

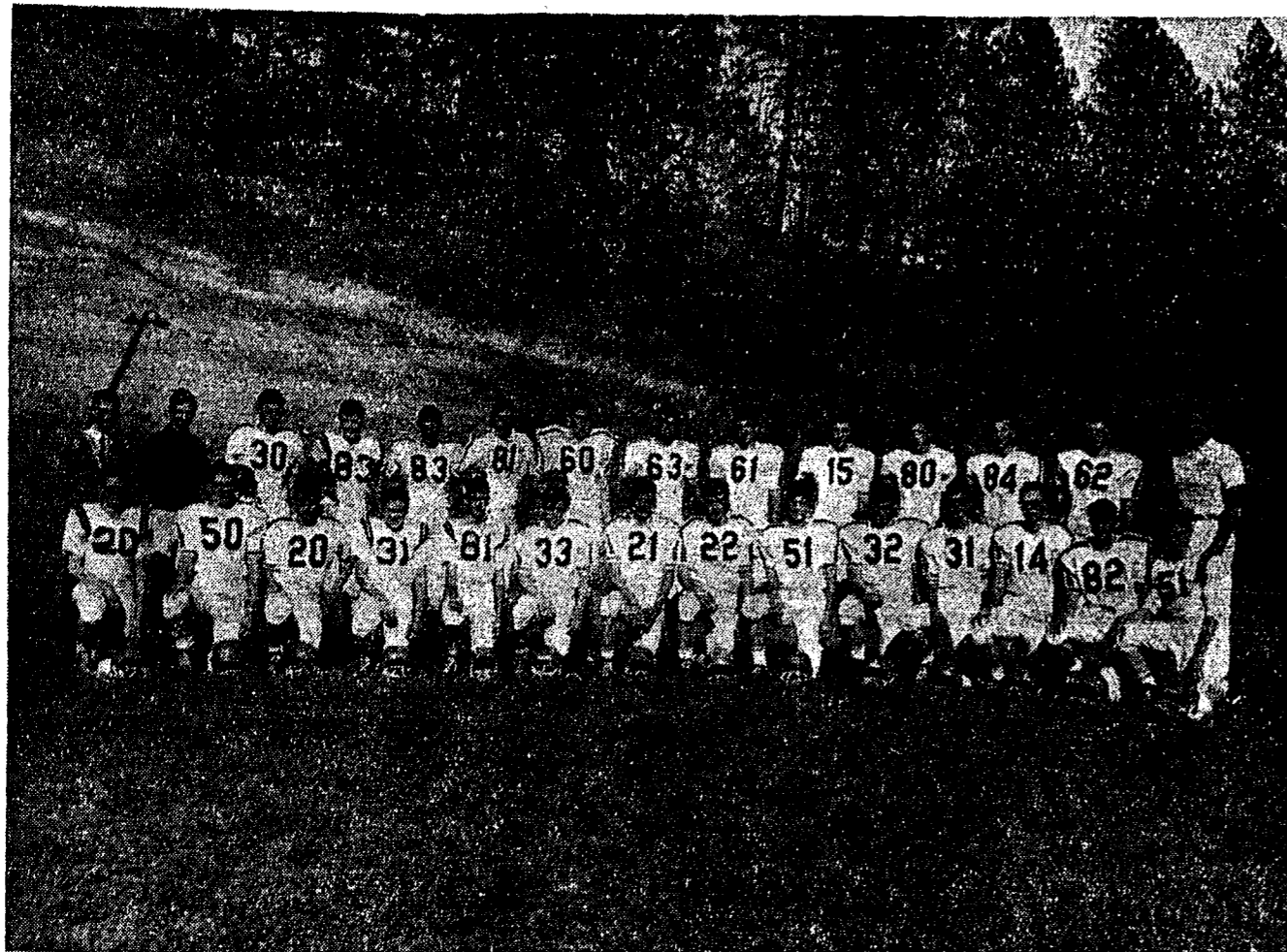

School Lunch Week Oct. 9-16

For 20 years the National School Lunch program has convincingly demonstrated the vital role of good nutrition in the total educational program of the nation's children.

The program is an outstanding example of a federal-state-local partnership to make effective use of our food abundance and to protect the health and well being of all our children, regardless of their race or ability to pay.

This year, under this program, some 19 million children in over 71,000 public and non-profit private schools will enjoy nutritious, appetizing lunches.

Increased federal, state and local efforts will help additional thousands of children from low income families to obtain lunches that will strengthen their vitality and their ability to obtain maximum benefits from the learning process.

In recognition of the value and achievements of the School Lunch program, the Congress by a joint resolution of October 9, 1962, has designated the seven-day period beginning the second Sunday of October in each year as National School Lunch Week, and has requested the President to issue annually a proclamation calling for the observance of that week.

Now, therefore, I, Lydon B. Johnson, President of the United States of America, call upon the people of the United States to observe the week beginning October 9, 1966, as National School Lunch Week, with ceremonies and activities designed to increase public understanding and awareness of the significance of the National School Lunch program to the child, to the home, to the farm, to industry and to the nation.

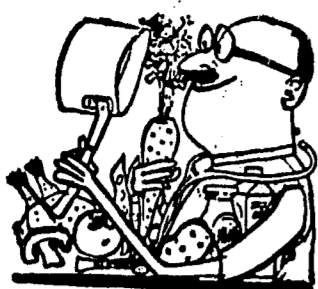

Doctor in the Kitchen

WHAT IS A CARBOHYDRATE?

Now that dietary facts—not to mention fads, fallacies, and frauds—are the subject of everyday conversation, maybe it would be nice to know approximately what we are talking about.

So... what are carbohydrates, and what do they do for us? Or do they?

The learned compilers of the dictionaries remind us that carbohydrates are related to the alcohols. This should not surprise us too much, remembering that when sugar meets yeast, alcohol results, whether you start with rye, corn, potatoes, rice, grapes, cherries or dandelion blossoms.

Chemical Makeup

But "alcohol" to the nutritionist does not mean the kick in your highball. It means a long series of similar compounds, differing only in the number of carbon atoms they contain, and consisting of carbon, hydrogen and oxygen—the latter in the same proportion as they occur in water. Hence—carbo-hydrates. In the body they end up as carbon dioxide gas (which is breathed out) and water.

Carbohydrates are the familiar sugars and starches in our diet, and are found also in the fibrous portions of vegetable foods, which usually are indigestible. Carbohydrates are the fuel which supply us with heat and energy. Right now some researchers who

are not blaming heart disease on fats are holding carbohydrates responsible for it. Currently also, carbohydrates are playing the leading role in the phoney "drinking man's diet".

You Need Carbohydrates
The fact that carbohydrates are simply fuel, and supply neither building materials as proteins do, nor vitamins and minerals, has put them in disfavor with many people. Many carbohydrates, especially the refined sugars, have been called "empty calories". It is true that a diet should not be overbalanced with these energy foods, but neither should it be lacking in them.

Aside from the out-and-out sugars, syrups, honey, molasses and starchy foods, carbohydrates can be made by the body from an oversupply of proteins, especially if the individual takes too little exercise.

Too much carbohydrate in proportion to needs is converted into fat and stored in the body. Too little carbohydrates results in trouble with fat metabolism, especially in diabetics, where the sugar-control function is impaired.

A properly selected diet places emphasis on the milk and milk products group, meat, fish and poultry, fruits and vegetables, and whole wheat or enriched breads and cereals. After that, the tasty sweets.

HIGHWAY TROUBLES SHOW INCREASE

Spokane — Tire and carburetor trouble increased sharply for the nation's motorists in 1965, but did not displace battery and electrical failures as the number one cause of breakdowns on the highways, according to a report from the AAA.

The annual study of automobile breakdowns in the nation showed that motorists were able to drive their cars 69,746,000 times last year. This was an increase of eight percent over 1964, though the number of passenger cars on the road has gone up by only five percent.

However, it is pointed out, the number of motoring troubles was still two million short of the all-time high of nearly 72 million reported in 1963, and there are now seven million more cars on the road.

There were 10.6 percent more flat tires than in 1964, bringing the total up to over 13 million, and keeping them in the number two position. In first place were 18.6 million battery and electrical failures, which have been on top of the list for a number of years.

A sharp increase has also been reported in carburetor and ignition failures, with totals of 2.4 million and 7.6 million, respectively. Although the over all number of brake failures is small, compared with the other motoring troubles, they did increase by 12.5 percent last year.

EDUCATORS VIEW ARMY TRAINING

U. of I., Moscow — Dr. Ernest W. Hartung, president of the University of Idaho, and Dr. David D. Kendrick, dean of the university's College of Business Administration, were among 70 educators from 38 universities, colleges and high schools, who were

invited by the Army to observe training and view practical application of classroom instruction at Fort Lewis, Wash., during the week.

The visit also enabled the educators to arrive at a better understanding of the factors which go into training of the individual cadet — the development of leadership traits, the building of confidence and self-reliance, and the formation of professional competence.

Completion of the six-week ROTC camp, plus graduation from college, is necessary before the 1,650 cadets now in camp can receive their commissions as second lieutenants.

HONEY COMB?

The complex honey-comb structure of most catalysts gives them a high ratio of surface area to volume. This characteristic enables the catalysts to bring large amounts of reactants into intimate contact with their highly active surface area. A handful of aspirin-size catalyst pellets, for example, says Girdler Catalysts, Louisville, contains a combined surface area equal to a football field.

PILOTS COVER MILES

Non-airline pilots last year flew a record 2.6 billion miles in 16.7 million hours in 95,442 aircraft and achieved the lowest fatal accident rate in history, reports the Federal Aviation Agency.

PRODUCTION DOWN

Heavy metals, including gold, silver, platinum, mercury bismuth, antimony, tantalum and tin, are in short supply and are being consumed at a rate far exceeding domestic production, say the directors of the Geological Survey and Bureau of Mines.

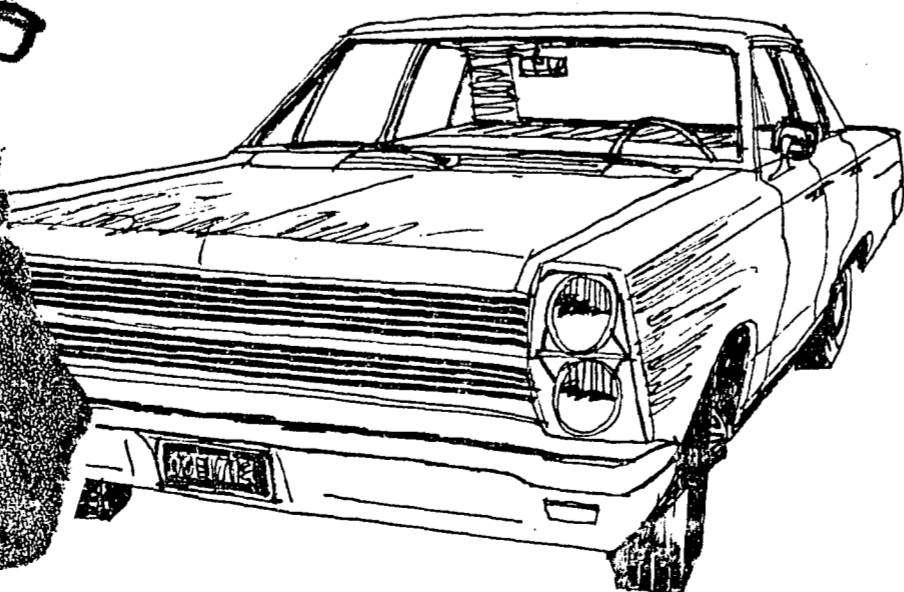

PENALTIES STIFF FOR CONTINUED LAW VIOLATIONS

W. A. Campbell, local Justice of the Peace points out that laws for continued violations of load, height and similar laws are very severe — and from the Idaho Vehicle Laws of 1961, page 140, Section 49-909 quotes: "Penalties for violations — It shall be unlawful and constitute a misdemeanor for any person to violate any of the provisions of this chapter, and any person convicted of such violation shall be subject to punishment by a fine not to exceed \$100.00 or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days and to the cancellation of registration of each motor vehicle operated in violation of any order for the regulation or suspension of traffic issued under the authority of this chapter, and the cancellation of the license of

the operator.

Further, Mr. Campbell says that he believes most drivers are not aware of the new violation point count for traffic violations, and he quotes as follows:

Backing without reasonable safety, 1; driving on wrong side of road, 3; Flashing red light (failure to stop) 3; Following too closely, 3; failure to obey police traffic order, 2 one-way island (failure to obey the markings) 2; passing on wrong side, 3 passing without sufficient clearance, 3; passing on hill crest, 3; passing at intersection or grade crossing, 3; passing with view obstructed, 3; passing violation of white line, 4; failure to yield right of way at an intersection, 3; failure to yield right of way on left turn, 3; failure to yield right of way from private road, 2; failure to yield right of way to an emergency vehicle, 3; failure to yield right of way to pedestrian, 3; right of way failure to use due caution for pedestrian, 3; failure to stop at railroad crossing by school bus, bus or gas truck, 2, and failure to stop for a school bus, 4.

In the line of "variable point violations" are: Failure to signal, 3 to 4; speeding, 3 to 4; failure to reduce speed for curve or hillcrest, 3 to 4; violation of posted bridge speed, 3 to 4; failure to obey local posted speed zone, 3 to 4; failure to stop at stop sign, 3 to 4; failure to stop when coming from alley, 3; pulling out from curb without being safe, 2; failure to obey traffic light, 3; turning right from wrong lane, 3; turning left from wrong lane, 3; turning without 500 feet visibility, 3; failure to yield when being passed, 3; failure to yield when entering through

highway, 3.

He added that the law says: Departmental action indicated by accumulated violation points — Total of 6, first letter addressed to licensee; total of eight, personal interview or examination; total of 12 or more, license suspension.

He recommends that all study the law and obey it.

CRATER COUNTRY IN SOUTH IDAHO

French fur traders under Antoine Godin were the first white men to come to the Lost River region, which later became Butte county. In 1823 they discovered and explored Lost River, then called Godin River. Godin was killed by Indians and little is recorded of the county in history until Jack Hood drove the first wagon into the Lost River county in 1870. At old Arco on the Big Lost River, a suspension bridge, the only crossing at high water, was built, putting Arco on the direct route to Oregon and the Northwest. Thousands of head of cattle, sheep and horses trailer through there in the old days.

Today near Arco is located the National Reactor Testing station, a project costing nearly a half billion dollars and by far the largest such atomic installation in the world.

Rising out of the desert sands are the unearthly forms of the Craters of the Moon, many thousands of acres of grotesque lava, caves and craters. The two principal streams running through the county are called

the Big and Little Lost Rivers because both disappear into the ground at what is called the "sinks", located about 25 miles northeast of Arco. It is believed that they form a part of an underground river which gushes from the north wall of the Snake River canyon near Buhl.

TAKE HEART ADVICE

Heart attack victims may still enjoy the pleasures of camping and fishing, according to the Idaho Heart Ass'n. Your physician is the man to judge whether your heart can take the rigors of any trip you plan. Follow his advice and enjoy your trip safely.

FEED THAT LAWN

A lawn that looks hungry and ragged may need fertilizer, Homer Futter, county agricultural agent, reminded this week. Early fall is a good season. There is less danger of burning. The plant food has a chance to produce a vigorous stand that will survive the winter and take off nicely in the spring.

Grasses need nitrogen. Most Idaho soils have enough potassium and phosphorus for good growth. A combination fertilizer that contains nitrogen and phosphorus will do the total lawn job. Grass needs the nitrogen; clover needs the phosphorus.

Generally, it is advisable to put on not more than one pound of nitrogen per 1000 square feet of lawn at one time - assuming it is the right time. Too much fertilizer, the county agent said, may burn and weaken grass. Apply when the peak of hot weather has passed, but when there is no moisture on the grass. After spreading the fertilizer, water the lawn. This reduces the danger of burning.

IDAHO HAS MANY MINERAL RESOURCES

Idaho, the nation's leader in production of silver and antimony, has produced at least 30 different mineral commodities. In most years Idaho is second in the nation in production of zinc and lead and accounts for a large proportion of the domestic production of cadmium.

Although the first discovery of metals in Idaho is lost in unrecorded history, the presence of placer gold in the Boise Basin is reputed to have been known to a Hudson Bay Co. trapper as early as 1844. There are reports of other discoveries by members of the Stevens Expedition in

The 10 Commandments of Safety

- 1 Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of safety.
- 2 Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded and taken down or have actions open; guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
- 3 Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.
- 4 Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
- 5 Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
- 6 Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot; avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.
- 7 Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
- 8 Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
- 9 Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice be sure your backstop is adequate.
- 10 Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.

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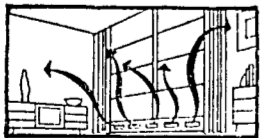

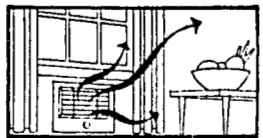

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delayed largely because of the hostility of the Indians to miners entering their lands.

In February, 1860, E. D. Pierce discovered placer gold on the North Fork of the Clearwater and in August discovered with a prospecting party on Grading Creek. The following year the town of Pierce was established, and the Orofino mining district was organized in January 1861. Idaho's mineral industry was born.

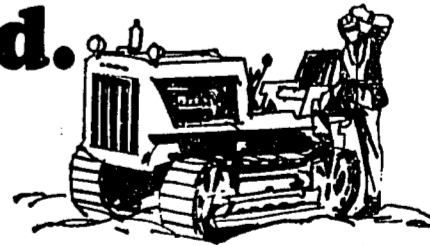
Idaho's major gold rush began in the fall of 1862 when placer discoveries were made at several places in Boise Basin. By 1869 practically all of the placer and many of the gold lode deposits now known in the state had been found. By 1872 the gold rush days in central and south-central Idaho were finished, and mining declined drastically. Placer mining continued for many years at numerous places and had a marked revival in the depression days of the 1930's, but the bonanza ground was removed in the early years of mining and since 1911 most of the placer gold has been recovered by dredges.
