#### GEO. F. BROCKE, SR. WRITES ON DOINGS OF LEGISLATURE

Boise, March 5 — The third week of the Legislature (Feb. 28 to Mar. 5) is the week of decision, a week to re-solve the question of reapportionment. Reapportionment will, in a sense, completely redesign the pat-tern of the Legislature, which has stood for some 75 years.

As the Legislature continued this week, the Farragut Park Bill, appropriating some \$460,000.00 was passed. Also before the legislature now is a bill to purchase some eight blocks of Boise property for office buildings and other uses.

The Senate worked most of the week on reapportionment, and sent to the House Senate Bill No. 9. This calls for a Legislature of 35 Senators and 70 House members. The 35 Senate seats are divided into districts of about 20,000 people, and the House of Representatives sub-divides into two districts of a Senate district of about 10,000 people. This is the fairest plan so far offered to the Legislature. It is the nearest to the one-man one-vote principle that has been offered.


