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

CLOSED FIRE SEASON BEGAN MAY 10TH


The closed fire season on all areas outside of incorporated towns became effective May 10. After that date

effective May 10. After that date it became unlawful to burn on forest or range lands without a burning permit in possession.

Burning permits, when conditions are safe, can be obtained from State Forestry offices, U. S. Forest Service office and Grazing District offices. Advice on burning problems is also available at the same offices. Norman—Lewis, deputy state forester, Kendrick, urges all citizens to be extremely careful with fire this year. The below normal snow cover and early warm weather indicates a severe season ahead.

Even though half of the fires in Idaho are lightning caused, campfires, smokers and debris burning account for almost 25 percent of all the fires.
