## MILL BUILDING IS PROGRESSING

Completion of the new Mead & Howard Lumber Co., Inc., mill at Juliaetta is being slowed, due to the loss of much valuable electrical and mechanical equipment in the disastrous fire at Kendrick in May.

Of the equipment lost (edger) the new one has not been received as yet, but delivery is expected around the first of the month, along with several gear motors.

The huge steam plant is now ready for final tests before plant production. The new dry kiln is finished and is ready to receive lumber when the steam plant goes into operation.

In an effort to keep the woods crews busy, logs have been stacked in many different parts of the Juliaetta mill grounds, and are now rapidly filling up the available space.

Nearly all of the former sawmill crew, together with the night planer crew, are being used to speed the completion of the new facilities.

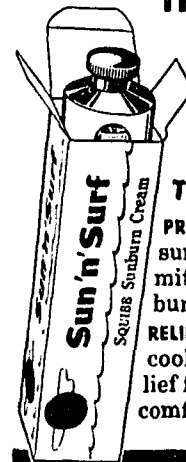
