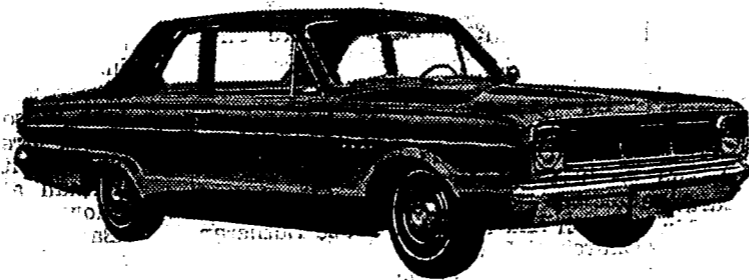

IDAHO NOXIOUS WEED INVASION UP

U. of I., Moscow — Weed specialists are expressing concern over the invasion of noxious weeds in the state of Idaho.

The 1966 annual meeting of the Idaho Noxious Weed Control Association, meeting at the university has drawn more than 100 specialists to discuss the problem of weed control.

Experts say it is costing \$40,000,000 each year to control weeds in Idaho's highly developed agricultural lands, and control has been effective, but expressed concern over forest land and range that does not benefit from weed control programs.

According to a 1965 Idaho noxious weed survey, more than 2,593,000 acres are weed infested. This is a 571,000 acre increase over the last survey in 1951. The present survey shows a two-fold increase in weed infestation on federal lands in the past 15 years. Bureau of Land Management and U. S. Forest Service lands account for nearly half the total infested area of 1,218,973 acres.

Authorities state that Canadian thistle is increasing annually except where positive control action is continually in progress. Halogeton is still spreading. Medusahead was estimated to infest only 20,000 acres in 1951. It now infests over 500,000 acres.

New weeds are spreading into Idaho. Diffuse knapweed is advancing in Lincoln and Clark counties. Spotted knapweed is invading from the Montana border into the Salmon area. Yellow star thistle is blossoming in Nez Perce county. The yellow flowered Skeleton weed infests Kootenai county along the Washington border and at Banks.

Gerald Ingle, chairman, weed committee, Idaho County Commissioners and Clerks Association, stated: "The science of weed control has made spectacular advances during the past decade. The weed problem, however, has not diminished in any proportion commensurate with the tools available to accomplish the job."

SCHOOL SET SEPT. 1, REGISTER AUG. 25-26

Supt. James V. Muscat announced this week that Kendrick High School will begin on Thursday, Sept. 1st, with registration set for Thursday and Friday, Aug. 25 and 26.

Grade school registration will be on Tuesday, August 30, at the Juliaetta Elementary school.

The early start of school is due to state requirements that school be taught 180 days, rather than the previously required 177 days.
