At Youth Legislature

House Bill No. 10, introduced by Janet Westendahl, Carol Heimgartner, Kenneth Heimgartner and Bill Ball, representatives of the Kendrick High School Student Body, was passed by the House but did not reach the Senate floor, due to lack of time in the final hours of the Y. M. C. A. Youth Legislature.

The act, officially known as "Amending Chapter 5, Title 40-501, of the Idaho Code by the Addition of Sub-section 13," thus stating that County Commissioners, after consultation with school officials, shall be responsible for the fixation of school safety signs and providing an effective date. It went through the House without a negative vote, and the young people were greatly disappointed that it did not have its chance in the Senate.

Some 250 young legislators and their counselors were at the session, which was a valuable and memorable two days of mock legislature for them. Other highlights were dinners, luncheons, the speech by Gov. Robt. E. Smylie, and excellent musical entertainment.

CHILDREN DEPLORE HOT LUNCH LOSS

Wash., D. C. — "I Don't know what you think but I think this hot lunch business is going too far. I hope it doesn't work. You'd think they'd let us children put in our say so."

Those are the opening lines in one of ten letters Rep. Compton I White of Idaho has received from Canyon School children at Cataldo who are up in arms at the prospect of losing federal aid for their lunch program.

Few youngsters write their congressmen, but when they decide to have their "say so" it is usually very straight from the shoulder. One student laid it out on the line to White this way: "I think the President should do what the saying 'leave well enough alone' says and I hope you will tell him so. We like hot lunch the way it is and don't think it needs to be changed just because some president wants it to be."

Another student told his congressman, "It won't be healthy to just have cold lunch and I would like to talk the President out of taking the money away."

While taking President Johnson to task for proposing the cut in funds, several of the Cataldo children had warm praise for the hot lunch program at their school.

In replies to the children, White pledged to fight to maintain the school lunch and special milk programs at their traditional levels. Last week he asked the House Appropriations subcommittee to restore the proposed cut in funds.

White said: "It is encouraging to receive letters on the issues of the day from youngsters, and I can think of no group better qualified to defend the effectiveness of school lunches than those children, whose good health can be attributed in part to the program."

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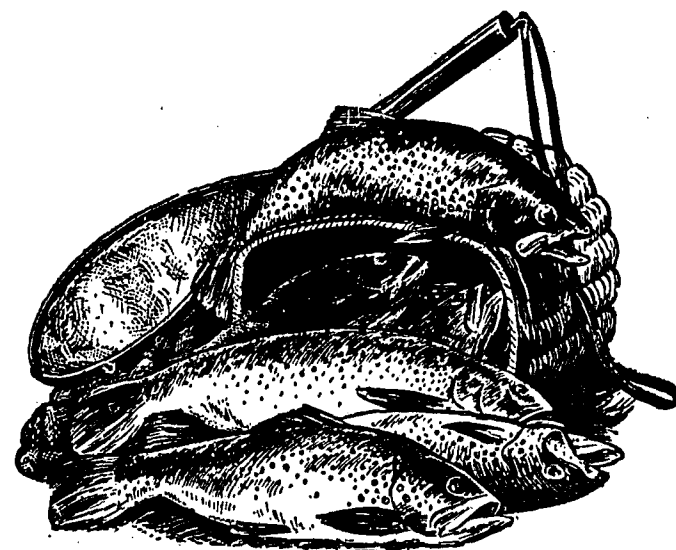

BUSINESS IS UP IN IDAHO, SAYS BANK

Business in Idaho by the end of the first quarter of 1966 had reached new peak levels and further expansion of the state's economy for the balance of the year is expected to equal or exceed national growth.

This is the report contained in First Security Bank's quarterly news letter, which will be distributed during the next few days. It was announced locally by A. O. Kanikkeberg, manager. The news letter is edited by Dr. Elroy Nelson, corporation vice president and economist.

The outlook for agriculture in the state for 1966 is good to excellent, primarily because of increased national demand reflected in higher livestock and crop prices. Total cash receipts from farm marketing for the year should exceed the record of \$518 million set one year ago. Including government payments, the total should pass the \$547 million reported for 1965.

The number of cattle and calves on farms on January 1, 1966, was two percent less than a year ago, in both Idaho and the nation. This was the first decline after seven consecutive years of increase. Prices for fat cattle should average higher than in 1965, and prices for feeder cattle are expected to hold at present levels except as influenced by some fluctuations in prices of fat cattle.

Milk and egg production is slightly lower, but commercial hatcheries report a 6 to 10 percent increase in hatching for the first quarter of the year for both broiler and egg types. With increased demand for broilers, prices should approximate those of 1965.

Planting intentions for 1966 total one percent less than last year, but decreases in grains are offset by increases in potatoes, sugar beets, peas and beans.

Mineral production in the Gem State should again establish a new record and exceed \$100 million in value. The state should retain its positions as the nation's No. 1 silver producer; the No. 2 producer of lead, and the No. 3 producer of zinc and phosphate rock.

Food processing is establishing a new record output. The most significant factor is the increased production of frozen and dehydrated potato products.

Total non-agricultural employment was reported at 173,500 in February, an increase of 9,600 above the total last year, and 15,000 above the total of two years ago.

Construction for the first two months of the year totaled \$8.2 million, a 21 percent increase, most of which occurred in January. Value of all construction, including contracts awarded for public works, highways and utilities was estimated at \$5 million in January, considerably below the \$13 million awarded a year earlier.

Lumber production in the state in January was four percent higher than last year, output of paper was somewhat higher, and retail trade in Idaho department stores showed an eight percent increase over 1965.

APRIL SNOW SURVEY TAKEN, COMPLETED

Moscow — The April snow survey on Moscow Mountain was taken on April 2nd by Fred Chugg of the Soil Conservation Service and Larry L. Deeds of the University of Idaho Engineering Experiment station.

After the recent warming trend, all five snow courses on Moscow Mountain show a decrease in snow depth from that recorded last month.

The Moscow Mt. snow course shows a 6.1 inch decrease in the past month to bring the total depth down to the present 49.9 inches. This is about 1 inch above the last seven year

average for this date. The record snow pack for April 1 was 75.3 inches in 1964, which is 25.4 inches more than recorded this month.

The water content on the Moscow Mt. course is 18.9 inches, which is 1.8 inches above the average, and about 10 inches below that recorded in the 1964 record snow pack.

The snow is melting quite rapidly as the per-cent water content ranges from 37 to 43 percent of the total snow depth. The warm weather has removed all snow from the two lower courses on Howard and Crumerine creeks.

The underlying soil on all courses was thawed and is becoming saturated as the snow melts from the mountain.

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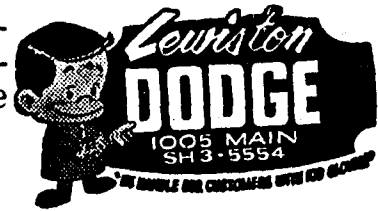

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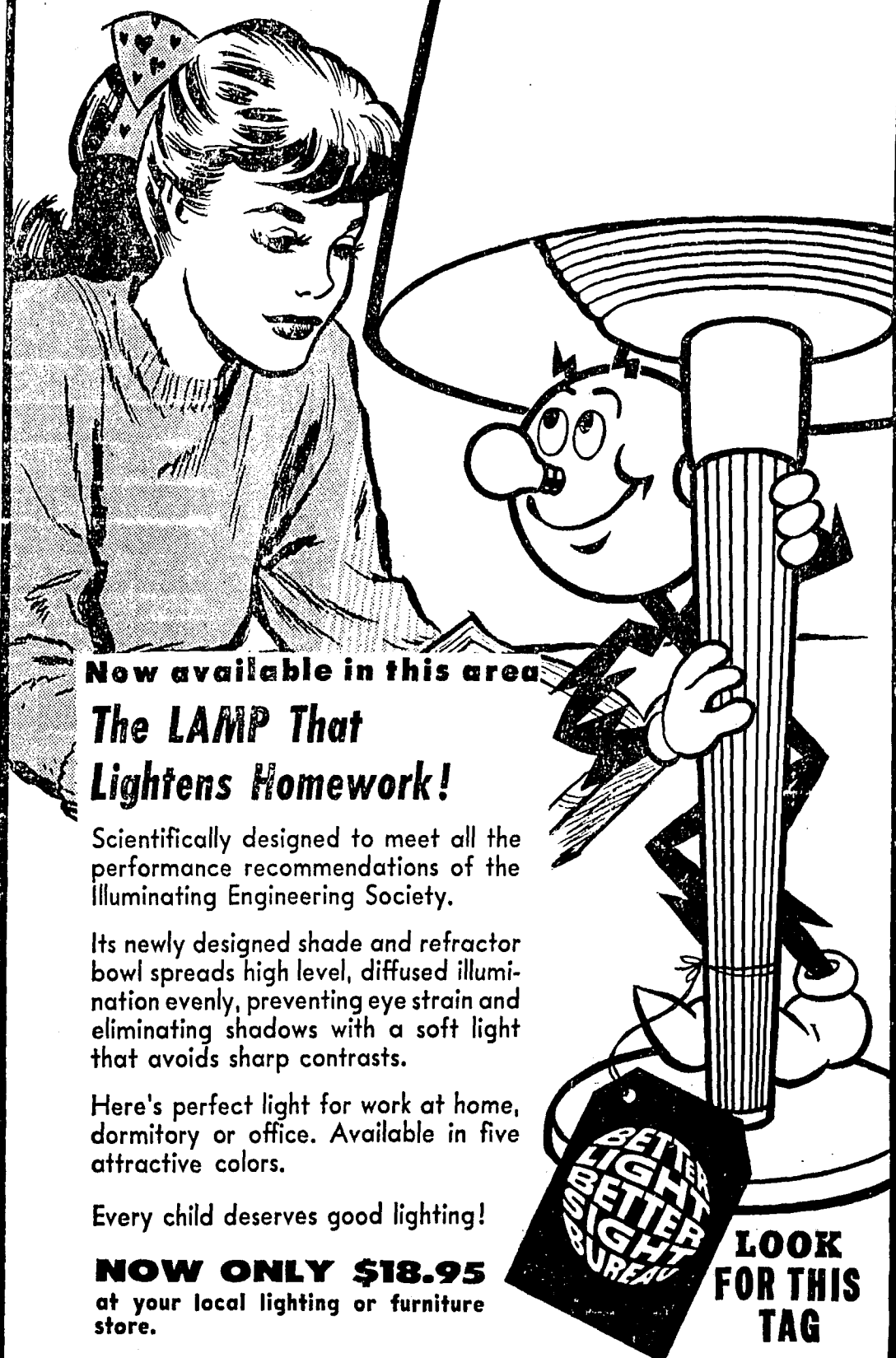
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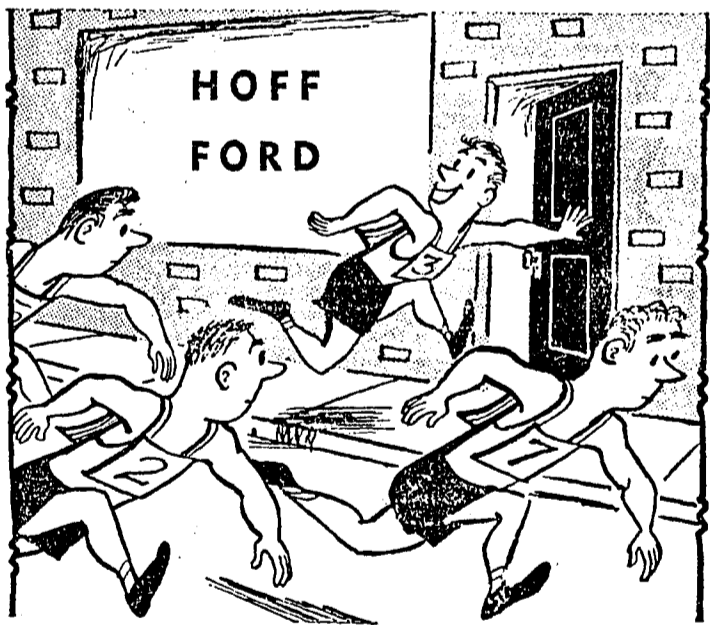
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YOUTH CAMP IS AGAIN SCHEDULED

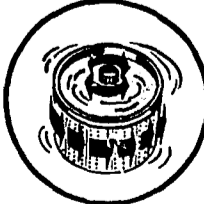


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Double Action Washing Agitator moves backward, ribbed basket moves forward for a second washing action.

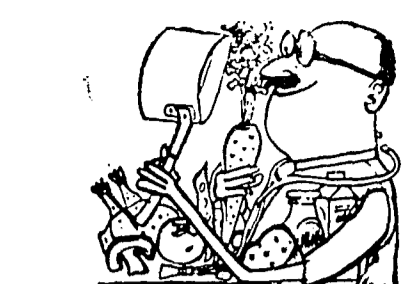

WATER, WATER, EVERYWHERE ???

Remember the grim and dreary poem of the Ancient Mariner, with "water, everywhere, and not any drop to drink"? Remember how you used to have to memorize it, or even—horror!—re-cite it? Two thirds of the earth's surface is covered with water, and yet right now the 19th century poetic fantasy is facing us as a menacing truth. There is a growing shortage of fresh water in many areas, including such populous metropolitan centers as New York, where you have to ask for a drink in a restaurant. Worse, much of our water is poor in color, clarity, taste or odor, and some of it actually contains chemical wastes, filth and bacterial growth. Among the most serious of water pollutants are the growing amounts of detergents in use in home and industry.

and tomatoes (93 percent) contain a great deal. Water is essential to all chemical processes in the body, which must take place in solution. The water used in our bodies daily must be replaced as the used water is excreted. The interchange represents several pints a day by kidneys, bowels, perspiration and exhaled breath. Variations occur depending on activity, temperature, salt balance, illness, and drugs which may cause increased loss through bowels, kidneys or skin.

Water in Our Bodies

The human body is composed of about two-thirds water, by weight. This high water content of the body has been called "the sea within you." It is, literally, salt water plus other essential substances in solution.

Mineral Elements

Most drinking water contains traces of minerals elements from the soil through which it passed on its way to your kitchen. Some of these, like iodine which prevents simple goiter or fluoride which lessens dental decay, are important nutrients which must be supplied in the total diet if they are not naturally present in proper quantities.

One of Six Nutrients

Water is included among the six essential nutrients, the other five being proteins, carbohydrates, fats, minerals and vitamins. All foods contain a percentage of water, and some valuable ones, like whole milk (87 percent)

City Supplies Protected

City water supplies, as a rule, are now adequately protected against contamination; rural supplies must be protected by the owner's own initiative. It is important not to waste water, which is no longer cheap and plentiful. Dripping faucets and unmetered supplies waste millions of gallons annually.

You are lucky if you have a reliable stream of cold, clean, fresh and safe water when you turn your kitchen faucet.

IDAHO HAS MANY MINERAL SPRINGS

Idaho has thousands of springs both hot and mineralized. They bubble, flow and even jet out from the earth to heights of 175 feet. The springs at Alpine on the South Fork of the Snake River a few miles inside Idaho from the Wyoming border are the first seen by travelers from the East. There are also hot springs at Bear Lake in southeastern Idaho. All along highway 30, are some of Idaho's nuded hot springs and mineralized geysers - Soda Springs, Lava Hot Springs, Downata near Downey, Indian Hot Springs near American Falls, and others from Oakley and Twin Falls along the Snake River to Givens Hot Springs near Marsing. The Upper Snake River area has dozens of springs, and the mountains of Idaho are full of them. Among the first known to man are Clarendon Hot Springs near Halley, which were used 50 years before Sun Valley was founded. In 1890, a Boise driller went down to 400 feet and released a flow of highly mineralized hot water. Further drilling over a 10-acre tract produced a flow of 800,000 gallons daily. The water has a content of 12 minerals and a natural temperature of 170 degrees. The springs were soon put in use to provide water for a natatorium, and a little later many homes along Warm Springs Avenue in Boise were piped and have used the springs for heating for more than a half-century. Further north in the State are the well-developed Riggins Hot Springs at Riggins and those lying further north are the Red River Hot Springs southeast of Elk City. There has never been an account made of Idaho's hot and mineral springs. The water from hundreds of them has never been analyzed and no one knows what mineral content might be found. There are 22 different degrees of mineral content in the various spring at Soda Springs. The more than 20 springs at Lava Hot Springs constitute, in both volume and mineral properties, the most remarkable group of hot springs in the state, Horse Creek Springs in the Salmon Forest are unexploited, since they are accessible only by pack trail. Warm Lake Springs in the Boise National Forest, however, have been developed and are very popular.
