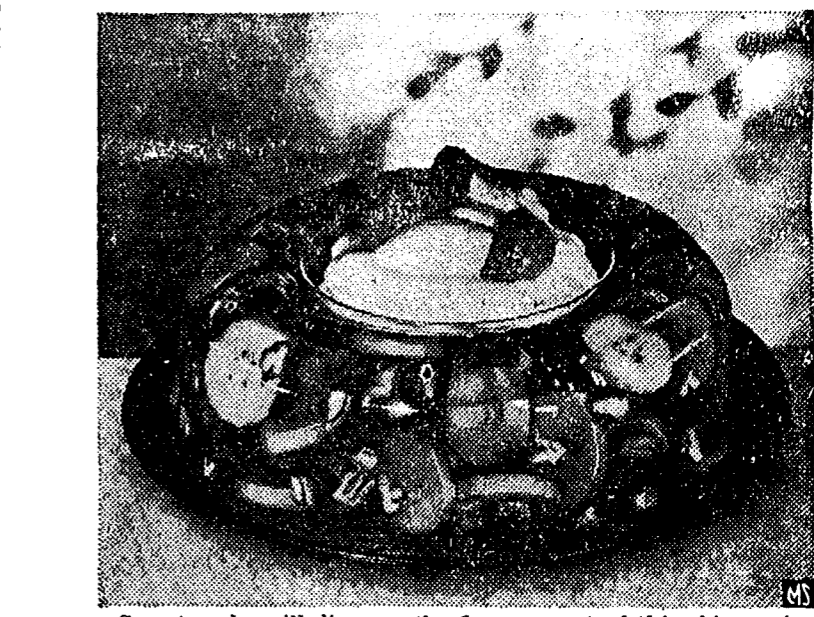
The Regents endorsed the concept of a four-lane highway to be developed between Pullman and Moscow for the safety of the university students, and directed university officials to take action which would further the accomplishment of the project.

Also approved by the Regents was an optional group health and accident insurance programs for students. This program would augment present coverage for the students," said Dean of Students Charles O. Decker.

"Many family policies run out on a student when he reaches 18. In a survey of 12 universities and colleges which have such an optional program, we found that as high as 70 per cent of the students in an institution request the coverage. The plan at the University of Idaho will start next fall. Meanwhile, bids will be called from insurance companies for the coverage on a group basis."


