C. E. RATHBONE DIES AT OROFINO SUNDAY

Charley E. Rathbone, 72, a Southwick resident since 1918, died at the Clearwater Valley Memorial Hospital at 4:30 p. m. Sunday, after being hospitalized for just two days.

Rathbone, a retired cook for the Forest Service and Clearwater Timber Protective Ass'n, enjoyed baking, and had made bread the day before going to the hospital.

He was born Jan. 22, 1894, at Carlton, Mo., a son of Mr. and Mrs. N. B. Rathbone. The family moved to Grand Island, Neb., and lived there a short time before moving by covered wagon to Hailey, Idaho, where Rathbone was five. They later moved to Lind, Wash., coming to the North Fork of the Clearwater River area in 1910.

Rathbone married Altha B. Crabb at Ashahka, Feb. 28, 1915. A year later they moved to Canada where he served in the Canadian Army as a corporal in the medical division at Halifax, Nova Scotia, during World War I. In 1918 they came to Southwick, where they resided since. He was a member of the Methodist Church at Cavendish.

Surviving are his wife, Altha, at home; a son, Earl of Clarkston; a sister, Mrs. Effie True of Southwick; a brother, Fred of Portland, Ore., and four grandchildren.

SNOW SURVEY FOR FEB. 1 COMPLETED

Moscow — The Feb. 1st snow survey was completed Jan. 30 by Fred Chugg and Albert Moore of the Soil Conservation Service. This month's survey was more difficult than usual, requiring three days, due to a break down of transportation. One of the three days was used to climb Moscow Mountain on the west end, and one day on the east. The third day was used to survey the Sherwin Snow Course near Bovill. With the aid of the "snow cat", this is reduced to a long day's job, but with snowshoes the greatest benefit is an abundance of fresh air.

The Sherwin Snow Course, which is located 8.2 miles northeast of Bovill, on the highway to Clarkia, has 37.6 inches of snow and 10 inches of water. The elevation of this course is 3,200 feet, which is comparable to Howard Creek, the lowest snow course on Moscow Mountain. However, the Sherwin Snow course has more than a foot more snow than Howard Creek.

There are five snow courses measured each month on the mountain. The highest of these snow courses is the Moscow Mountain Snow Course at 4,100 feet. This month's survey shows there has been an increase in snow depth of 25.6 inches during the past month to bring the snow floor to the present 48.4 inches. This is only 0.1 inches less than recorded last year for this month. However, the water content is down 1.8 inches from last year, which indicates a lower percentage. The highest snow measurement on this course for the 1st of February was in 1964, when 61 inches was recorded, and the lowest was in 1960, with only 22 inches. The 48.4 inches of snow now on the course is 6.3 inches above the last eight years' average of 42.1 inches.

The over-all snow condition was "wet" at the lower elevations, and dry to crusted at the top of the mountain. The soil is damp to saturated at the top of the ridge to ground frost at the lower elevations.

TAKING SPAWN

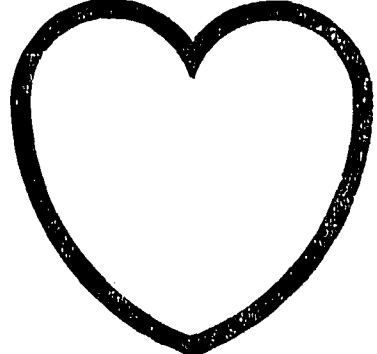


