FLOOD DAMAGE IS AVERTED BY QUICK ACTION OF LOCALS

December 29, 1933 — Following an almost unparalleled downpour lasting approximately four days, and preceded by days of intermittent rain, Potlatch Creek went on its semi-occasional rampage Friday and Saturday, doing damage that will run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars. At times water was running two feet deep in the middle of main street.

The first information of real danger was Friday morning about 5:30, when George Crocker, on an early morning trip to the Everett Crocker home near the Bear Creek bridge, discovered water pouring through the railroad embankment near the Vollmer-Clearwater railroad crossing, on the road leading to the warehouse. Mr. Crocker summoned Marshall Ed Long, and then went to the rescue of his family, who left the house for higher ground.

Marshall Long assembled crews of men, gathered sand bags and generally supervised things until local CWA and section crew could be gotten on to the job. All day long the fight continued, with the creek rising hourly, necessitating the placing of bags as high as four feet in places. By five o'clock in the evening the rain ceased and the creek started to go down, receding very slowly at first, but going down more rapidly in the evening hours.

As the water subdued and toll of the damage was taken it ran something like this; the Bear Creek diversion dike gone and a nice large slice of the Little Bear Highway completely washed away; perhaps a mile of the Cedar Creek highway washed away in different spots; the north approach to the Wauncher Gulch bridge washed away, but the span itself still intact; out-building located near the creek washed away, with the attendant loss of some small stock and poultry; the road above the Vollmer-Clearwater warehouse was also much damaged and many feet of track above town will have to be rebalisted.

It's impossible to estimate the total damage done, but it is safe to say it will run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Kendrick was without rail communications from Thursday evening till Saturday afternoon, when a train made its slow way over a rather wobbly track, bringing bread and the mail.

The main stream of water down main street entered through seepage at the railroad tracks near the site of the old Barnum Lumber and Mill Company, came around the rear of the Frank Crocker home, then down the back street near the depot, to swing onto Main Street near the postoffice and then straight down to the lower end of town. Everyone is busy cleaning up and hoping that there won't be another like it.

Note: Although held over from last week's Historical edition, this item was just too good to throw away.

X-RAYS BE USED

Chicago, Ill. — The Second Pyramid of Chephren, at Giza, will be "X-rayed" in a few months to determine whether undiscovered burial vaults exist in its huge mass of stone. The investigation may support one of the most persistent beliefs of archaeologists — that the real burial chambers of the Pharaohs have remained hidden.

Scientists will use cosmic ray muons, nuclear particles of the meson family, as their "X-rays," reports the Atomic Energy Commission.

BETTER VACCINATE THOSE HORSES

Moscow — Vaccination of horses and control of mosquitoes are advisable to prevent the spread of sleeping sickness in horses, according to Leonard Burns, Latah county agricultural agent. Prevention, he says is easier than a cure.

Horses of all ages are susceptible to sleeping sickness, known in veterinary terms as "equine encephalomyelitis." Because the number of horses has increased greatly in many areas of Idaho in recent years, prevention of the disease has become a general concern.

The disease produces fever and mild depression at first. Sometimes it passes without severe complica-

tions. But if the nervous system is involved the virus often spreads to the brain with fatal results in a few days. During the period of serious infection the horse may be restless and excited. The horse then gets sleepy and often stands in a groggy condition with legs crossed. Finally there are symptoms of paralysis and stumbling.

Vaccination gives protection, the county agent said. Control of mosquitoes that carry the disease is also a sensible precaution.

MANY ANIMALS ON FOREST RESERVE

Missoula — Cattle and sheep are now entering grazing allotments in the northern region National For-

est and Grasslands, Neal H. Rahm, Regional Forester, announces.

The annual trek to these pastures is expected to be completed next week.

Approximately 236,522 cattle and 155,504 sheep will graze 6,391,254 acres under paid permits in the 16 National Forests and four National Grasslands in eastern Washington, northern Idaho, North Dakota and western South Dakota.

Most of the cattle and sheep are counted by Forest Rangers as the animals enter the forests. Many of the cattle are dye branded with a hair coloring solution so that the grazing animals can be readily identified as those permitted to graze on specific areas.

GEM STATE HAS DOUBLE MEANING

Idaho not only is known as the "Gem of the Mountains," but is also picking up fame as the "Gem State" after the fine gem stones which are mined within its borders.

Idaho's widely varied geological structure offers a mineral collector's storehouse. Many of the collecting areas have received international fame because of the beautiful material that can be found with very little effort. Many of the areas are so remote that they have not been exploited to any great extent.

Idaho produces 72 kinds of precious and semi-precious stones. This includes agates of every known kind, jade which is equal to that of China; opals from old lava beds, pink, green and red garnets, and diamonds. In fact, what is said to have been the largest diamond ever found in the United States, weighing 19.5 carats, was found more than 25 years ago between McCall and New Meadows.

Agate, jasper, opal and agatized and opalized wood are found associated with the great lava flows of the southern part of the state.

The northern section has, in addition to the above, garnet, emerald, sillimanite and fossil flora. And in the center of the state are found aquamarine, diamond, ruby and garnet. There is hardly an area in Idaho in which the "rock hound" cannot find rocks or minerals to delight any collector.
