## HEAT, DUST FEATURE WEEK'S WEATHER

High heat and smothering dust were the features of the past week's weather — a week that most locals won't forget for a while.

For example, Wednesday, August 24, the "official" thermometer recorded a high of 104 degrees (Lewiston said 109 there), and at 9:00 p. m. of that day it still read 80 degrees! However, during the night it dropped to 60 degrees and sleep was possible and comfortable.

Thursday the reading was 95 degrees, and at 9:00 p. m. the reading was again 80 degrees. The high reading was accompanied by a hot wind, and a dust storm that literally coated everything. The dust was so thick that around the street lights it looked like fog.

Shortly after 9:00, with the hot wind blowing, temperatures went back up and sparks began to fly from power lines where they were rubbed by trees, and most of the street lights in town went out.

About 10:00 p. m. the wind blew over a large tree between the John Lind house (occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Klatt and family) and the adjoining property to the west. The huge locust came out "by the roots" and broke off portions of two black walnut trees standing alongside it. Branches covered the Klatt family car, and for a time it was thought the car was demolished — but when "midnight logging operations" were completed the vehicle was found to have only two small dents and numerous scratches. The big tree effectively blocked State Highway 3 until power saws and a tractor were used to clear the roadway.

Friday morning dawned hot and windy (72 degrees) but later in the day the temperature fell to 60 degrees, and then climbed back up to a mere 80. The air, however, remained thick with dust most of the day.

Saturday, Sunday and Monday were over-cast and showery, with high temperatures in the low 70's.

## FACE FLY BECOMES LATAH CO. PROBLEM

Moscow — An infestation of face flies affecting both beef and dairy cattle in the Southwick area of Latah county were identified last week. Roland Portman, extension entomologist for the University of Idaho, and Leonard Burns, Latah county agent, made positive identification from specimens collected at the Lyons Bros. ranch on Cedar Ridge.

The Face Fly, identifiable under high magnification only, is a non-biting insect and is very difficult to control. Burns noted that continued applications of Clodrin or Dichlorvos insecticides will give temporary relief to animals suffering from Face Fly attacks. There is no advantage to using higher concentrations than that recommended by the manufacturers. Spraying should be done out-of-doors, where large numbers of the insects will come in direct contact with the particular spray being used. The Face Fly gathers in large numbers to feed on secretions around the eyes and nose of cattle. It is closely related to, and look like the common house fly.

The Face Fly, a native to Europe and North Africa, was first reported on the Atlantic coast in 1952. It was reported in 1965 in Moscow and the Craters of the Moon in Idaho. This year the insect has been reported in Bonners Ferry, St. Maries and now Southwick. It is also suspected of being present in wide areas of Latah county.

Specimens collected by residents of Latah county should be forwarded to Leonard Burns, Latah County Agent, Courthouse, Room 209, Moscow, Idaho. 83843.
