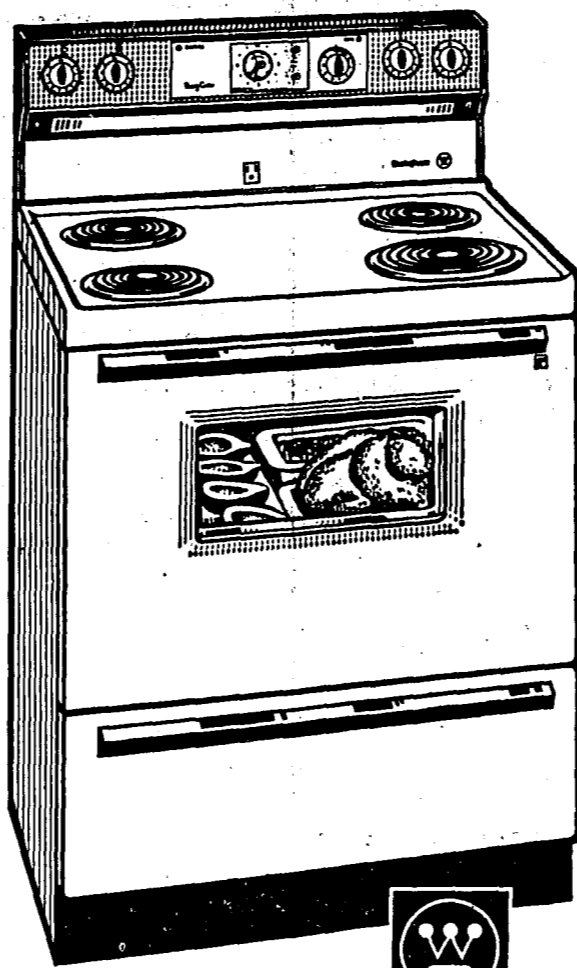

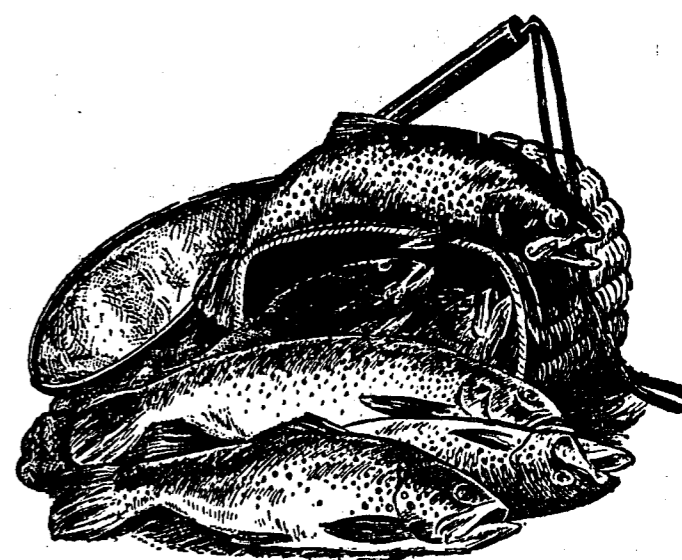

**ROAD NUMBERS TO BE CHANGED SOON**

Lewiston — The re-assignment of road numbers will establish State Highway 3 as a connection link for two major U. S. Highway routes.

According to state highway district engineers from both the Lewiston (Don Cox) and Coeur d'Alene (Merle Harding) administrative districts the signing and renumbering of the State Highway system extending north from the Spalding Junction with U. S. 12 to the Rose Lake Junction with Interstate 90 and U. S. 10 will be started in the very near future.

Last fall the State Board of Highway Directors, upon the recommendation of the department's Planning and Traffic division, approved the continuous 121 mile designation of State Highway 3 as follows:

Rose Lake Junction of I. S. 90 and U. S. 10 south to Harrison Junction of U. S. 95A. This was previously designated as SH 3.

Harrison Junction of U. S. 95A to St. Maries and south to Santa. (S. H. 3 overlaps this section of U. S. 95A.)

Santa to Bovill (S. H. 3 replaces designation of S. H. 43).

Bovill to Deary (S. H. 3 overlaps this section of S. H. 8).

Deary south to Kendrick (S. H. 3 replaces S. H. 7).

Kendrick to Spalding Junction with U. S. 12 (S. H. 3 replaces S. H. 42). These consolidated route number conversions to S. H. 3 will prove a simplified reference for motorists traveling through this area.

Other route number changes that were also approved by the board include: Designation of State Highway 8 to replace S. H. 43 between Bovill and Elk River, and designation of S. H. 9 to replace S. H. 7 from Deary to Harvard.

**LESS TILLAGE MAY BE REQUIRED**

U. of I., Moscow — Idaho farmers who want to improve farming methods and cut costs may benefit by using some minimum tillage techniques, says Charles L. Peterson, extension agricultural engineer at the University.

The main objective of minimum tillage is to reduce the number of times you work the field to prepare the seed bed. If you can eliminate even one trip across the field you benefit by reducing soil compaction as well as saving costs.

"Combine two or more operations whenever you can," Peterson advises. "Hitch your harrow to the disc, or a small disc to the plow. Or use a roller-harrow to prepare fall-plowed ground for planting in one trip." You also may be able to eliminate

one harrowing or discing altogether, or get by without plowing in certain crop combinations. Many farmers just disc sugar beet ground to prepare for seeding spring grain, for an example.

Practicing minimum tillage does not necessarily require new or different equipment, Peterson says. It may help you use your present tractor and equipment at maximum efficiency.

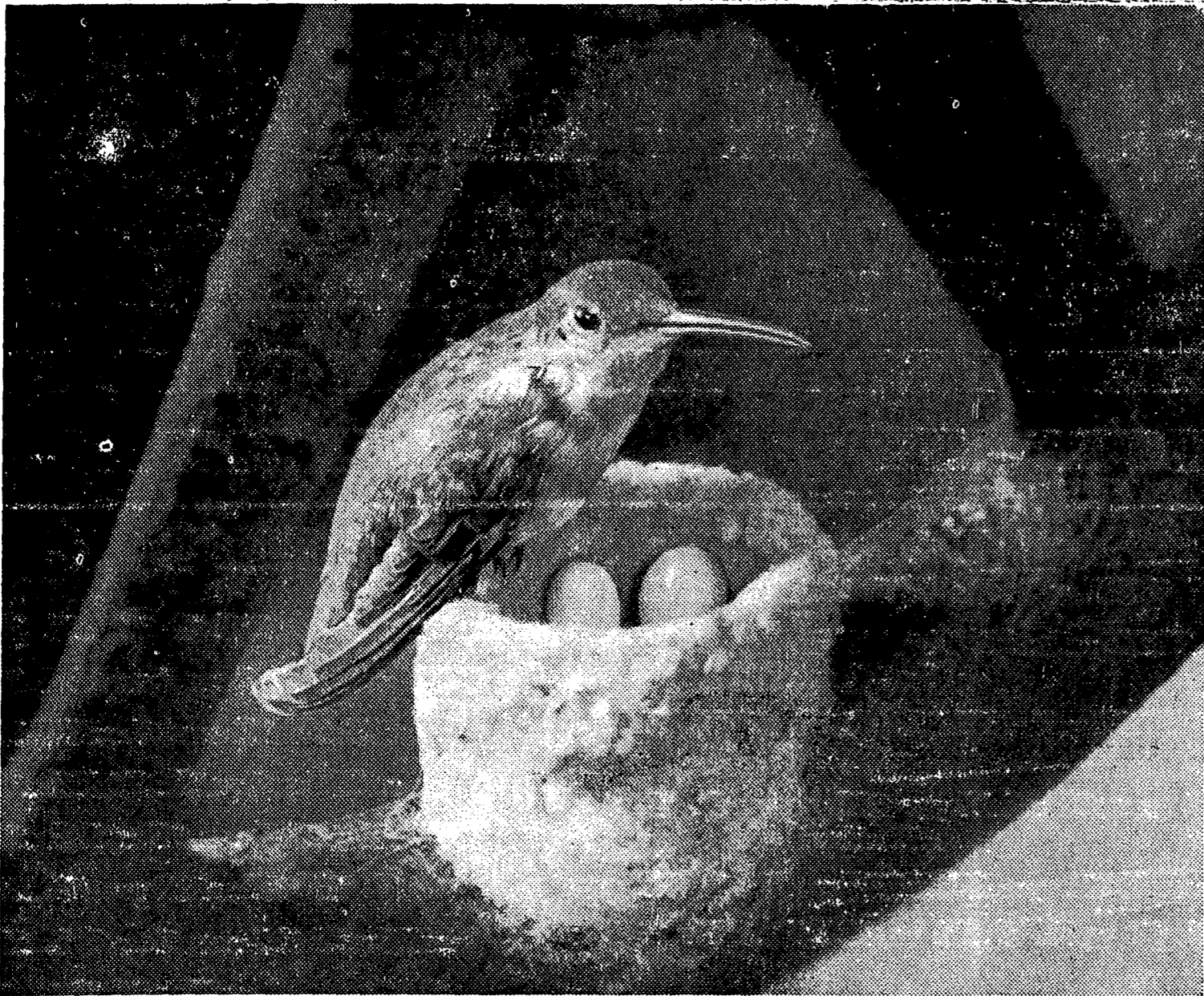

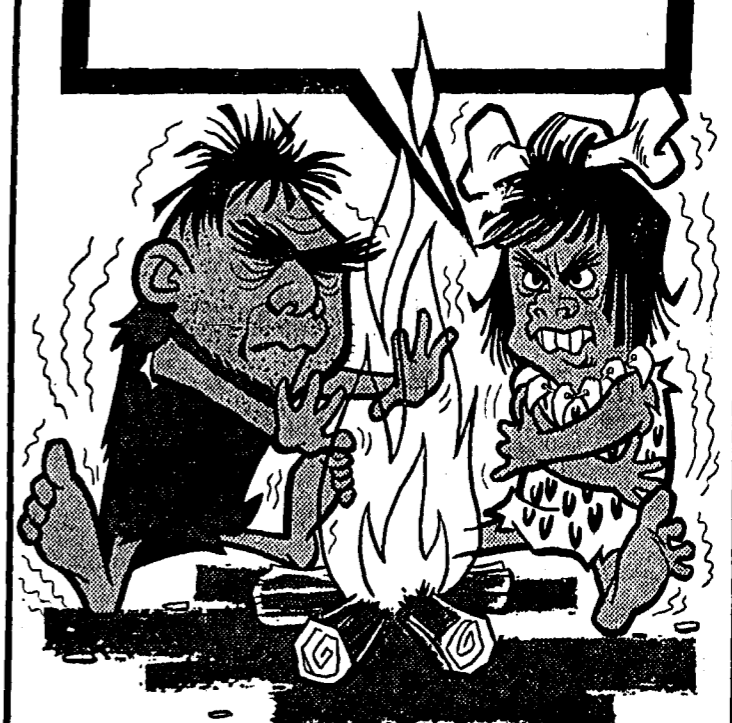

### PLANT TROUT IN SOUTH IDAHO

Boise — Catchable-size trout like these being planted in the Boise river by Evan Parrish, are going into many waters these days throughout the state. Opening day of the general trout season is June 4, this year.

Two other big red-letter days for trophy fishermen in northern Idaho are April 15 and April 30. Priest Lake starts the season for mackinaw trout on the first date, and April 30 opens lowland lakes — but not the streams — of the Panhandle for fishing, including Kamloops trout and Dolly Varden.

Fish stocking around the state will continue throughout the season until early fall.
