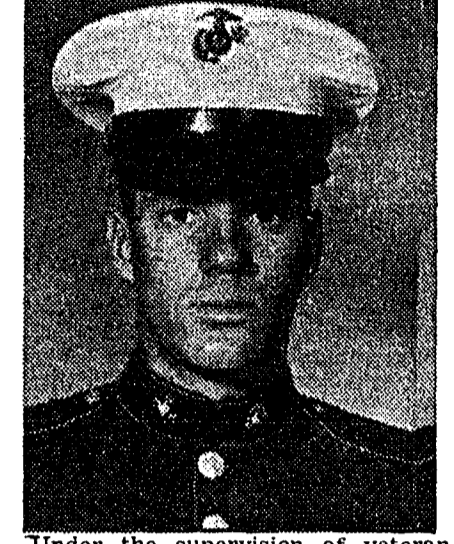

RECRUIT TRAINEE

San Diego, Calif. (FHTNC) — Marine Pvt. William L. Bunch, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harlen E. Bunch of Juliaetta, Idaho, was graduated from eight weeks of recruit training at the Marine Corps recruit depot here.



Under the supervision of veteran noncommissioned officer drill instructors, he learned small arms marksmanship, bayonet fighting and methods of self-protection. He also received instruction in military drill, history and traditions of the Marine Corps, and other academic subjects.

He will now undergo four weeks of individual combat training and four weeks of basic specialist training in his military job field before being assigned to a permanent unit.

LATAH COUNTY FAIR FEATURES "FIRSTS"

Moscow — The Latah County Fair will feature the first annual Gymkhana and Horse Show on Saturday, Sept. 17th. Nearly 600 members of riding clubs throughout the county will be eligible to compete in the many and varied events. Riding groups will compete for cash awards Saturday morning as they parade on Moscow's Main Street.

Beginning at 12:00 noon, a six-event gymkhana will begin, followed by the Horse Show starting at 6:30 p. m.

This year's combined horse events were planned by a group representing the eight different riding clubs in Latah county.

Chairman for the Gymkhana and Horse Show is Ormand Manderfeld of Kendrick. Assisting him as co-chairmen are Kenny Pederson of Moscow and Verle Brown of Princeton — the 1967 and 1968 chairmen respectively.

Manderfeld urges all members of Latah county riding groups to participate. Contestants will be within one of seven possible age groups. Trophies will be awarded all first place winners.

A special feature of the fair, especially for old timers will be the Horse Harnessing Contest. Scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 17, at 10:00 a. m. and 2:00 p. m. Contestants will compete for cash prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5.00. Any resident of Latah county is eligible to compete regardless of age or sex. The contest is run against time, with time penalties for errors. Contestants will sign up at the time of the event.

Talent Show Be Feature

All youngsters of Latah county can participate in the Latah County Talent Show the first night of the County Fair, Sept. 15. Those who wish to participate should contact John Mix at KRPL radio station, Moscow, before Sept. 14. Prizes will be awarded to the three top winners. The show is scheduled to begin at 7:00 p. m. It will be followed by the annual "Crowning of the Queen" ceremonies. The queen will be selected from candidates from each of the High schools in Latah county.

J. M. LYLE HONORED FOR 20 YEARS SERVICE

Moscow — James M. Lyle, University of Idaho Alumni secretary has been honored for 20 years of service to the university's alumni.

Dr. Ernest W. Hartung, president of the university, and William Campbell, Boise, president of the Alumni Association, presented Lyle a certificate on behalf of the University Board of Regents.

In 1946 Lyle was appointed the first full time alumni secretary. At that time he stated, "I hope eventually to be in close touch with every alum, and to be of real service to him."

In 20 years Lyle estimates he has traveled a third of a million miles, been in every Idaho postoffice, and found alumni of the university in every part of the state.

Dr. Hartung said, "Without Lyle's efforts we would not have an Alumni Association. No one has worked harder in this endeavor."

A 1929 graduate of the university from Peck, Lyle had received his master's degree in education in 1940.

He was superintendent of schools at Southwick, Kendrick and Grangeville before being assistant state superintendent of schools in 1941-42, before entering the service in World War II.

SALES TAX BOOKS HAVE BEEN MAILED

Moscow — Approximately 11,000 "Elector's Informative Pamphlets," as published by the Secretary of State, have recently been processed in the office of M. K. "Kelly" Cline, county auditor, as required by law.

This law requires that the pamphlets be mailed to all registered voters (which includes husband and wife) at their last known address. To do this, without additional help, required many days and evenings of work in putting on the return, affixing the names and stamps. Cost to Latah county amounted to \$450.00 for postage.

Stamps were affixed in preference to bulk mailing for many voters have moved and have never changed their voting address, and under bulk rates, the pamphlets are not forwarded. If undeliverable the cost to the county would be 8c per copy for the return.

Mr. Cline suggests that if there has been a change in address that the elector should get a transfer from his former registrar and take it to the registrar where he currently resides. Any correction in the name should be mailed to the office of the auditor rather than phoned, so that the notification can be filed away.

Extra copies of the pamphlet will be available at the county auditor's office until the present supply is exhausted.

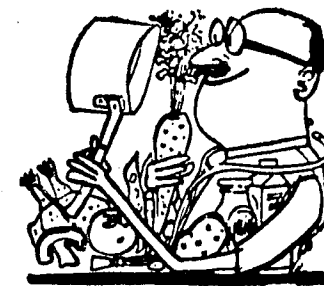

COOL FOODS FOR HOT WEATHER

High temperatures seem to put temperamental people out of temper for hot foods. And why not? There used to be lots of prejudices about the temperature of foods and drinks, and health educators had their share. I remember a controversy I had with some of my colleagues when I was so bold as to suggest that cool drinks were okay if they were sipped and not gulped. My defense was that there was some chance of this advice being followed, while if I suggested that all iced drinks be banned, all I would get was the big laugh and the designation "health crank." Later, the Journal of the A.M.A. published an article saying that iced drinks do no harm if they are not taken too fast. Well, differences of opinion make life more interesting.

Cool Planning

So now, does hot weather really make a difference in what and how we eat? Eating should be a pleasure and not a chore. This means that we should pay attention to eating somewhat differently when the weather is hot. Naturally we must keep the diet balanced. Thus we should not reduce our intake of protein. But we may get protein in milk, eggs, cheese, cold meats, poultry and fish, and eggs hard-boiled in your salad. Instead of the conventional hot cooked foods which are fine when the weather is cool. Neither do we need as many calories to maintain body temperature when it's hot; so we can reduce the fats in our diet, especially the hot fried ones, and get our quota of fat from cream on our berries and, again, ice cream, and cool salad dressings. Since we need fewer calories, we can use more of the low-sugar vegetables so useful in salads — lettuce, white or red cabbage, radishes, young onions, carrots, cucumbers, tomatoes. Enriched bread-stuffs round out a well-planned diet.

Cool Meals

What about "a hot dish with every meal," which used to be a nutritional slogan? Maybe I'm a maverick, but I see no real need for a hot dish in hot weather, when there are so many cool foods that can serve just as well. Salads, for example, can be made in infinite variety, garnished with fish, cheese, fruits, vegetables, meat, crisp bacon, anchovies, eggs, nuts, olives and pickles. With the addition of some of the numerous varieties of flavored waters now available, salads become meals in themselves. Beverages? Cool milk, shakes of various flavors, iced tea or coffee, soft drinks served in a pleasant room or on the patio, or under the trees on a picnic... That's cool, man, co-ool!

AIR MATTRESSES

The American Safety Council has issued a warning about the use of air mattresses as "floats" or "water-wings" for swimming and relaxing. They say: "Don't! Most air mattresses, particularly the cheaper ones, do not have the strength to take the pressures forced on them when used as floats. They can be extremely dangerous."

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CROPS APPROVED FOR CERTIFICATION

U. of I., Moscow — Seven crop varieties have been approved for certification in Idaho by the foundation seed stocks committee of the University of Idaho College of Agriculture, H. E. Fennell, Boise, manager of the Idaho Crop Improvement Association announced last week. All the varieties were recommended at the June meeting of directors of the crop improvement association. Final approval was given late in July.

The crops are Apex and Glacier alfalfa; Louisiana S-1 white clover; Armada white clover, Pelo perennial ryegrass, Rodney oats and Sebago potatoes.

Fennell said Armada white clover and Pelo perennial ryegrass are eligible only under the certification program of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, which concerns varieties originating outside the United States.

BIDS CALLED FOR ON NEW BUILDING

U. of I., Moscow — Bids for a new Engineering Laboratory building at the University of Idaho, estimated to cost \$1,971,640, with \$657,000 coming from a federal grant, will be opened Aug. 25, it is announced by Kenneth A. Dick, financial vice president.

Explaining that a green light had been received from the federal government in Washington after some delay, Dick said that it was imperative that construction get under way this fall so that relief can be brought to over-crowded conditions in the College of Engineering as soon as possible. Construction is expected to take 18 to 20 months.

Dick commended the staff of the College of Engineering, George Gagon physical plant director, and the Boise architectural firm of Dropping and Kelley for "accomplishing final plans on this major building in a little over a calendar year." The last State Legislature approved \$1,314,640 for the structure.

The new four-story, brick-faced building, which will be built in the engineering block on the campus, will provide a total area of 80,175 square feet. Although there will be some classrooms and offices, the big majority of the space will be devoted to laboratories — chemical, electrical, sanitary, hydraulics, irrigation, civil engineering and agricultural engineering.

TO SHOW YEARLING

Portland — Ken Heimgartner of Juliaetta is one of the Future Farmers of America youths expected to bring back a yearling to the Pacific International Livestock Exposition for its 56th showing in Portland on Oct. 14-22.

Heimgartner, representing the F. F. A. chapter at Kendrick High School, was one of ten boys who ended up with calves in the annual F. F. A. calf scramble at last year's exposition. The calf scramble is a hilarious action event as 20 boys do their best to capture one of the 10 reluctant calves turned loose in the arena. Many of the calves, carefully tended by their new owners, become prize winners at later Expositions.

Future Farmer chapters from five states participate in the Pacific International, the Pacific Northwest's largest completely agriculture show.

U. OF I. EXPECTS 1800 PLUS FROSH

U. of I., Moscow — More than 1800 freshmen will enter the University of Idaho this September. For the majority, this is the first and final separation from home. Many of these 18-year-olds will be making their first major decisions. According to Donald Kees, director of counseling services, all this comes at a time in which they are least inclined to make decisions.

"These young people are developing into adults, but like to fall back on the carefree ways of youth," said Kees. "Parents, too, are reluctant to see this development, but the university expects adult behavior and responsibility from its students."

During the first year more than four percent of the freshmen will leave the university. The majority that do leave apparently have little direction or motivation in pursuing an education. They are capable, but have not made decisions regarding an education.

Some reasons for leaving are family problems, low scholastic achievement. Some are asked to leave for disciplinary reasons. The transition between home and university may be too great or the university's size too awesome. Money does not seem to be a major problem.
