Moscow — An infestation of face flies affecting both beef and dairy cattle in the Southwick area of Latan county were identified last week. Roland Portman, extension entomologist for the University of Idaho, and Leonard Burns Latan county agent, made postive identification from specimens collected at the Lyons Bros. ranch on Cedar ridge.

The Face Fly, identifiable under high magnification only, is a non-biffing insect and is very difficult to control. Burns noted that control applications of Ciodrin of Dichlor-vos insecticides will give temporary relief to animals suffering from Face Fly attacks. There is no advantage to using higher concentrations than that recommended by the manufactures.


