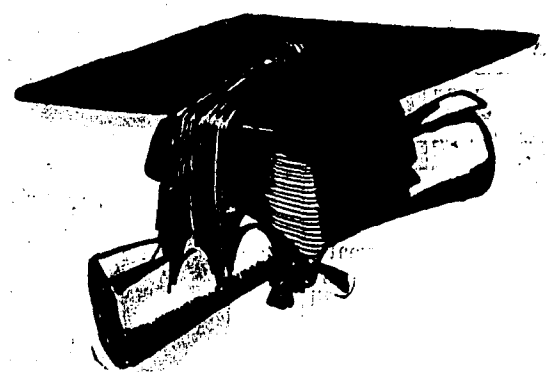

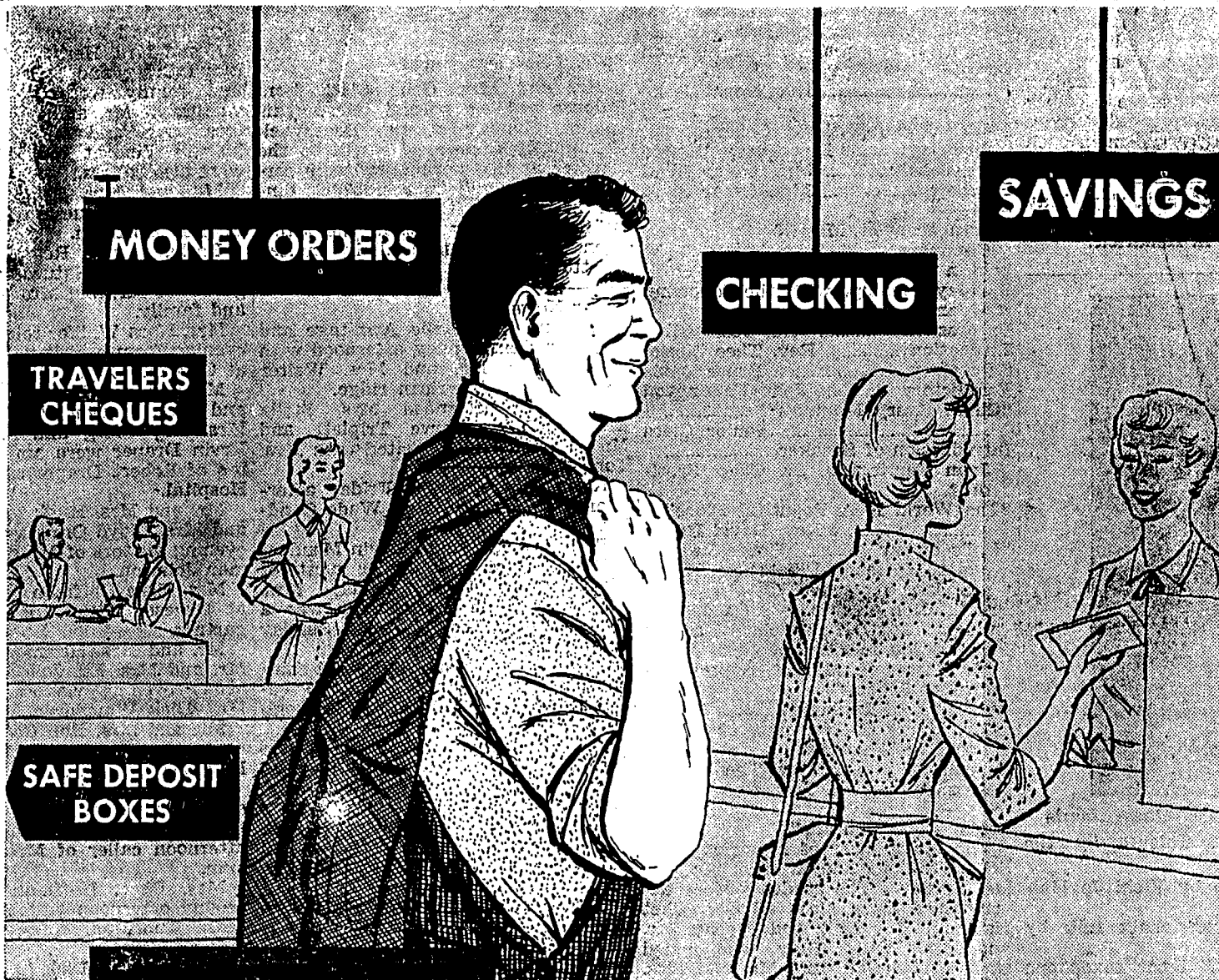

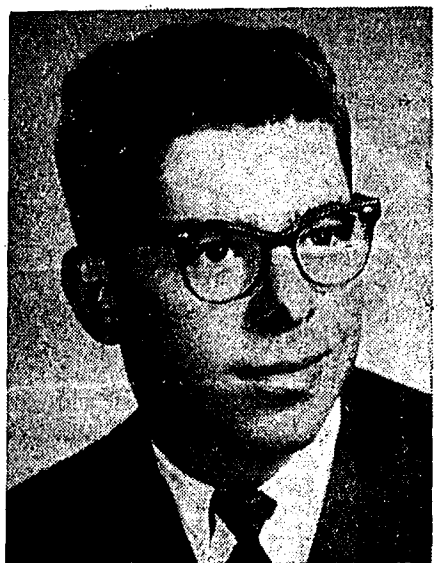

FINAL SNOW SURVEY MADE APRIL 30TH

Moscow — The last of the 1965-66 snow surveys on Moscow Mountain was completed April 30th by Fred Chugg and Larry Daniels of the Soil Conservation Service.

The snow line has receded over the past month to about the 4000-ft. level on the south and semi-protected areas. With the warming trend the area has experienced, the snow depth on the highest course at the 4,100-ft. level has decreased some 24.9 inches. The other four snow courses on the mountain recorded no snow at the time.

The Moscow Mountain Snow course has an average snow cover of 25 inches, which is about 2 inches above the last 10-year average for this date.

The highest snow depth recorded for this date was 47.1 inches on May 2, 1964, and the lowest was 13.2 inches on May 1, 1963. Last year on this date there was 14.8 inches of snow, which is 10.3 inches below that recorded for this year.

The water content of the snow is 10.6 inches, which is 4.8 inches above last year for the 1st of May. The present water in the snow pack is a high of 42 percent.

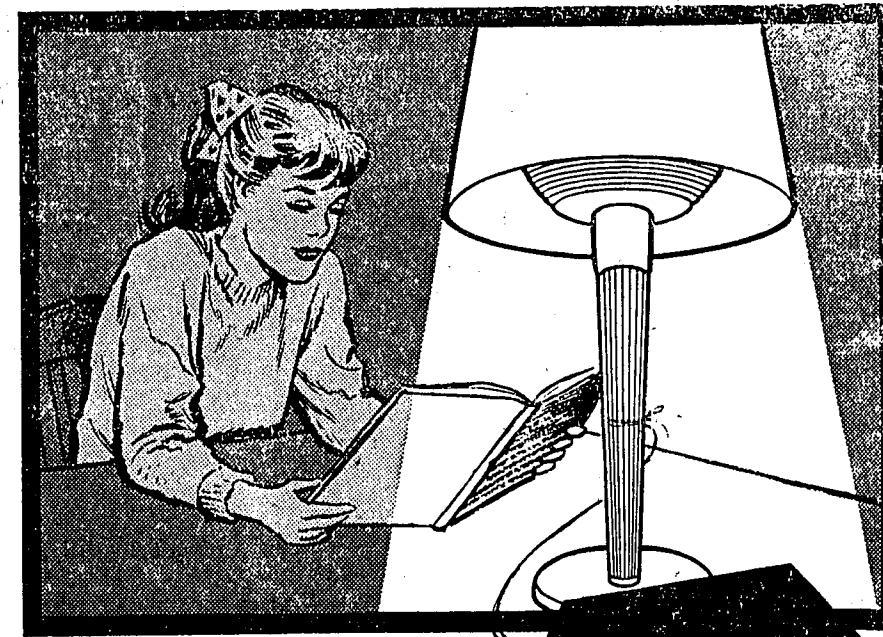

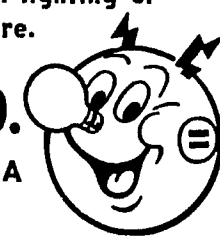
