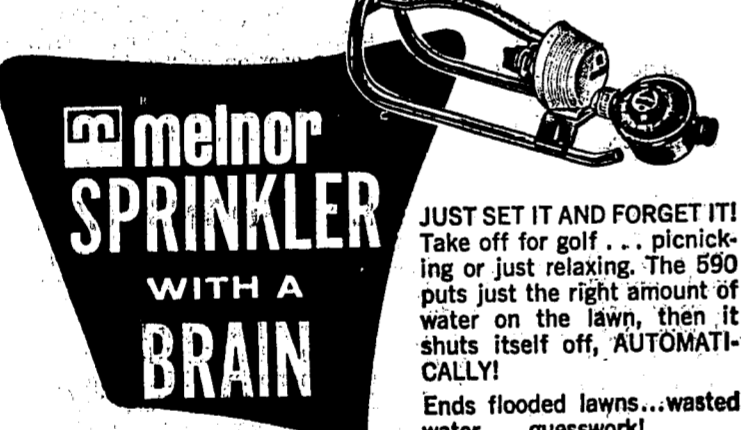

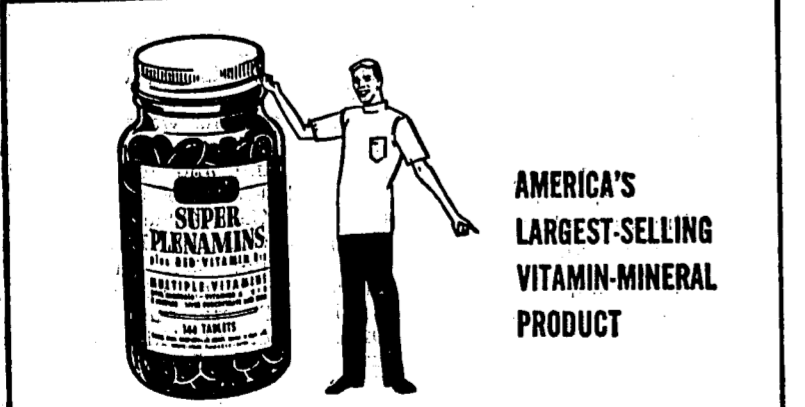

**33-202 NOTICE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS OF SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN**

In compliance with the requirements of 33-202, notice is hereby given that: In all school districts of this state, every parent or guardian of any child between the ages of seven and sixteen years shall cause such child to be instructed in certain specific subjects. Every such parent or guardian shall cause such child to attend a public, private or parochial school, during a period equal to that portion of each year during which the public school are in session in such district, and shall cause such child to conform to the attendance regulations established by the board of trustees of such school district.

When a duly licensed physician or psychiatrist shall certify in writing that the physical or mental condition of a child is such that it does not permit attendance at school and upon a finding by the board of trustees that the best interests of the child or the school will be served by exempting such child from attendance, then the board of trustees may grant such exemption during the continuance of such disability. A petition for exemption for such cause may be initiated by the child or by its parent or guardian.

Before the board of trustees may exempt any child who is an habitual truant whose conduct would disrupt school order or discipline, the board shall notify the parents or guardian and afford them an opportunity to appear and show cause why the exemption should not be granted. When exempted for such cause, the probate court shall be notified and said child shall come under the purview of the youth rehabilitation law. Dated this 15th day of August, 1966
