





Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of safety.

Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unlowded, and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be corried in cases to the shooting area.

3 Always be sure barrel and action are clear of pbstructions, and that you have only summunition of the proper. size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.

4 Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumbte; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.

5 Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.

6 Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun

Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and emmunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.

8 Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzles

9 Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice be sure your backstop is adequate.

10 Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during sheeting.


