PARK, VIEW POINT ON SPERRY GRADE ONE MAN'S WORK

A new Park and View Point has recently been completed by Lloyd Craig, county road foreman for Nez Perce county, just a half mile up the Sperry Grade toward Dr. Christensen's ranch home.

This is a small knoll which overlooks the lower portion of Kendrick and the mill. It is situated adjoining the road right-of-way and is a natural place for a small park. Mr. Craig said that when they were building the new road they would always eat lunch there, as there was always a cool breeze when it was really hot in downtown Kendrick — there it was "cool and comfy!"

Craig decided to try for a small park and put it in the county road system. But in talking to the County Engineer he was discouraged to find out that there were no funds available for parks in the budget. But this did not stop Mr. Craig. He decided to go ahead on his own time

and expense — which he did. Starting after the first of the year, on week-ends and evenings, he built a picnic table, a bench and swings in his shop, and painted them, ready to be moved to the park site when the time came. This work was done when the snow was on the ground and when he could get time off from snowplowing and sanding.

When the snow left, he started on the park itself, clearing of the brush and debris, trimming trees and raking the ground level. Then he went to Brocke & Sons, Seedsmen, and they donated grass seed for the park — and it was seeded early to get a good stand for this year. View Point and Roadside Park signs were donated by the State of Idaho from obsolete stock.

After the spot was well cleaned up, with the help of Mrs. Craig, he began fencing. Going to Dr. Christensen for help on the fence, Dr. Christensen donated the "2x6's" for the fence that encloses the park.

Soon the fencing was completed around the knoll. Then came the problem, how to keep people from driving on the grass. So Craig asked W. W. P. men, who were building a line from Juliaetta to Orofino, for

alive and able to do so, and says that he "hopes everyone will enjoy the park as much in the years to come as he has enjoyed working and building it."

This park is truly a lovely little spot, overlooking the lower section of Kendrick and down the Potlatch canyon toward Juliaetta — and is a wonderful spot for a picnic. It is hoped folk will take advantage of it and use it as was intended.

Mr. Craig says there have been many favorable comments on the park and its beauty, which is very rewarding to him, and well worth the time and money he has put into it.

There have been offers from several civic organizations and individuals to take over the park as a project and maintain it. However, Mr. Craig says he thinks it best to keep it in his own hands and maintain it, in the hope that Nez Perce county might in the future see fit to develop more beauty spots along county roads as the need for picnic grounds and rest areas grow — and feels the traveling public will demand more of them.

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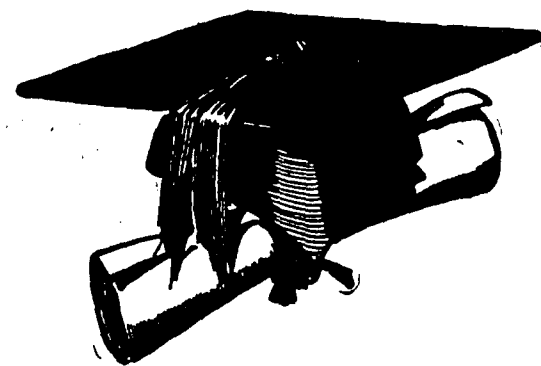
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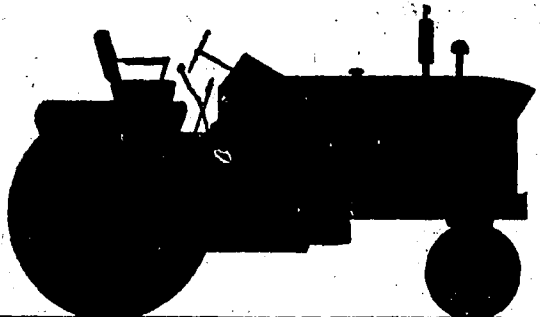

What it is...and
what it isn't

Your prescription is an order for a specific medication, for a specific individual, for a specific time. It is originated by your doctor and filled by your Registered Pharmacist. Today's prescription consists of eight specific and essential parts:

1. Date — included to verify the medicine is applicable to a current illness.
2. Name and address — so that none but the patient may use the prescription.
3. Superscription — "Rx" the symbol generally believed derived from the Latin "recipe" meaning "thou."
4. Inscription — the name and quantity of each ingredient prescribed.
5. Subscription — directions to the pharmacist explaining dosage, form and quantity of the pharmaceutical.
6. Signature — directions to the patient on quantity, timing and method of taking the prescription.
7. Refill information — for use by the pharmacist to facilitate service to the patient.
8. Signature — or initials of the prescribing physician to verify the order.

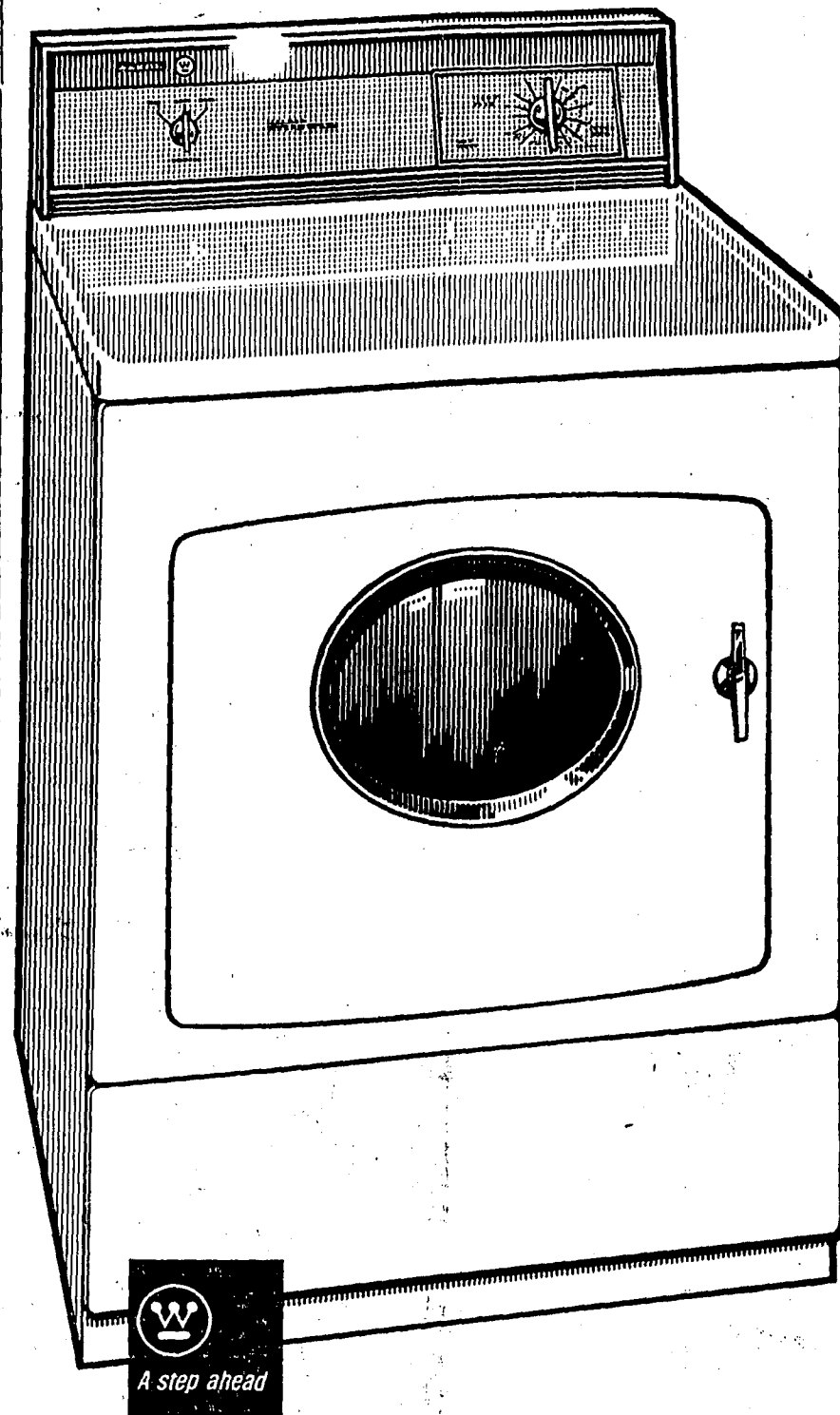

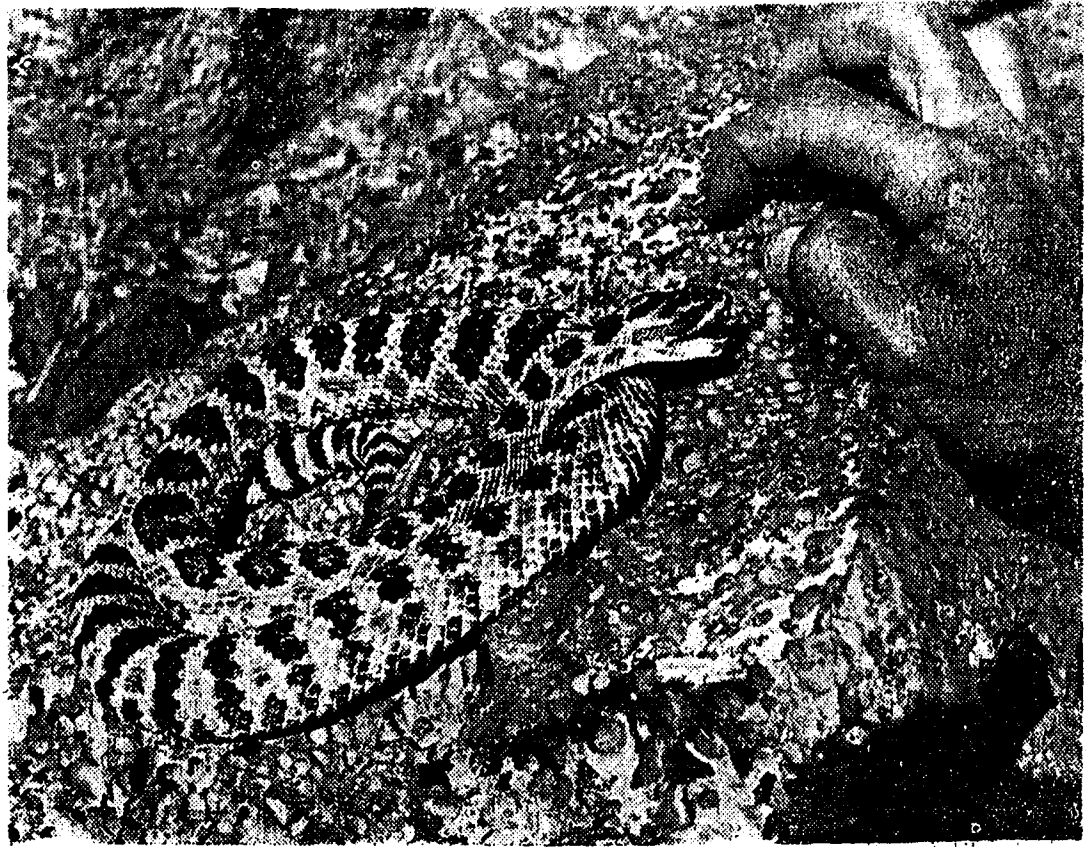

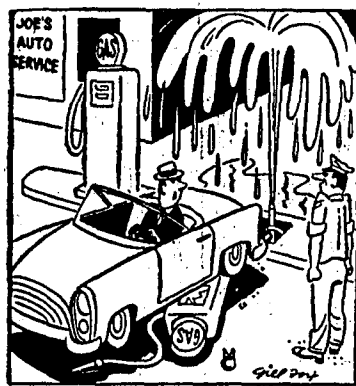

VALUABLE GEMS

Chicago — A flawless, faceted, blue topaz at Chicago's Field Museum weighs two pounds and nine ounces. The 5,890-carat stone was found in a creek bottom in Brazil and has been faceted into a teardrop-shaped gem measuring five inches long by three and a half inches wide by two and three-quarters inches deep. At the same museum there's a fairly flawless, rough (unfaceted) topaz that weighs more than 205,000 carats. However, this latter 87-pound gem has no color.

NEW HOUSING IS PLANNED AT U.

U. of I., Moscow — The site and concept of a new housing complex, which will eventually house more than 1,000 students at the University of Idaho, was approved during the recent meeting of the Board of Regents.

The multi-unit complex is expected to be started during the spring of 1967, with completion date of the first approximately 300-student unit in time for the fall semester of 1968. The Regents also approved the awarding of bids for the final \$1,500,000 final wing of the Wallace dormitory complex.

The first structure of the six-building complex is to be a high-rise dormitory of 10 or 11 floors; and will be located just north of the present Gault-Upham Hall buildings, south of Paradise Creek.

George Olson, director of the physical plant, said the unit will take approximately one and a half years to build.

A second unit, similar in height and size to the first high-rise structure, and the improved cafeteria facilities to handle the additional students, are set to be operational in the fall of 1969. The other four clustering low-rise dormitories, will be added later during the seven to nine years set for the completion of the development.

"Timing for the completion date for the entire complex will depend on future student enrollment," Ernest W. Hartung, university president, said.

The physical concept of the development was designed by Walker & McGough, a Spokane firm, with Boise architect Anton Dropping scheduled to design the first building.

PEAS AND LENTILS PROVING POPULAR

Osaka, Japan — Pacific Northwest dry peas and lentils are getting more than their share of attention during the opening days of the 7th Osaka International Trade Fair. So reports Wayne J. Chastain from the Fair grounds there, where he is meeting with Japanese businessmen interested in these commodities.

The Dry Pea and Lentil Council, headquartered at Pullman, is sponsoring a colorful promotion booth at the fair, and more than 40 nations are participating. A total of 2 million people are expected to view the exhibitions during its three-week duration. Dry peas and lentils are in foreign nations hall, most popular building because of its international atmosphere.

The Council's exhibit is on the order of a small side-walk cafe, complete with kitchen. Premium quality pea soup is prepared on the spot and served to inquiring businessmen and others interested in dry peas and lentils.

An assortment of dishes using dry peas and lentils has been developed for the Council by the Japan Cooking School of Osaka, one of Japan's leading institutions that specializes in cooking education.

Japan's imports of dry peas from the United States may top 18 thousand tons during the current marketing year ending Aug. 31. This will represent a 50 percent increase over the prior year and easily class Japan as the fastest growing market for the industry.

Promotional work in Japan, and elsewhere in the world, is a cooperative effort by the Council and the Foreign Agricultural Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture. All segments of the industry, from the grower to the seller, are represented on Council.
