HIGHWAY WORK AT A STANDSTILL

According to a report from the office of Donald Cox, District No. 4, State Highway Department, Lewiston, all the right of way needed for construction of State Highway 99 from Kendrick 3 miles north toward Troy has been obtained with the exception of two small parcels on the Kendrick end.

The state cannot proceed with the construction until all parcels are purchased. The project is programmed, but cannot be constructed until all parcels are negotiated. The entire project could be delayed as much as two years if court action is necessary to obtain the right of way.

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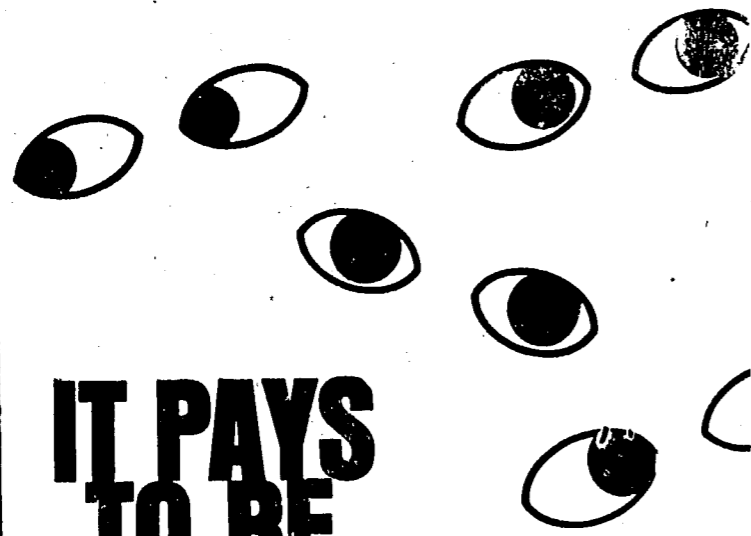

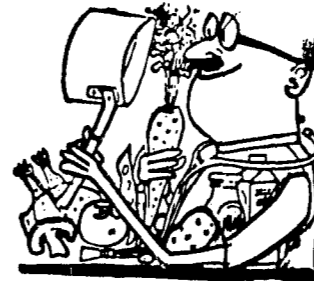

FOOD FOR YOUR TEETH

What part does diet play in the protection of your teeth against the most prevalent disease of a prosperous civilization — dental decay?

Are your teeth living structures or just dead "ivories"? Can a good diet help poor teeth? Can a bad diet harm good teeth? Who needs tooth protection most?

Living Structures

Teeth are living structures, even though portions of them are not. The dentine and the enamel are inert, but the pulp of the tooth contains blood vessels and nerves. The membrane which fastens the teeth to the bone, and the bony ridges of the upper and lower jaw in which the teeth are imbedded, are definitely living structures. As such, they depend on good nutrition for their integrity. Their most essential needs are calcium and phosphorus plus the vitamin D necessary for their effective absorption and utilization.

Importance Of Nutrition
There are certain times in life when nutrition, and therefore, diet, is most important in relation to the teeth.

One of these times is when the teeth are first developing. It is not generally realized that although teeth do not usually appear until about the sixth month of an infant's life, they were formed as embryonic structures before birth. This includes not only the baby teeth, but the adult

teeth as well. The newborn child's mouth contains the beginnings of 52 teeth.

Since the unborn child depends on its mother for nourishment, her supply of calcium, phosphorus and vitamin D — and of course all the other requirements of a balanced diet — is of special importance. Not only the child, but the mother herself needs these nutrients for the protection of her own teeth.

Older Persons, Too
It is too often overlooked that older persons, too, need a supply of calcium, phosphorus and vitamin D for the preservation of the health of their teeth and supporting structures. As people grow older, dentists find that they tend to have trouble with periodontal disease. This means that there is loss of bone in the jawbones which support the teeth, and deterioration of the membrane which attaches the tooth to its socket. The consequence is loosening of the teeth, and loss of teeth if the process is not halted.

Sources of Calcium
Calcium is best derived from milk and cheese made from the milk. And, of course, from ice cream and other foods made with milk. Milk is the best source of calcium, so much so that in the absence of adequate milk in the diet, it is difficult to supply the necessary calcium. Vitamin D is provided in practically all fluid

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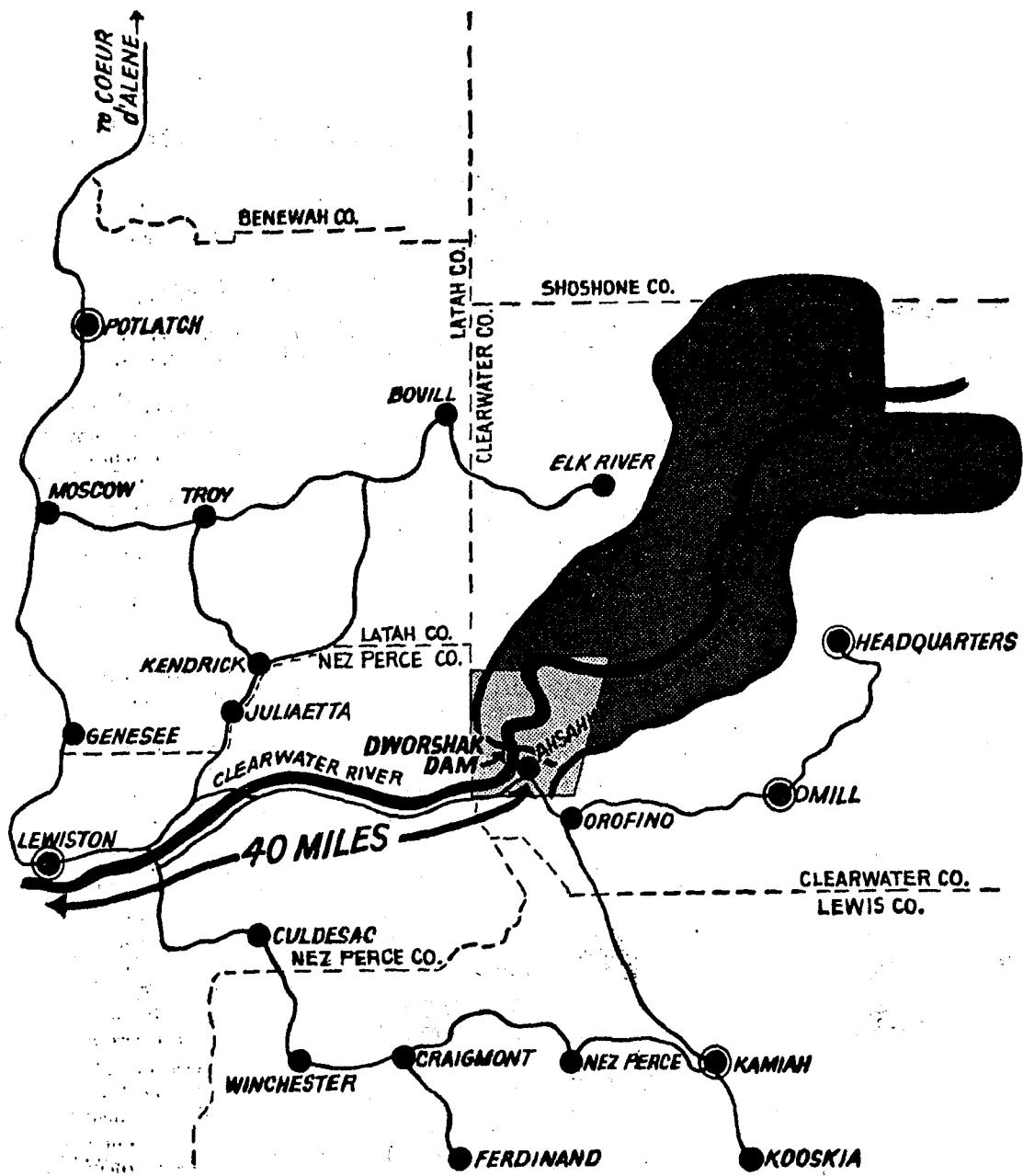

Orofino — A charge of nearly 20 tons of explosives was set off Saturday to mark the official start of construction on the mighty Dworshak Dam.

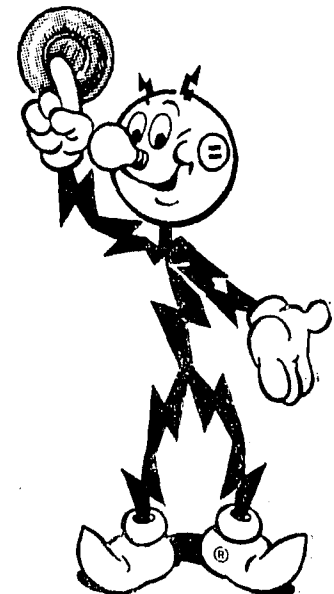

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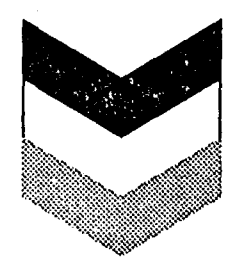

The 10 Commandments of Safety

- 1 Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of safety.
- 2 Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and faken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
- 3 Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.
- 4 Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
- 5 Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
- 6 Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.
- 7 Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
- 8 Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
- 9 Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface of the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your backstop is adequate.
- 10 Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

SPECIAL LICENSE PLATE NUMBERS

Applications for the reservation of special license numbers for 1967 will be taken starting Oct. 3rd, according to Eugene Taylor, Latah county assessor.
 First consideration for a number will be given the current holder until Oct. 31. After that date, all unreserved numbers may be requested until Nov. 18.
 Re-application for special numbers must be made each year, regardless of the length of time an individual has had the same number. However, license plate numbers 1 through 12 will be assigned to state and county officials.
 The application, accompanied by payment of the license fee plus 50c for handling and mailing, must be submitted to the assessor's office to reserve a special number. If the reservation request is made by mail for more than one vehicle, applicant should designate which number is to be assigned to each vehicle. It is not necessary to send in the registration if the vehicle for which the number is requested has an up-to-date Latah county registration on file in the assessor's office.
 If the vehicle does not have an Idaho title or is not registered in this county, personal application must be made. Special numbers requested for trucks to be registered for more than 8,000 pound gross should apply in person at the license department.
 Reservations cannot be accepted for "future deliveries."
 The schedule for license fees for passenger cars and pickups, 8,000 pounds gross and under are: \$7.50 for vehicles 1958 and older; \$10.00 for 1959 and 1960; \$12.50 for 1961 and 1962; \$15.00 for 1963 and 1964, and \$17.50 for 1965 through 1968.
 Reserved plates will be mailed out the week of Dec. 1 at which time the regular sale of 1967 license plates will begin.
